Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of July 28

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Colossians 1:12 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to give thanks to God for the work He has done in the brothers and sisters in Christ in our church family.

"we have not ceased to pray for you... giving thanks to the Father, who has qualified you to share in the inheritance of the saints in light."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

 Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)

- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1
 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

- Pray that God would help our church family use the summer season for unique opportunities
 of evangelism, to build each other up, and to love one another well (Rom. 12:9-21)

- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 17:1-18

"The Seduction of Evil" – July 28, 2024



Introduction

God's word uses language in different ways. For example, in <u>Proverbs 26:11</u> we see some very graphic language about the failure to learn a lesson and repeating folly. Reading this type of language can be shocking, but it wakes us up to sin in ourselves and in the world. The book of Revelation does the same thing - waking us up to make us alert.

Deception, threats, and seduction come to us in different ways. Here, the curtain is pulled back, and the true nature of the enemy is revealed. May God awaken our hearts, making us alert to the seduction of the world.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Recognize the true nature of the world. Vs. 1-7

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1 - 7

Theologically, every Christian is engaged to be married. It might feel like a long engagement, but in <u>Revelation 19</u>, we will walk into a wedding feast. Yet here, we are introduced to another woman who is called the prostitute. She is bad news. Her goal is to get the church to be unfaithful.

This prostitute is Babylon the great. (<u>Daniel 4:30</u>). She has seduced rulers and unbelievers using the idol of money and wealth and everything that it can buy. She promises a certain lifestyle of pleasure, financial security and success, but she is looking to enslave people to herself. She has a global influence. Babylon is the world system that is opposed to God and that tries to seduce people away from trusting Jesus.

She looks desirable, representing everything that money can buy. She presents herself as good, moral, and religious. She appears to be harmless. Even John marvels at her. (vs. 6) On the surface, sin looks, tastes and feels good. That is why it is tempting, but it is only for a moment. John gets closer and sees her true nature. She is full of abominations and impurities. What happens to those who refuse to "get in bed with her?" (vs. 6) She is drunk with the blood of the saints.

What are some of the temptations and sins you struggle with? Have you considered that you struggle with the idol of money? Living in America, compared to the rest of the world, we have vast amounts of wealth and prosperity, so we might be blind to our own materialism. Knowing that the world seduces people into the idolatry of wealth, we need to talk about money and hear God's word about wealth. What does it look like for us to worship God with our time, talent and treasure? If we don't recognize the true nature of the world we will become "drunk" with the things of world, indifferent to sin and the coming judgment. How can we recognize if we have fallen in love with the world? Consider the following:

- When nothing else demands your attention, what do you daydream about?
- Where do you spend your money most effortlessly? (Matthew 6:21)
- How do you respond to unanswered prayer or frustrated hope? Do you get angry? Despair?
- What are your most uncontrollable emotions? Anger? Fear? Depression? Feelings of significance?

To be a human is to be a worshiper. The question is not will you worship, but who or what will you worship? Take time this week to look into the mirror of God's word. Be honest, confess and flee from the temptation.

2. Read vs. 8-14

The beast we see here is the same beast we saw in chapter 13 - sent by the state to corrupt. He mimics Jesus. (Vs. 8; 11) Satan is active, spitting out lies seeking to steal, kill and destroy his prey. (John 10:10a)

However, he is a defeated foe, given a mortal wound at the cross of Christ.

Many will not realize that the Beast is a counterfeit Christ. The Beast is any nation, in any generation, who is corrupting the state. Some will assume that John is talking about specific leaders or specific empires. There will be a surge of wickedness before Christ's return. This is a wakeup call, reminding people that the end is near. God is guiding history to His appointed end. Opposition against God will intensify.

There are so many details in Revelation that distract us from the clear point that John is making. The Beast is a sham! He and the prostitute will lose in the end. (vs. 8) The end of the Beast is destruction. (Vs. 11) The Lamb conquers! (vs. 14) He is King of kings and Lord of lords! The world's seduction can be powerful, but it will soon fade away. Look at their end. Knowing how things will end, should shape how we live today. God wins!! We don't need to fear. We should pity the world and share the gospel.

Additional Reading: Psalm 37

3. Read vs. 15-18

The alliance of Babylon, the Beast and the kings represent the corrupt state, ungodly rulers, and a false religion. Here we see their alliance fall apart as they turn on each other.

What should we do with the world's seductions that look normal? (18:4) Come out of the world! How? It isn't enough to just have willpower. We need the "explosive power of a new affection." We need somewhere better to go. We need the superior promise of a superior Savior!

Famous people are just people, but Jesus is THE King! He rules over history - every bit - including the evil choices of a wicked enemy. (vs. 17) Lesser kings may think they are in charge. They may talk a big game, but Jesus is the One in charge.

Those who killed Jesus assumed that they were steering the ship. They meant it for evil, but God meant it for good. (<u>John 3:16</u>) All have sinned and are guilty deserving of Hell. God had a plan to redeem mankind. The words of God will be fulfilled. The world promises love, but you end up with regret and death. God promises life. Jesus laid down His life that we might live. (<u>John 10:10b</u>) Who do you serve? (<u>Matthew 6:24</u>) You must choose. Humble yourself; turn from your sin and come to Jesus.

Additional Reading: Acts 2

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of July 28th, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
