A Prayer Guide for the week of October 13

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Philippians 1:3-6 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. This is a great prayer to use as you pray through the church directory for your church family this week.

³ I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, ⁴ always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, ⁵ because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those effected by natural disasters around the world, especially recent hurricanes
 through the Southeast U.S. Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life.
 Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to
 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 21:1-8

"God Will Wipe Away All Tears" – October 13, 2024



Introduction

Waiting is hard. Waiting in vain is unbearable, and suffering adds unbelievable pressure. We can be tempted to think we are waiting in vain and can be tempted to take the sinful short cuts. We need to have the right perspective as we wait for the end. (Romans 8:19)

Imagine the joys of heaven. Put them on a scale and compare it to the suffering you experience today. Suffering isn't small, but the eternal glory is huge!! Satan wants to deceive us about heaven. He wants us to believe that this life is our only chance for happiness. Here, God pulls back the curtains to see a new Heaven and a new earth to give us hope in our suffering.

In a world that is groaning under the burden of sin, how can we hold fast to hope?

Sermon Outline

- 1. See the new Heaven and the new Earth. Vs. 1-4
- 2. Believe what God's Word says about His glorious plan. Vs. 5-8

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1 - 4

The world we live in now is groaning under the curse of sin. When Jesus comes again, the old order will have passed away making room for the new. The earth doesn't transform into a mere spiritual existence - the physical world will be made new. Jesus' resurrected body is an example. (Luke 24:39) He was still Jesus, but He was in a new, glorified body. Your eternal state will be the same - a resurrected, glorified, physical body. Creation will be set free. (Romans 8:21)

Is it hard to wrap your mind around what this will be like? It is so good and so glorious that it will make us forget the sorrows of this life. Chaos and conflicts will be gone. Threats to the people of God will be no more.

In chapters 17 and 18, we saw a different city - Babylon with its sin and ruin and darkness. It is hard to fight against the seduction of that city. The new city is a holy city. What Abraham longed for is revealed here. (Hebrews 11:10) A place is prepared for God's people. (John 14:1-3)

When you think about heaven, do you look forward to it? What gets you excited about Heaven? We can't limit our view of Heaven to our imagination, desires or demands. God will dwell His people! (vs. 3) This summarizes the entire message of the Bible. In Genesis 1 and 2, Heaven and earth were together. In Genesis 3, sin entered the picture, and there was separation causing creation to groan under the curse of sin. God never abandoned "plan A." His plan was to send a Redeemer to bring people back into relationship with Him. The Exodus, the tabernacle and the temple were all shadows of what God would do to restore a relationship and dwell with mankind.

Then Jesus came to dwell among us. (<u>John 1:14</u>) He came to reconcile us to God. All of scripture and thousands of years of history have longed for and waited for what we see in verse three - God Himself will be with them! That is what makes Heaven heavenly.

Are you challenged by this text? We are tempted every day to love and be comfortable with the things of the world. We must see Heaven as God wants us to see it. The pleasures of this world get old, decay and die. We were made for more than these things. God's new world will never get old. Knowing the infinite God never gets old. There will always be new, exciting and thrilling things because God is infinitely glorious.

Is God what gets you excited about Heaven? This side of heaven, our experience of this hope goes up and

down; we must fight for it. This text reminds us that one day your faith will be sight, and your heart will only love and enjoy God as He is deserving of.

Being with God is an experience like you've never known. God will be so close to you, so attentive, that He Himself will wipe away every tear!! He will banish all mourning and all crying. You will no longer shed tears of pain, loss, or sin. Sorrow and sighing will flee. (Isaiah 35:10) Why? Because God will dwell with man and remove everything that keeps you from Him. God will rejoice over you. (Isaiah 62:5)

2. Read vs. 5 - 8

God promises that He is making ALL things new. You will be made new spiritually and morally. There will be no more fighting sin. Your cold heart will be transformed into a heart who absolutely and perfectly knows and loves God.

You will also be made new physically and bodily. The blind will see. The deaf will hear. Work will be fruitful. God will remove everything that has separated us from Him and make all things new. How can we know that this is true and not a "pipe dream"?

Because God promises it in <u>verse five</u>. He tells John, "Write this down...These words are trustworthy and true." He stakes his reputation on it in <u>verse six</u>. He is the Beginning and the End. God always was. Everything that exists owes its existence to God. One day, everything will answer to Him. He is the end - the goal of all things. God is the Author of all history, and He will bring it to its desired end. (<u>Romans 11:36</u>)

Everyone wants to be satisfied and know contentment, but we cannot rely on earthly pleasures. It is only God Who can satisfy. When Adam fell, all humanity fell with him. All humanity looks for a way to quench their thirst apart from God, but only God can quench that thirst. Does your heart long for God to center? (Psalm 73:25-26) Is God your portion? Your choice? Your treasure?

<u>Verse eight</u> has a sober warning for those who aren't trusting in Jesus but trusting in idolatrous short cuts. If you look in the mirror of God's word in verse eight, please take God's warning seriously. Are you at war with sin? Or are you in a pursuit to quench your thirst with the things of this world?

Turn to Jesus. He took our sin that separates us from God. It's not enough to just know this. You cannot pay for the water of life. You cannot earn it. The water of life is given freely to those who realize they are spiritually broken. Come to God - empty and needy - knowing that only God can satisfy. If you turn from your sin, God will embrace you as Father.

The absence of hope is despair. We need a biblical vision of Heaven. (Psalm 27:13) Do you believe God's promise? Do you believe that all those who trust in God will see Him? Yes? Then, wait on the Lord. (Psalm 27:14) If you have this hope, you need to share it. Does your heart break for those who have not come to Jesus? Who do you know that needs to hear the message of the Gospel? We must share this good news and pray for them to come and know the satisfaction of the waters of life.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at fbcum.org

Family Guide for week of October 13th, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
