Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of June 16

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, consider using these words from Hebrews 12:1. If you're praying through the church directory, consider asking God to work in these ways in those you're praying for each day:

...let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us,...

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 11:1-19

"Two Witnesses and a Woe" – June 16, 2024



Introduction

Jim Elliot and four other fellow missionaries lost their lives taking the gospel to the Auca Indians in Ecuador. He left behind a wife and ten-month old daughter. Many people assumed that his death was a tragic waste. It seemed like a foolish, unnecessary risk taking the gospel to these savage people which then led to his death.

What if your child or grandchild die a violent death while taking the gospel to an unreached people group? If obedience to the Bible or sharing the message of the good news of God's word leads to people rolling their eyes and mocking us or to the loss of friendship or a job, should we keep pressing into the scriptures? History has examples of people who used to believe the Bible or used to attend church but have walked away because of persecution for their testimony. What will keep us faithful?

After the first six seals it is asked, "Who can stand before God in the judgment?" The answer - those who are sealed. Now when looking at the seven trumpets, it is asked, "What should we do?" The answer - Witness.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Know the nature of our witness. Vs. 1-6
- 2. Know the results of our witness. Vs. 7-19

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-6

Remember, everything in Revelation is literal truth but displayed in symbols. The only way to make sense of the symbols is to know our Old Testament. In vs. 1, John is given a measuring rod, Why? In <u>Zechariah 2</u> the prophet receives a measuring line to measure Jerusalem. God would be a wall of fire around His people. (<u>Zech. 2:5</u>) This is God's promise to be with His people to protect them.

The temple that John is to measure refers to the people of God. The church is the temple. (1 Corinthians 3:16) God is promising to protect His church. NOTHING will derail God's good plans for His people. Those who are outside the temple are those who are outside of Christ - the unbelieving world. They will "trample" the church for forty-two months (1260 days) which refer to the time between the destruction of the temple and the coming of Jesus. (Compare this with Revelation 12:4-6, Revelation 13:5, Daniel 7:12 and Daniel 12:5-7 – as the same time period.)

The two witnesses refer to the church. We (the church) are part of the two witnesses. (Vs.4) The olive tree fueled the lampstands. (Zechariah 4) Now, the Holy Spirit fuels the church to bring light to the world. Why two lamp stands? (Matthew 18:16) The church is called to maintain a witness regardless of the persecution of the world. The Holy Spirit will provide the power to bring light into a dark world. How can we maintain witness in a hostile world?

Four things to strengthen our witness:

- We, as the witness, are protected by God. He is our refuge. If you are in Christ, you are in the safest place in the universe.
- Our witness is authorized by God. (vs. 3; Matthew 28:18) The world will object to the message, because the
 gospel message demands repentance from those to whom we share the gospel and from those of us
 sharing the gospel.
- We are strengthened by God. (Vs. 4) The Holy Spirit fuels the believers. (Isaiah 40:28-31)
- The content of our witness is truth. It is God's word the message of the gospel. If they reject the message, it is not us they are rejecting. They are rejecting Jesus.

The fire, the drought and the plagues are expressions of God's judgment. (I Kings 17-18, Exodus 7-13) If the world refuses the life giving message of Jesus, then the only thing left is death and judgment.

Do you find yourself intimidated by the world? Do you pity the world? We should pity the world, pray for the world, and proclaim the message with urgency. Time is almost out! Judgment is coming, but there is a way of escape. With whom do you need to share the message of the gospel?

2. Read vs. 7-19

The beast is introduced in this chapter to remind us that our real enemy is the spiritual forces of this world. (Ephesians 6:12)

What are the results of our witness?

• Suffering. As the church shares the gospel, that message can taste bitter. Some will not just spit it out but will try to silence the church. When they think they have done that, they will throw a party.

When the gospel is proclaimed and threatens an idol, sin or something we have grown to love, it can be a torment to the soul. How do you respond when the light of God's word exposes your idol, sin, etc.? Do you thank God and trust Him? Do you make excuses? Do you respond with violent rejection?

The path of the believer is similar to that of Jesus who strengthens our resolve by telling us beforehand that we will suffer. (John 15) The synonym for "witness" in the Greek dictionary is "martyr." Isn't this true of the believer now? Do you wrestle with fear? As a believer, you have lost your life already by giving it to Jesus, setting us free from fear. (<u>Luke 9:24</u>)

• Resurrection. The enemy thought that he had silenced Jesus when Jesus died on the cross and was put in the tomb. The enemy was wrong - one the third day, Jesus rose.

There are times when the church may look like it's on life support, and the world thinks that they have destroyed it. But the church is indestructible! (Matthew 16:18) God will keep the lampstand shining.

It is God Who resurrects the unbelieving heart as well. God is our Ruler, but if we are not trusting Him, loving Him or seeking to submit to Him, we are rejecting His good rule over us. We, by default, want to do what we want to do. Our rebellion calls for a response. Jesus died for sinners. (Romans 5:8) He rose to offer life, forgiveness, and reconciliation. Turn from your sin and self-reliance and trust Christ.

• Vindication. We live today, hearing the six trumpets of judgments. They have been sounding their warning since Jesus came the first time, graciously calling us to repent and believe. The seventh trumpet marks the end of history.

In chapter six the martyrs asked, "How long?" (6:10) with the seventh trumpet, that time has come. At that time, all things will be made new, and all wrongs will be made right. All tears will be wiped away. Those who are outside of Christ will be judged. Those who believe will know God's gracious reward.

Years before losing his life in Ecuador, Jim Elliot wrote in his journal, "He is no fool who gives what he cannot keep to gain what he cannot lose." Jim Elliot may have lost his life, but he never lost his God.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at fbcum.org

Family Guide for week of June 16th

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
