New Testament Reading – James 1:19-25 & 2:14-26 NRSV

You must understand this, my beloved brothers and sisters: let everyone be quick to listen, slow to speak, slow to anger, for human anger does not produce God's righteousness. Therefore rid yourselves of all sordidness and rank growth of wickedness, and welcome with meekness the implanted word that has the power to save your souls.

But be doers of the word and not merely hearers who deceive themselves. For if any are hearers of the word and not doers, they are like those who look at themselves in a mirror; for they look at themselves and, on going away, immediately forget what they were like. But those who look into the perfect law, the law of liberty, and persevere, being not hearers who forget but doers who act—they will be blessed in their doing.

What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if someone claims to have faith but does not have works? Surely that faith cannot save, can it? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.

But someone will say, "You have faith, and I have works." Show me your faith apart from works, and I by my works will show you faith. You believe that God is one; you do well. Even the demons believe—and shudder. Do you want to be shown, you senseless person, that faith apart from works is worthless? Was not our ancestor Abraham justified by works when he offered his son Isaac on the altar? You see that faith was active along with his works, and by works faith was brought to completion. Thus the scripture was fulfilled that says, "Abraham believed God, and it was reckoned to him as righteousness," and he was called the friend of God. You see that a person is justified by works and not by faith alone. Likewise, was not Rahab the prostitute also justified by works when she welcomed the messengers and sent them out by another road? For just as the body without the spirit is dead, so faith without works is also dead.

Notes on some of our musical selections and composers

Florence B. Price

Florence Beatrice (Smith) Price became the first black female composer to have a symphony performed by a major American orchestra when Music Director Frederick Stock and the Chicago Symphony Orchestra played the world premiere of her Symphony No. 1 in E minor on June 15, 1933, on one of four concerts presented at the Auditorium Theatre from June 14 through June 17 during Chicago's Century of Progress Exposition. The historic June 15th concert entitled "The Negro in Music" also included works by Harry T. Burleigh, Roland Hayes, Samuel Coleridge-Taylor and John Alden Carpenter performed by Margaret A. Bonds, pianist and tenor Roland Hayes with the orchestra. Florence Price's symphony had come to the attention of Stock when it won first prize in the prestigious Wanamaker Competition held the previous year.

Lift Every Voice and Sing

Many people are surprised to learn that "Lift Every Voice and Sing" was first written as a poem. Created by James Weldon Johnson, it was performed for the first time by 500 school children in celebration of President Lincoln's birthday on February 12, 1900 in Jacksonville, FL. The poem was set to music by Johnson's brother, John Rosamond Johnson, and soon adopted by the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) as its official song. Today "Lift Every Voice and Sing" is one of the most cherished songs of the African American Civil Rights Movement and is often referred to as the Black National Anthem.

Glory from "Selma"

"Glory," was written in 2011 by John Legend, Common, and Rhymefest as the theme song for "Selma," a motion picture that tells the story of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. and those who organized and participated in the 1965 Selma to Montgomery marches.

This song marks the first time, we are aware of, that the now fifty-year-old genre of Hip Hop has been utilized in worship at Myers Park Baptist Church.

We Shall Overcome, Only When We Sing Together

This is a world premiere performance of this hymn that was written in 2021, by J. Kevin Gray to honor those who have and are still on the front lines of the Civil Rights movement.

It was dedicated to David Tang and Frank McGinnis, who have been creative partners with Kevin on numerous projects and share the passion of dignity and prosperity for all people.

Precious Lord, Take my Hand

This hymn, by Thomas Dorsey, was chosen for today because it was requested by Dr. King to be sung at his funeral and performed by his close friend, Mahalia Jackson.

Adolphus Cunningham Hailstork III

Adolphus C. Hailstork is an American composer and educator. He was born in Rochester, New York, and grew up in Albany, New York, where he studied violin, piano, organ, and voice. He currently resides in Virginia Beach, Virginia. Hailstork is of African American, Native American, and European ancestry and his works blend musical ideas from the African, American, and European traditions.



Lift Every Voice and Sing



Initially a poem for a school assembly at which Booker T. Washington spoke on Lincoln's birthday in 1900, this text and tune have gained national recognition and devotion, not only within the African American community, but also among all who seek liberation from oppression.






