In 2022, we committed ourselves to the task of rebuilding our community in the wake of a global pandemic that had a devastating impact on churches and organizations around our nation. Our Board of Deacons worked diligently to reestablish their connections to each other and the congregation by investing in governance and growth. DEACON CHAIR REPORT



In 2022, we began to move forward while still dealing with the effects of Covid on our church, our city and our world. Our health and wellness team was instrumental in this work, meeting weekly and keeping us informed. The deacons planned a virtual retreat to build relationships, set objectives, and clarify roles and responsibilities for staff and laity. We committed to begin to rebuild our community.

Our in-person navigation classes began again, and new members joined both in spring and fall. Their willingness to share their personal stories, their path to MPBC, and their belief that they had found a spiritual home were so moving and affirming. Our worship service continues to be the highlight of the week. We will be celebrating our church's 80th anniversary in 2023 and we are looking forward to hearing the stories from many of our long-time members. We knew we needed to have a strong financial finish to our year in order to keep our momentum going. 
As we look towards the future, we are focusing on continuing our journey of faith, to recommitting to our mission of social justice and inclusivity and envisioning a beloved community for all.

GROUNDED IN GENEROSITY

Financial Resources at Myers Park Baptist Church

Grounded in generosity . . .rooted in love. It was love that inspired one of our young MPBC families to offer a \$40,000 matching gift to the church, on top of what they were already giving in 2022. And it was love that inspired our congregation to respond by matching that \$40,000 in new and increased gifts, for a total of \$80,000 additional dollars for our Finish Strong campaign. Because of the extraordinary way your love for our church manifested into generosity we finished the year with a surplus of \$61,447.

The pie chart below illustrates how funds were spent in 2022:




Some financial highlights from 2022:

- Recent trend of declining giving units reversed in 2022 with 76 new giving units
- Collected 102% of pledges in 2022 up from 80% in 2021
- Matching gift challenge of \$40k worked! MPBC netted an additional \$80k to Finish Strong
- MPBC ended a year with a significant surplus of \$61k, which will be a shot in the arm for 2023
- Of the total expenses in 2022 of \$2,757,914, 71.6% of these came from the operating budget; 20.4% came from endowment funds, and 8% came from designated funds.
- 2022 was the official end of the 75th Capital Campaign. As of the end of the year, we have collected \$3,268,202 in pledges. The net (minus expenses) is \$2.9 million. This is the most successful capital campaign in our history. While the campaign is officially over, there are several people who wished to continue payments through the spring to pay off their pledge. So, this is not the final reporting for the campaign.

FINANCIAL REPORT CONT.

The Cornwell Center had their first surplus in history where the operational endowment was not utilized (\$27,642). However, their budget did utilize \$100,000 in stimulus surplus funds. Still, this was a great year for Cornwell, as Afterschool, Summer Camps, and the Basketball programs all saw their highest revenue ever. Facility rentals saw its largest year ever as well. Although membership has still not bounced back to its pre-pandemic levels, it did begin climbing back up in 2022. Realistically, we still have quite a way to go before membership reaches pre-pandemic levels. Since the operational endowment was not used in 2022, those funds will be used to renovate the fitness space in early 2023.

TTWS follows a different fiscal year than the rest of the campus. Their fiscal year ended in July. They netted a surplus of \$34,898, which they then passed over to the Church to help offset operational costs such as administration of their accounts payable, accounts receivable, payroll, and facility costs.

GROUNDED FOR THE FUTURE

The generosity of our founders and forebears in the past has grounded our church for the future. **The MPBC Endowment Fund** continues to be a significant source of support for programs and operations. In 2022, church endowment funds comprised 20% of all funds expended for programs and operations. This amounts to over \$500,000.

JUSTICE & OUTREACH

In 2022 the high-speed Ministry of Justice and Outreach (MOJO) had two facilitated retreats for the purpose of creating a strategic plan for their ministry which would focus their efforts on three specific areas: Economics, Environment, and Education—all of which are enveloped and impacted by systemic racism and white supremacy. MOJO then created affinity groups for each of their three focus areas and adopted the slogan "Justice is what love looks like." The Economic Justice Affinity group is led by Cindy Adcock, the Environmental Justice Affinity group is led by Paula Fricke, and the Educational Justice Affinity group is led by Laura Handler. Each of these affinity groups started building momentum in 2022 and will be looking for more members to join them in their efforts in 2023.

