A Prayer Guide for the week of October 20

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Philippians 1:3-6 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. This is a great prayer to use as you pray through the church directory for your church family this week.

³ I thank my God in all my remembrance of you, ⁴ always in every prayer of mine for you all making my prayer with joy, ⁵ because of your partnership in the gospel from the first day until now. ⁶ And I am sure of this, that he who began a good work in you will bring it to completion at the day of Jesus Christ.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those effected by natural disasters around the world, especially recent hurricanes
 through the Southeast U.S. Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life.
 Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to
 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)



God's Word for God's People

Mark 9:14-29

"I Believe, Help My Unbelief" – October 20, 2024



Introduction

A church retreat is a very special time. They can include gospel conversations, special times of teaching and individual time focused on the Lord. These "mountain top experiences" are very special. But it is important to be prepared to come down from the mountain. Returning to the "real world" can be tough. This chapter in Mark contains the ultimate mountain top experience.

Jesus invited Peter, James and John to the top of the mountain where He was transfigured. The three disciples saw Jesus in His resplendent glory talking to Elijah and Moses. They wanted to stay, but they had to come down – they were needed. At some point, you must leave the high point of being alone with God to come down to the reality of earth. You must be prepared.

Sermon Outline

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 14-18

As soon as the group came down the mountain, they saw the other disciples and a large crowd. There was obviously a problem. The reality of a mountain top experience is that it doesn't change the circumstances of life, but it can change how we deal with the circumstances.

The scribes saw Jesus as a threat to their power, influence and status. They probably took pleasure in the failure of the disciples to heal the demon possessed boy. The crowd became quiet when Jesus showed up, and the father of the boy stated the problem.

Demons are real, created beings who have pledged their allegiance to Satan. They oppose the authority of God, distort the words of God and promote unbelief. They create doubt. We don't have to look far to see evidence of demonic activity. Yet they do not possess the same attributes as the Creator. They are on a leash - only allowed to go as far as a sovereign God allows them to go.

In the gospel records of the earthly ministry of Jesus, we see a concentration of demonic possession. We see this a lot in the "rapid fire" accounts of Jesus' activity in the beginning of the gospel of Mark. However, here in chapter 9, things slow down.

Take time to take in the glory of the transfiguration, but then connect with the reality of coming down off the mountain. Do you feel the desperation of the father? Take notice of the strong language the father used to describe the oppression of the son. This was a violent demonic attack on this child. This agony is very hard to internalize. It is uncomfortable to read. Is it any surprise that this father would bring his son to Jesus?

2. Read vs. 19 - 27

The overarching theme in this text is all about unbelief. We see the unbelief of the scribes - questioning. Jesus, marveling at their unbelief, asked three "how long" questions. However, even in His frustration, there is patience, mercy, and compassion. Jesus asked that the boy be brought to Him.

It is interesting to note that the demon was the only one here that had no doubt about who Jesus is, but the demon was in complete rebellion toward Jesus. Jesus asked how long the demon had seized the boy, yet He is omniscient. Jesus wasn't looking for information. He was looking to connect with this man on a human level, calling him to pour out all his pain and helplessness. Jesus was drawing out the deepest root of unbelief. What hard circumstances of life tempt you to doubt God? Do you pour out your heart to Him?

The demon was relentless. The father had the added layer of watchfulness and care to keep the boy from being killed by the demon, so the father was crying out for Jesus to help him AND the boy. Jesus responded with compassion. The father cried out with an honest response - "I believe, help my unbelief!"

Even the most faith-filled Christian has imperfect faith at times. We all struggle to believe. If you study any of the champions of faith from Hebrews 11, you will notice that they struggled. Our struggle with unbelief sometimes happens every day, every hour, or every moment. What causes you to sink into the abyss of "what if" questions of fear and doubt?

The father cried out in honesty and humility to help him believe when it was impossible to believe. Jesus demanded the demon to come out. The boy fell as though he was dead, and Jesus was the only one who could lift him up.

Without the grace of God, we look like a corpse until we look to a God who can pick us up. (Ephesians 2:1-8) We are dead in our trespasses and sins. He raises us up. Jesus alone can lift you up and save you from your desperate situation because He was lifted up because of your desperate situation. Acknowledge your unbelief and come to Him. He will lift you up.

Additional Reading: Hebrews 11

3. Read vs. 28 - 29

The spotlight was now on the disciples here. They wanted to know why they failed. Previously, they had been commissioned to go and spread the good news and cast out demons. Did they doubt the power of their authority? Did they doubt each other? Did the mockery of the scribes affect them? Whatever it was, Jesus revealed the true source - their prayerlessness.

Jesus was not saying that they needed something special or advanced. They had become so confident in their own ability that they forgot that desperate times call for desperate prayer. Wisdom, patience, faith, etc. to be on this Christian journey comes only from desperate prayer. How is your prayer life? Do you go to God with all your daily needs and desperate situations? What do you need to take to Him in prayer today?

We struggle now with doubts and fears. We must remember that one day, the demons will be vanquished. There will be no more doubting because our faith will become sight. This is our hope!

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of October 20th, 2024

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
