Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of April 14

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Ephesians 3:17-19:

¹⁷... [may] Christ dwell in your hearts through faith—that you, being rooted and grounded in love, ¹⁸ may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, ¹⁹ and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray that God would deepen our desire for prayer as a church family. May we not grow weary or apathetic in bringing our concerns to Him. May God help us to sense His presence and power as we pray. (Rom 12:12, Col 4:2)
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray that God would renew our strength when we're weary and use our weakness to display His power. (2 Cor. 12:9)

- Pray for those in our church family who are going through a significant time of suffering—physically or mentally. Pray for peace. Pray for a keen awareness of God's presence and a desire to draw near to him. Pray for experiences of joy in Christ and in fellowship with church family. (Is. 26:3-4, Ps. 34:18, Ps. 30:1-5)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 5:1-14

"The Lion is the Lamb" – April 14, 2024



Introduction

To view the eclipse this week, you needed to wear protective glasses because of the brightness of the sun. In the same way, we need spiritual lenses to see the heavenly realm that is around us right now. Often, we think that what we see with our physical eyes is all there is to see. John gave us spiritual lenses to view our lives from a heavenly perspective.

In chapter four, we see God on His throne – It shows us God as our Creator. As created beings, we exist to worship God. In Genesis we see that Adam and Eve had perfect fellowship with God. Then in Genesis three, their sin created hostility between us and God. That is the bad news. If this almighty God is in your corner, that is good. But if this almighty God is opposed to you, that is terrifying. Sin has left this world broken, in sorrow, in sickness, pain, and groaning under the curse of sin. How can we move from weeping to worship?

Sermon Outline

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-4

The scroll contains God's plan for this world and the future. It is His plan for judgment, salvation, and restoration. It is His plan to bring wickedness to an end, His plan to rescue and save His people and to make right what sin has made wrong - to make all things new. However, this scroll is sealed with seven seals. Who is worthy to open the scroll and break its seals? No one. To open the scroll means to bring the plan into reality. One must have the authority and power to make it happen.

If no one could be found to open the scroll, creation would be stuck under the curse of sin. No wonder that John responds by weeping loudly. Sin leaves all of creation groaning. John knew what it meant to groan under the burden of trials and temptation. Does life leave you groaning sometimes? When the dark cloud of depression won't lift, when your sickness lingers, when you are grieving the loss of a loved one, when school or your job is overwhelming or if you feel like your life is pointless or when a grievous sin is done against you and it leaves your life in shambles, there is groaning. When you are left waiting for justice, relief, and rest and nothing changes, how do you feel? You probably feel discouraged and weary. Is it encouraging to you knowing that John, the apostle, and Bible author, tells us that he had days of discouragement? John will show us how he moved from weeping to worship.

Additional Reading: Ezekiel 2:9-10, Daniel 12, Romans 8

2. Read vs. 5-7

One of the elders told John to stop crying. The Lion of the tribe of Judah is worthy to open the scroll. Jesus is that Lion. He is the Root of David, the forever King to bring peace and victory. The elder encourages John with the truth. He told John to, "behold." When we are discouraged, we need God's word to behold Jesus. In your painful circumstances, do you lose sight of Jesus? We need to look again, and again, and again. We also must encourage each other with the greatness of Jesus. This is how we are transformed from one degree of glory to the next.

When John turns to look, he sees a Lamb. Jesus took the scroll from God. The Lion is the Lamb. Jesus will rescue the righteous by destroying the wicked. Jesus also stands as the Lamb who was slain. In love, Jesus went to the cross as a sacrifice for our sin. Jesus is worthy to open the scroll because He conquered. He was slain, and by His blood there is redemption. He willingly laid down His life in love for sinners like you and me. Because of His death, sin and death have been conquered.

We know that He is victorious because He was slain, but now He stands, risen from the dead. Jesus is the Lion who conquers and the Lamb that was slain. Jesus is a strong Judge, but He is also gentle and lowly. What do you do with all that you have no power to control? What do you do with gut-wrenching wickedness? Jesus is the perfect balance of both - Lion and Lamb. Jesus is holy, and yet He is personal inviting, warm, and humble. He is breath-takingly majestic, and He is also meek. He is fierce and gentle. He is the Ruler of history, and He is also obedient to

His Father. Jesus is uncompromising in justice, and He is merciful.

Scripture is clear that every human being has sinned against a holy God. We deserve God's righteous justice. Jesus doesn't have to compromise to satisfy God's justice. He is the Lamb that took our sin on the cross, bearing the righteous wrath of God. So, He can turn to anyone who trusts in Him and offers grace and mercy. Only Jesus can do that. This is why He alone can open the scroll - the scroll that has God's plan for judgment, salvation, and restoration.

Verse six describes this Lamb as having seven horns and seven eyes. In the Old Testament, the horn was a symbol of might and power, and the number seven is the number of completeness. Jesus has complete and unlimited power - He is the omnipotent and omniscient One. Don't mistake the Lamb's meekness for weakness. He is not to be trifled with. One day those who refuse and ignore the mercy of the Lamb Jesus will experience His wrath (Revelation 6:16) Trust in Jesus NOW. When we behold Jesus for Who He is, with eyes of faith, we are changed.

Additional Reading: Genesis 29:8-12, Isaiah 11

3. Read vs. 8-14

Jesus is worthy and takes the scroll from God the Father. No one objects. When He takes the scroll, He is taking the reins of history into His hands. The four living creatures and the twenty-four elders fall down and worship Jesus because He is God. They have bowls of incense which are the prayers of the saints. Why is this important? Sometimes we pray and must wait for our answers. In your waiting, do you wonder if God hears and cares? John reminds us of what our prayers smell like for a reason. When you pray, God does not turn away from your prayers as if they smell terrible. When you pray, they are collected in a bowl, and they smell like incense to God. He delights in our prayers. He hears the prayers, and it brings Him pleasure. Doesn't that make you want to pray more?

Jesus is worthy to open the scroll because He willingly laid down His life. The scars of Jesus' body are a constant reminder of God's love for you. (Romans 5:8) Jesus' death had a purpose - to redeem. God doesn't save all people without **exception**. (He's not a universalist.) Christ shed His blood for all people without **distinction**. Heaven will include people from every tribe, language, people, and nation. We can see this in our own church body and praise God. It also reminds us that we must labor for unity. It is also a reminder to labor in global missions - to pray, support, send, and go overseas to disciple others and plant churches so that others might know this great God. What brings us together is Jesus. It is the worship of Jesus.

How do you envision Heaven? Some people envision Heaven as a church service, singing songs that never end. Worship is so much more than singing songs. How do you see worship? Worship is what you do every day of the week - in our jobs, in our recreation, in school, in our relationships, in all our life. We never stop worshiping. It's not if we are worshiping, it is what are you worshiping? (Romans 12:1-2) We must honor, value, and obey God with all of our life. Everything we have has been given to us by God. What is most valuable to you? What is your heart loving, trusting, and controlling you?

The crescendo of worship peaks in vs. 13. Imagine a small church living under the mighty and powerful Roman Empire and being pressured by the Romans to say they were getting it wrong. How do you feel today when the world whispers in your ear that you are getting it wrong and living for the wrong thing? Do you feel the pressure to follow the world? John says, "Put on your Revelation five glasses. You are not outnumbered. All of creation is saying, "He is worthy.'" Do you see the glory of Jesus? He is worthy of your life, time, money, energy, relationships, job - everything about you and me. He is worthy. Will you by faith join in the worship and celebration of the Lamb who is worthy?

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of April 14th

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are *optional* if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
