A Prayer Guide for the week of April 28

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, consider using the words of Psalm 119:33-40 to pray for yourself and others:

³³ Teach me, O LORD, the way of your statutes; and I will keep it to the end. ³⁴ Give me understanding, that I may keep your law and observe it with my whole heart.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

 Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)

- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1
 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for teachers and students in our church family who are completing their final weeks of classes for the school year. Pray that God would help them to finish well and give them physical and spiritual strength to endure. See a list of our out-of-town college students toward the back of the church directory.
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray that God would renew our strength when we're weary and use our weakness to display His power. (2 Cor. 12:9)
- Pray that a culture of discipleship, joyful hospitality, and care grows in us as a church family (1 Pt 4:9; Col. 3:16)
- Pray for those in our church family who are going through a significant time of suffering—physically or mentally. Pray for peace. Pray for a keen awareness of God's presence and a desire to draw near to him. Pray for experiences of joy in Christ and in fellowship with church family. (Is. 26:3-4, Ps. 34:18, Ps. 30:1-5)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 6:1-17

"The Wrath of the Lamb" – April 28, 2024



Introduction

In the book of Revelation, God pulled back the curtain for John. John, under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, wrote what he saw then sent this letter to the churches to encourage them in a time of persecution. The message of Revelation is that Jesus wins. His victory becomes our victory.

We may be confused and concerned about the circumstances of life. God is in the "driver's seat," so we can rest and trust. In <u>Revelation 4</u>, John shows us God, on the throne. He is in control. We don't need to panic. History is going somewhere. In <u>Revelation 5</u>, we see Jesus Who is the only One to open the scroll containing God's plan for history. Where is history going? Chapter 6 gives us a sneak peek of the coming judgment which is near and promised, sure and guaranteed. How should Christians live, knowing that our sovereign God will someday judge the world?

Sermon Outline

- 1. Repent and hope. Vs. 1-8

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-8

Jesus is given the scroll and is the only one who can open it. The first four seals come together as a group. The first horse is white with a rider coming to conquer. The second horse is red, and the rider represents violence due to conflict between individuals. The third horse is black with a rider who carries scales representing a nation in famine and crippling inflation. The fourth horse is pale, and the rider is called Death, representing sickness and death.

Remember, this is apocalyptic literature using symbols to describe things. We must keep in mind the overarching theme and purpose. We, as a church, must agree that Jesus will return and judge the world. This is crystal clear in scripture. We can disagree on the exact details and how it will play out.

These are echoes of Jesus' teaching of what will happen in the last days – the days in which we live now. This is the time between the first coming of Jesus and the second coming. We don't have to look far for war, conflict, sickness, and death. They are happening all the time - over and over on a cyclical and escalating basis. We are not surprised at these events however, we can be surprised by where they have come from. The riders are **given permission**. Who is in the driver's seat? Who is on the throne? It is Jesus! Why is Jesus giving permission for this to happen?

One of the purposes is to bring the wicked in this world to repentance. It is natural for us to run from God. These painful events can be God's mercy to wake us up. In one sense, God's judgment is future, but there is a sense in which it is resting on the world today. (Romans 1:18) His wrath is being revealed now. The world is not as bad as it can be because God's restraining hand is holding it back. However, If we stiff arm God, He will remove His hand. The pain squeezes us and shows us what is in our heart. They a wake-up call.

The second purpose is to test the faith of God's people. (Rev. 2:10) As these trials fall on **ALL** of creation, God's purposes are different for His people. When you go through a trial, God is testing your faith - not so He can figure out what you are made of - but to show <u>you</u> that your faith is genuine. Testing is God's mercy to us, designed to prepare us for **THE** test at the judgment and help us to know that our faith is in Jesus. The hardest things in your life are divinely designed for your good. They shape, strengthen, and prepare you to face the coming judgment with confidence. What have you learned from your trials? What needs to be fixed? What can you thank God for? Has your faith proven genuine?

It's tempting to look at suffering and believe that God is not in control because He does not disclose every mystery to us. We know that a good God is in the driver's seat. It is the basis of our hope. He can use hard things to bring the wicked to repentance and test His people, yet, holding onto hope in a world filled with these things is hard.

2. Read vs. 9-11

The first four seals deal with general suffering. The fifth seal is specific to Christians. John sees those who have been killed for their faith. They are crying out, "how long!" God says, "a little longer." This prayer of vengeance by the martyrs is not a desire personal vengeance, but for God. They want the majesty and glory of Christ to be revealed. The death of these saints is a testimony to the glory and infinite worth of Jesus and knowing Him.

God cares for these martyrs. He tells them to rest beneath the altar. They have been given a white robe, declaring that they were right about the worth of living for Jesus. He is worth giving everything for. How can we know that Jesus is worth it?

As we count the cost, behold the glory of Jesus. The point of this book is to see Him. Meditate on Him - the Lion of the tribe of Judah, the Lamb who was sacrificed for us. He will wipe away every tear, make everything right in this world, and make everything new. Listen to the testimony of the martyrs. They were killed for the word of God and are riveted with the glory of God's name.

Because of who God is, we can pray confidently. Do you often struggle with what you know in your head to be true and what you believe in your heart? Go to God with that. A lament is an honest prayer in pain to help us trust God. The martyrs model this by asking, "how long." Is something in your life that has left you asking, "how long?" Read a psalm of lament like <u>Psalm 79</u>, and use it as a springboard for your prayers. Pray, knowing that God hears you.

3. Read Vs. 12-17

The sixth seal that shows us the end of history. We have seen or experienced powerful storms – hurricanes, tornados, etc., but they are nothing like the day of judgment. These verses reveal a picture of creation coming unraveled because God has shown up, and He is about to judge. His judgment will be massive, final, and frightening.

Powerful people will desperately try to hide so that they don't have to look God in the eye, but there is no hiding. John writes about how people will react on the day of judgment. Do you believe that this day is coming? Do you understand the gravity of sin? Do you believe in the severity of this judgment? This is truth. Do you assume this is just for the really bad people? Everyone is included in the judgment. (vs. 15; Hebrews 4:13)

How do you view God? Do you see Him as great? This is God's right and appropriate response to evil. Who can stand before a holy God? To be spared from the wrath of the Lamb on that day, one must come to the Lamb of God in repentance and faith. Jesus suffered, drinking the cup of God's wrath to the bottom. He offers forgiveness, power, and protection. How does the Father respond to those who repent? He responds with open arms! Outside of Christ, you will face the wrath of the Lamb. Come to Jesus to escape the coming wrath. Turn from your sin and trust in Christ.

As believers, we have the answer. Knowing the day is coming and believing it is true, we have a job to do. How can they know about Jesus unless someone tells them. (Romans 10:9) We can share the good news, humbly and gratefully, boldly and unashamed. Who do you need to share this good news with today?

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at fbcum.org

Family Guide for week of April 28th

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