In addition to their strategic work, MOJO helped to plan and lead some incredible programming in 2022:

- Supporting the Book Launch of Confronting Whiteness in July at Common Market
- Hosting our first LGBTQ Conference planned by Devin Green in partnership with PFLAG, Time Out Youth, and Transcend CLT
- Traveled and networked with the Alliance of Baptists event: Excavating Our Roots in Montgomery, AL
- Marching in CLT PRIDE for the first time since 2019 and having the largest attendance in history
- Hosting a Rise Against Hunger event in Heaton Hall









COMMUNITY LIFE


This year we embraced the challenge of (re)Building Community and created opportunities for new congregants and longtime congregants to connect with one another. We hosted two Navigating classes for guests and welcomed 24 new members in 2022. We gathered for Hangout with the Pastor, Welcome Sunday BBQ lunch, New Member Receptions, the Men's Breakfast, Walkie Talkies walking group, and Hiking around Charlotte. We found ways to be together that built new friendships and reignited others. It was a year that allowed us to embrace the new and celebrate the traditions we missed when we were closed during the pandemic.











COMMUNICATIONS & TECHNOLOGY

Communications

We launched a brand-new website with a fresh, modern look focused on clearly portraying who we are as a church community, and centering around our mission words: Inclusivity, Spirituality, Community, and Justice. We were intentional about using consistent and inclusive language to make our content more accessible to visitors while increasing our search numbers and online ranking.

Our Weekly newsletter mailing list gained 315 new subscribers. We continue to revise and restructure the newsletter to provide as much information as possible while trying to be concise and provide links for more details. The Weekly continues to be our primary source for information about what is going on at MPBC. It is read by an average of 635 people per week (66%) with a click through average rate of 116 (12%). These are extremely high percentages for church communications (standard open rate is 45% and click through rate is 3%). Those who have developed the habit of reading it every Monday have become very well informed.

Technology

- Continued to improve and expand Wi-Fi throughout the campus.
- Added security cameras for the Sanctuary accessible entrance and also the Sanctuary basement entrance under the Pastor's Study.
- Implemented automatic dusk to dawn lighting controls for most of the campus outdoor lighting they adjust all year long and don't have to be manually changed each season.



MUSIC & WORSHIP

In 2022, we offered eleven diverse worship services including Jazz, Rock, Calypso, and Indigenous music. We added new vocal scholars to our Chancel Choir who have helped reinforce the high quality of music we have in worship. Our Good Friday service featuring our Chancel Choir, soloists, and instrumentalists presenting *Stabat Mater* by Karl Jenkins was incredibly powerful.

2022 was also a year of transition for our music ministry with the departure of Charlotte Judge and Matt Caine. Thankfully, our retired Minister of Music, Fran Morrison, graciously returned in August and helped not only to steady the ship but to rebuild our Chancel Choir to the strength it was before the pandemic. She was joined by Candace Williamson who launched a Music and Arts class for children on Wednesday evenings. In addition, we were fortunate to host Artist-in-Residence, Dr. Caleb Hopkins, who led rehearsals with our choir and his partner Susanna Stewart who performed as a soloist in worship.

Worship in 2022 also included phenomenal preaching from our Rev. Dr. Boswell, Rev. Mia McClain, and Rev. Tara Gibbs, as well as special guests like Rev. Melissa McQueen Simmons, Rev. Dr. JJ Flag, Rev. John Pavlovitz, and the return of Rev. Dr. Carter Heyward who famously preached amid controversy over her LGBTQ identity at our church back in the late 70s.





MEMBERSHIP & ATTENDANCE

Virtual Worship Statistics are derived by counting the views we have each week on multiple platforms: Livestream, Facebook Live, and YouTube. Most churches count each view as 1.3 to account for multiple viewers in a single household (i.e. couples or families). However, in 2022 we counted each viewing as 1. Our worship participation decreased slightly in 2022 as you can see in the chart below.

Dr. Flag is a person of faith who is constantly willing to learn and grow—even sometimes change—his theology as he encounters new perspectives and persons. Over the summer, Seth approached Revs. Carrie Veal and Tara Gibbs, asking if he could help in children and youth programming. With enthusiasm, they said, Yes! Wednesday night programming is a place where children and adults come together for food, fellowship, and friendship all while creating beautiful music and art! Caregivers are volunteering and participating in programming alongside their children, allowing for much needed connection between families, volunteers, and staff. Our youngest congregants expressed their deepest creative spirit through song, movement, and play and led in worship during Lessons and Carols. Our children and families are endlessly creative, and we look forward to evolving the program to highlight their unique gifts and abilities as we continue to grow.

