*History of the Nicene Creed

Knowing the historical context of the Nicene Creed of 325 A.D. can help us appreciate the truths it declares. In the early fourth century, a preacher named Arius began to teach false doctrine such as: 1) God the Father alone is God; 2) Jesus Christ is a created being; and 3) there was a time when Christ did not exist. About 220 elders gathered in the town of Nicaea (in modern-day Turkey) to address Arius' false teaching. They wrote a brief statement in biblical language to clarify that Christians believe Jesus Christ is fully God, and that those who believe and teach anything less lack biblical faith. We have omitted one paragraph that condemns a particular false teaching of the time.

At First Baptist Church, we believe Scripture teaches that at the center of our faith is Christ, Himself. Therefore, we rejoice in joining with saints through the centuries who have confessed the same biblical truth.

Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of September 22

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Ephesians 3:14-16:

¹⁴ For this reason I bow my knees before the Father,
 ¹⁵ from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named,
 ¹⁶ that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being,

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 20:1-10

"Reigning with Jesus" - September 22, 2024



Introduction

Do you believe that God is sovereign? Do you believe that it is worth it to live for Jesus? On the Christian journey, there are times of discouragement, confusion, sadness, hurt, along with feelings of inadequacy. In those times, knowing that God is sovereign and that living for Jesus is worth it will help you make it on your pilgrimage to heaven. Obeying Jesus comes at a cost.

The early church was well acquainted with suffering and persecution. Many Christians suffer persecution today. In counting the cost, how can we know that following Jesus is worth it?

Sermon Outline

- 1. See God's sovereignty over all things. Vs. 1-3
- 2. Know those who trust God to the end are blessed. Vs. 4-6
- 3. Take comfort in the enemy's defeat. Vs. 7-10

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-3

Remember the main point of Revelation - Jesus is coming back, and He is and will be victorious. We can have different views about the order of things, but we must remember and agree that Jesus returns; He is victorious, and He will judge the living and the dead. We must approach this passage with humility, asking God to illuminate our hearts with truth.

The battle that is mentioned here is mentioned three times in Revelation. It is the same event told from different perspectives – the prostitute, the dragon and the beast. (16:14-16; 19:17-21; 20:7-10) In Chapter 19 verse 18, all of those who are defeated are named. At the end of the battle in chapter 19, the enemy is completely defeated.

Prior to the battle, Satan is bound, but when? (<u>Matthew 12:29</u>; <u>Luke 10:18</u>) A certain binding of Satan - a restriction of his power - occurred during Jesus' ministry. God in His sovereignty restricted what Satan could do. It happened during the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus.

The numbers used in the book of Revelation are symbolic. A thousand is indicative of completeness. The thousand years is symbolic of the Church Age. Why, then, is Satan wreaking havoc now? (1 Peter 5:8; 2 Corinthians, 4:4; Ephesians 6:16) God is restricting him. There is a "leash" on Satan.

The book of Acts marks the spread of the Gospel to the uttermost parts of the earth. People all over the world began coming to Jesus. Churches were and are being established. How? Satan is bound so that he might not deceive the nations any longer, and the gospel moves beyond the Jewish people to the Gentiles. God is in control over ALL things. We have churches all over the world by God's amazing grace. (John 12:31-32)

Are you ever discouraged in your evangelism? Those in Corinth rejected Paul. Though discouraged. God told him to keep preaching. There are people who will come to Christ. God will build His church, and the gates of Hell will not prevail against it! (Matthew 16:18) The gospel will advance. People will trust Christ. The church will move forward. This is God's promise, and it is our hope! We need to keep sharing the Good News.

Additional Reading: Acts 18

2. Read vs. 4-6

Here, John saw thrones. Where are the thrones? They are heavenly thrones. Who is seated on the throne? The souls of the martyrs and those who were trusting God at the end.

How do you think the first century Christians felt knowing that some in their midst would face martyrdom? How do we feel when we see our Christian brothers and sisters die? It looks like the world is winning when a believer dies as a martyr or in the prime of their ministry. What you see with your eyes is not the whole picture. It is impossible to

defeat Christians! The loss of their physical life puts them on the throne with Jesus! Death is not the end!! They are wearing a crown. They are priests of God who will reign with Jesus until He returns.

Jesus not only saves His people, but He also shares His rule with them until He returns! The second death has no power of these saints. This is why they are blessed. God's blessing captures all that our hearts long for.

Are you tempted to go after the trappings of the world? This is exhausting. For the Christian, death is the doorway to reigning with Christ. We do not need to fear death. We can give generously, love sacrificially, and serve selflessly. There is something worse than death and better than life on earth. We will all die. That is the first death. The death mentioned here is the second death - God's final judgment.

How do you view sin? It is much worse than a simple mistake - it is rebellion. The standard to which we are held is not the person sitting next to you. It is the standard of God's perfection and holiness. Left to ourselves - we are in trouble. This is why Jesus came. He lived a perfect life and took the death we deserved so that those who trust in Him could be forgiven and reconciled to God. Turn from your sin and come to Jesus. Trust Him completely.

3. Read vs. 7 – 10

Before the return of Christ, there will be a surge in satanic activity. As the battle lines are drawn here, it seems like the enemy has an advantage. They gather myriads of troops to surround the saints. Yet as soon as the battle starts - it is over. The enemy is defeated. Jesus speaks, and it is over!

You cannot rebel against the Creator God and win. Have you ever looked back on any of your sins thinking it was worth it? Do you see the seriousness of sin? Sin promises a lot but does not deliver. Ditch the liar and run to Jesus. May these verses be a warning to those who haven't trusted Jesus and an encouragement to those who have. It is worth following Jesus to the very end.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of September 22nd, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
