Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of June 2

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, consider using the words of the psalmist from Psalm 130:8. If you're praying through the church directory, consider asking God to work in these ways in those you're praying for each day:

8 ...hope in the LORD!For with the LORD there is steadfast love,And with him is plentiful redemption.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)



Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 10:1-11

"The Bittersweet Scroll" – June 2, 2024



Introduction

Do you realize that you resemble what you worship? If you worship God, over time you become like Him and reflect His character. However, if you worship anything other than God, you become spiritually blind and deaf. (Ps. 135)

In Revelation 8 and 9, the aim of the judgements is to warn the wicked so that they receive God's mercy. Most will not repent; they will continue to worship the things of the world - money, success, position, acclaim. They are spiritually blind and deaf and operate by their rules and their version of the truth.

Worldliness makes sin look normal and righteousness look strange. As the world grows darker, you may experience doubt and have questions. God's word is a light that may bring persecution to those who desire to walk according to its truths. When you feel the pressure from the world to doubt God's word, how can you hold fast with confidence? The book of Revelation is meant to strengthen our confidence in God's word and help us stand firm. There are three truths here that strengthen our confidence in God's word

Sermon Outline

- 1. God's word comes from a glorious God. Vs. 1-3
- 2. God's word is trustworthy and true. Vs. 4-7
- 3. God's word is sweet as honey. Vs. 8-11

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-3

Remember, the book of Revelation is apocalyptic literature, using symbols to represent literal truth. To know what those symbols mean, we should reflect on the Old Testament. The cloud and the pillars of fire remind us of the exodus. God led his people with His presence symbolized by a pillar of fire and a cloud. The angel who represents God is saying that God will lead His people to the new heavens and the new earth.

You will remember the rainbow from Genesis. God saved Noah and His family from the flood and gave His promise after the flood. What God did for Noah, God still does today. You will be led safely through the waters of His judgments.

The angel is Jesus' representative. He brought God's word to John and represented what Jesus is like - He is glorious. There is no one like Jesus. The angel put his foot on the land and the sea. Putting a foot on something shows authority over these things. (Ps. 8:6) This reminds us that Jesus is in charge, ruling over everything on the land, sea and the heavens. The angel roars like a lion. When Jesus roars, thunder roars! Do you think of God's word as thunder? (Ps. 29)

Think of the voices you hear daily. You hear voices that tell you what is cool, acceptable, and valuable. Those voices can be intimidating, chipping away your confidence in God's word. Compare those voices to the voice of God in vs. 1 - 3. God's voice leads us to life. You obey what you revere and fear. If you listen to the voices of the world, you will live to please man. However, if you listen to God and fear Him, you will live to seek His approval, free from the snare of the fear of man. Will you live to listen to people who will be forgotten tomorrow or to the eternal God? Are you tempted to get in line with the world's thinking? Remember Who is talking to you. When you see the glorious God, you will not fear. (Ps. 56:3-4) The Lion is on your side! Look to Him.

Additional Reading: Psalm 27

2. Read vs. 4-7

In Genesis 1 and 2, God created Adam and Eve and talked to them. He was very clear about what was good and right, and they accepted what He said. This made the garden of Eden a paradise. Then Satan came along in chapter 3 and lied to them. He questioned what God said, causing them to doubt God's word. Then He told Eve that there are no consequences to sin. His third lie was that God is not good. They

believed the lie, and the world was plunged into sin. We are all born with an inclination to control everything rather than trust. We are saying that we'd rather be God than trust God.

While your feelings matter, they are not the decider of truth. There is objective, unchangeable truth in this world, but the world tells you to follow your heart and live your truth. It sounds good, but that could lead to disaster. You need to live by THE truth. The truth found in scripture. Because God is eternal, He sees a much bigger picture than you do with your limited knowledge. He sees the whole thing; you see a sliver. God created heaven and earth. He is the Potter, and you are the clay. He is the only one authorized to say what is right and wrong, good and evil.

God's word is a light for your path. (<u>Psalm 119:105</u>) It shows you who you are and how to live, and it is a revelation of Who God is. However, God's word doesn't tell you everything. If God is God then there are certain things He knows and you don't. (<u>Deut. 29:29</u>) He does out of mercy. God made you and I to trust Him. (<u>Proverbs 3:5-6</u>; <u>Matthew 6:25-36</u>) If you are anxious, weary and afraid in your efforts to control things, repent; trust and rest in God who gives you light for the next step.

In the days of the trumpet call, the mystery of God would be fulfilled. It will happen, just as He announced to the prophets. Mystery means something that was hidden in the past but is now revealed. God's plan for the redemption of mankind through Jesus Christ, bringing them together as one person, and judging wickedness in this world has been revealed. Jesus has come. Nothing - NOTHING - will stand in the way of God's word being fulfilled. God is faithful. He will do just as He announced. (vs.7)

What are you building your life upon? How can you know that what you are building on is the right foundation? Are you prepared to stand before your Creator to give an account of your life? The things of the world change overnight. Only God will bring peace, joy, and contentment. Come to Him in repentance and faith. Building your life on the solid Rock. He is faithful.

3. Read vs. 8-11

Have you ever read a portion of God's word and forget what you just read? Maybe you didn't understand it. God wants us to digest, internalize, understand, and trust His word. When you understand it rightly, it will be sweet as honey. As you read the Bible, there are hard truths that, at first, may not taste sweet to you. It may confront you, requiring repentance and change. Wrestling with the text is okay. We may have to wrestle for a long time. Can you say that God's word is a joy and delight to your heart? (Jer. 15:16) There are hard truths in scripture that you may wrestle with for a lifetime. If you are to hold onto God's word and be confident in a world that disparages it, you need to taste and see that God is good. (Ps. 34:8) Take time to read it carefully, meditate on it, and digest it with the help of the Holy Spirit. Pray and ask God to help His word become sweet to you.

After it was sweet, John said that it made his stomach bitter. John was called to digest the message and then proclaim it. Some would accept it, and some would reject it. We praise God for the Gospel. He made it sweet to us. Yet it will be bitter to some. Some will be offended because it is offensive to sinful pride. Do you remember a time when God's word was bitter to you and then, after reading it, it became sweet? What happened? God's words have the power to create a new reality. Just as God spoke creation into existence, His words can make a dead heart come alive. (Ez. 37) If you are a Christian today, it is because God's word made you alive. His words are good. Don't lose heart. By His word, God will get us safely home!

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?