Sunday morning Children's Worship was reimagined. As families came back to church, they asked for a Children's Worship experience. Carrie, Candace, and Seth created an experience that brings Bible stories to life while allowing space for curiosity and wondering. Over time, a cohesion developed between Wednesdays and Sundays to allow for a more integrated program.



YOUTH MINISTRY

This year, our youth ministry focused on love: Loving God, Community, and Growth. It is through this lens of love, that we increased not only our numbers of regular participants, but awareness for issues in our community. This year was a beautiful blend of our traditional programming such as Fall Retreat, Service According to Youth, and Discipleship, while incorporating fresh ideas such as themed gatherings, youth-led service projects, and guest speakers.

- Enrolled 8 youth in Discipleship 2022-23.
- Created and presented "Faith Around the World" for Youth Sunday with a Spotlight on Seniors.
- Encouraged over 30 different youth to participate and serve in worship as acolytes, reading scripture, collecting offering, and acting as greeters.
- Shared good news and prayer requests weekly at Youth Block.

Loving Community

- Donated and delivered 2 bins of non-perishable goods to Reeder Memorial Missions Place during the Fall Youth Retreat.
- Volunteered and packed meals at the churchwide Rise Against Hunger event.
- Completed a chalk mural for our Chalk the Chapel/Service According to Youth Event.

- Welcomed Intern Seth Pilz and Music Coordinator Candace Williamson.
- Increased weekly youth block attendance.
- Provided scholarships and gifts to rising first year college students.
- Learned from special guests including the Ministry of Justice & Outreach, church members, and local artists.



FACILITIES AS MINISTRY

Our facilities facilitate ministry! We take seriously our call to be good stewards of all our resources, including the buildings and fixed assets under the umbrella of our Ministry of Facilities Management. Our facility resources provide a space in which ministry and programs can occur, children can learn and play, youth can connect with others, and inspirational worship happens. Our space also provides us some revenue, as we open our doors for others to utilize our space each week.

In addition to the usual maintenance and administrative items we encounter each year, such as ensuring adequate insurance coverage, keeping interior and exterior spaces clean and safe, and paying utilities, we also gave our Narthex and Administration Building reception area a much-needed refreshment with new paint and some new furnishings.

The Ministry of Facilities Management realized that we needed to make our campus a more accessible place. To that end, we began planning projects in late 2022, to be implemented in 2023. These projects would update doors, bathrooms, and more - creating accessibility for all persons.















THROUGH-THE-WEEK SCHOOL

leading the community in early childhood education

During 2022, we provided a year of quality preschool experience to 180 students led by 33 staff members. With COVID becoming more manageable, we were able to return to many of our beloved pre-pandemic traditions and celebrations including welcoming parents back into the classroom for Star of the Week and birthday lunches, Camp Summer Fun, the Halloween parade, and Christmas Caroling. The children enjoyed our weekly specials of Science, My Gym, Music, Storybook Matinee, and Exploration Station. TTWS utilized fundraising dollars for playground improvements.













CORNWELL CENTER

2022 was a great year for the Cornwell Center. In the years prior, the pandemic had affected the Cornwell Center considerably with memberships, rentals, and youth programming all declining. However, in 2022 there seemed to be a resurrection of hope and participation with everyone making their personal wellness a priority yet again. Membership improved; group exercise classes filled up; pickleball and basketball courts were flooded with players of all different skill levels. Third party groups that at one point called the Cornwell home came back in full swing. Youth programming had their best year to date with the afterschool program, youth basketball league, and summer camp participation all reaching maximum capacity.

To support this resurgence the Cornwell Center looked at ways it could maximize its space and converted the former Lounge into a new childcare area. The former Conference Center became the new permanent home to the elementary afterschool program and a newly unused space downstairs paved the way for an expanded fitness area coming in 2023.

In addition to the newly revamped space, the Cornwell Center underwent new leadership, officially naming Tripp Caldwell Director in September. As we look ahead to 2023, The Cornwell Center will continue to improve its programming and offerings centered around whole family wellness. Whether you are 9 weeks or 99 years old there is an opportunity to participate, flourish, and improve upon one's wellbeing and feel the love and sense of community the Cornwell Center has to offer. We look forward to celebrating our 20th anniversary in 2023!


