# **Praying with First Baptist Church**

A Prayer Guide for the week of July 21

## Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Colossians 1:12 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to give thanks to God for the work He has done in the brothers and sisters in Christ in our church family.

"we have not ceased to pray for you... giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

# Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

## Prayer items outside our church:

 Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)

Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

# Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 15:1-16:21

"Seven Bowls of Wrath" – July 21, 2024



#### Introduction

What is your heart's response to the Bible's teaching of God's judgment or His wrath? Do you see it as something that is good or bad? Is it a truth that you are thankful for or embarrassed by?

God's wrath is not an out-of-control rage from wounded pride. It isn't a divine temper tantrum. It is a strong and settled opposition to all that is evil that arises out of His very nature. It is a burning zeal for what is right coupled with a hatred for what is evil.

Some will curse God for His judgment. Those in Heaven will praise Him for His judgment. Why is that? What do the heavenly residents see? Why can we praise God for His judgment this morning?

#### **Sermon Outline**

- 1. God's judgment sets us free from the judgment of others. 15:1-4
- 2. God's judgment sets the record straight. 15:5-8

#### **Read & Discuss**

### 1. Read 15:1-4

In this text, John will use the Old Testament template of the plagues in Egypt that led to the exodus to point toward a second exodus. These bowls focus on the end of history and escalate in intensity. God's people were slaves in Egypt for 400 years. (Genesis 15:13-16) He finally sends Moses to lead His people out of slavery. The ten plagues we see in Exodus are a "showdown" with one of gods of Egypt. It is really a "smack down" because God is shown to be the One true God. Salvation of God's people came through judgment of the Egyptians.

The beast harasses and kills Christians. That might seem like a defeat, but vs. 2 shows the opposite. They have conquered. In chapter 14, judgment for the wicked was unbearable, but God's people have passed through. If you are trusting in Jesus, you WILL conquer the beast. Jesus' victory is our victory! What is an appropriate response to knowing that we are victorious with Jesus and will make it to the end, loved and safe? What are some songs that remind you of this victory?

Jesus' death and resurrection means that Satan has been cast down already. Our enemy is a defeated foe. Why should we fear him? Some people want to get rid of or ignore God's judgment. Without God as Judge - everyone is judge. Instead of freedom, we are paralyzed by what others think of us. These would be tyrannical standards that are impossible to live by. God's judgment sets us free from the fear of man. (1 Corinthians 4:3-4)

What those in heaven see clearly, we see faintly. We gather to remind ourselves of Who God is and that it is His opinion that matters. We can rest in that.

### 2. Read 15:5-8

The bowls of God's wrath come from "the sanctuary of the tent of witness." It is where God's presence was in the tabernacle or the temple in the Old Testament and where the tablets with the ten commandments were housed. God's law reveals who He created us to be and warns the wicked. We are made in God's image, but our tendency is to make Him in our image, assuming that God is "ok" with our sin. We confuse God's patience that leads to repentance with approval. Sin has deceived us.

God sets the record straight with His judgment. We will be held accountable for our sin which is more offensive, destructive, and wicked than we imagine it to be. However, the lies of Satan will not have the final word. Have you considered the gravity of sin? Have you reflected on God's perfect holiness? God's judgment is an expression of His holiness, billowing out on the earth and refining what is wicked.

Sin makes the world feel unsafe and ruined. As God's judgment leaves the temple in these bowls and light dispels darkness, His judgments will cleanse the world of evil and darkness. He will be our temple.

We see this, but hard things happen all the time. Do those hard things leave you asking, "Where is God?" As God pulls back the curtain for John, we see that God sets the record straight. God will make it right.

### 3. Read 16:1-11

The first four bowl judgments are poured out on nature - the earth, the sea, fresh water sources, and the sun. Here, God's judgment turn creation against people. Do you hear the echo of the ten plagues from Exodus? Just as those ten plagues show that the idols of Egypt are worthless, these bowl judgments show the futility of trusting the things we turn into idols. These judgments expand and intensify. Sometime before Jesus returns, there will be an intensification. We don't know when this will happen. We need to be ready and trust God.

The fifth bowl is poured out on the Beast. We should be thankful for the state even though it is imperfect. It is made up of fallen people and can be corrupted by the beast. Sometimes in a fallen world guilty people go free. The fifth bowl reminds us that no crooked official will get away with their sin. This is God's answer to the martyrs from chapter six. (Revelation 6:10)

Have you been sinned against leaving ruin, hurt and pain in your life? Do you want justice? Taking vengeance into our own hands will make a mess. You can become nasty and bitter. We were not meant to carry the burden of vengeance. (Romans 12:17-19) God will bring about perfect justice either in Hell or at the cross of Jesus. Jesus took on the wrath of God. We can forgive those who have sinned against us and trust God to vindicate.

### 4. Read 16:12-21

Here we see the nations gather to declare war on God at Armageddon. This is a final push to rage against God. The images here look like a horror movie. The frogs are a revolting image of spiritual deceit and false teaching. False teaching is meant to look good, but it is deceptive. A Christian who drifts from the faith may think that the false teaching looks plausible but verses 13 and 14 paint a different picture showing the revolting, grotesque, demonic influence of false teaching. Paul describes Satan as the prince of the power of the air. (Ephesians 2:2) The seventh bowl is poured out on the air. The final judgment marks the end of the world's deceit, destruction, and evil and its impact on the world.

How can God's judgment highlight His love? We see God's wrath BECAUSE of His love for His own. Sometimes wrath IS an expression of love. God loves us with a costly love. He sent Jesus to die on the cross. Jesus drank the cup of God's wrath to the dregs. Do you want to know how much God loves you? Look to the cross. This is where God's love and justice meet.

Those upon whom God pours out His justice did not repent. God gave them time. He was patient, but they refused and will face His judgment. We do not know when Jesus will come, but He is coming. His heart is not to curse, but to bless. He doesn't delight in the death of the wicked. He wants people to come to Him. He loves us that much. (John 3:16) We must put on the garments of His righteousness to be ready for the final judgment. Everything that is necessary for our salvation was accomplished by Jesus on the cross. All that remains is for us to turn from our sin and trust Christ. Do you hear Jesus' invitation to come to Him? He will keep you safe.

### **Prayer of Response**

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

# Family Guide for week of July 21st, 2024

## Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
  do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
  pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
