Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of November 17

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as an inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Colossians 1:9a-10:

"9 And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you...

10 to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him:
bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those effected by natural disasters around the world, especially recent hurricanes
 through the Southeast U.S. Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life.
 Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to
 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Praise God for two very fruitful mission trips by teams from our church over the past few
 months (South Africa & Bangkok, Thailand). Both teams were able to care for and serve the
 local churches and pastors they were working with as well as identify potential ways we can
 continue to meet needs there in the future. Continue to pray that God would strengthen the
 leaders and members of these churches and that the Gospel would flourish through their
 ministry. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)
- Pray for our ministry leaders, deacons, and elders during this budget season as they pray and prepare a budget to present to the church next month. Pray for wisdom and a God-centered vision for how to use the resources that God has given our church. (James 1:5)
- Pray for our church family as we consider amendments to our church constitution. Pray that
 we would work together to comprehend and establish God's good design for the church and
 center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)
- Pray that our church family would not grow weary of doing good. Pray that we would live
 and interact with one another in a way that reveals God's steadfast love and mercy to the
 world. (Gal 6:9)
- Pray God would guard our church from fear, anxiety, and disunity. Pray that we would trust that God is good and be assured that He is in control. (John 13:34-35)

Revelation: Following Our Victorious King

Revelation 1 – 22

"The Revelation of Jesus Christ" – November 17, 2024



Introduction

As we have walked through the book of Revelation, we have encountered angels, demons, a great red dragon, a beast, scorpion tailed locust and a man whose eyes blazed like fire. When you see these details, you may want to look at it as a prophetic crystal ball. Yet John makes it clear that the purpose of the book is a call to endurance. Keep going! Don't give up! Don't cave to the temptations of the world, the flesh, and the devil that come at us daily.

Satan couldn't defeat Jesus at the cross, so he set his sights on the church. Satan hates the church. He uses the beast to corrupt the government. He uses the false prophet to corrupt religion by false teaching. He uses Babylon, the world system opposed to God, with wealth, luxury and pleasure to seduce people into unbelief. We are not on neutral ground. We have an enemy who wants us to give up and stop following Jesus. This book is a call to endure. But how will it strengthen us? It is THE revelation of **Jesus Christ**. It is a book inspired by God to show us Jesus Christ, so that we don't get weary and lose heart.

It is possible to get to the end of this sermon series and be overwhelmed with all we have heard. Today, we are going to zoom out to see three pictures of Jesus that will pull everything together and help us endure.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Jesus, the all-sufficient Son of Man Chapters 1-3
- 2. Jesus, the sin-cleansing Lion and Lamb Chapters 4-20
- 3. Jesus, the Faithful Groom Who brings hope and a home Chapters 21 & 22

Read & Discuss

1. Read Chapters 1 – 3

In Chapter one, John sees Jesus in the middle of the lampstands as one like the Son of Man. (1:12) This is an important image. We see it in <u>Daniel 7</u>. The Son of Man received glory, authority, and sovereign power along with a reign that will not end. Jesus has all power, resources and wisdom to rule the universe. (1:9-16) He is not weak and fragile. He is the all-powerful, all-knowing, all-sufficient Son of God.

In <u>verse 13</u>, we see this picture of Jesus amid the seven lampstands. Why? So that we may know that He is not some far, distant ruler. He knows what is going on in your life and in our church. He is not indifferent. He cares. He encourages, corrects and strengthens the church. (Revelation 2-3)

Each letter to the churches begins with a specific attribute of Jesus from the previous verses that they need to see and believe. How does this apply to us? At different points, we may see different aspects of ourselves in each of the seven churches. He tells ALL the churches to conquer. How? Every church that has ever existed needs help, just as these churches did.

How does seeing Jesus help us and strengthen us? "He who has an ear, let him hear." He is talking about hearing God's voice in God's word and then responding with obedience and trust. The Spirit opens the eyes of our hearts, and we see Jesus. When we do this, our fear disappears, and we are transformed. Bible reading and prayer are part of a living relationship with a living God. As we read God's word, pray that God will open your eyes to see the wonderful things about God. Do you have a regular Bible reading plan? Do you have a regular time of prayer?

2. Read Chapters 4 – 20

Do you ever want to give up because of our sin? Does living in a fallen world with pain, sorrow, sickness, and death lead you to wonder where God is? In chapter 4, God pulls back the curtain, and we see Him on the throne. We need to look at all the circumstances in our life through this lens and remember that God is in control.

In the next seventeen chapters, we see three sets of judgments. In chapter 5, John sees a scroll that contains all of God's plans for the salvation of His people and judgment. To open the scroll means to put these plans into action. If no one can open it, all of creation is stuck in the curse of sin. John is told to "Behold - the Lion of the Tribe of Judah has conquered" and He can open the scroll. (5:5) When John turns to look at the Lion, he sees a

Lamb looking as though He had been slain. Jesus IS the Lion and the Lamb, uniquely qualified to open the scroll.

As He opens them, we see war, conquest, famine, and death. We see these now and will continue to see them until Jesus returns. Knowing that He has opened the seals guarantees that He is in control over every good thing and every bad thing that happens in life. He is sovereign over the small things and every big thing. He can repurpose our suffering for good. He is testing the genuineness of our faith, leaving behind a pure and living faith. Our anguish will end in life and in joy that no one can touch.

What if our suffering ends in physical death? (Chapter 5) How can we be confident in God's protection if our suffering ends in death? Our biggest problem isn't physical death; it is a spiritual one. No one can stand before a holy God on the day of judgment. (6:16-17) He knows our sin - everything good we haven't done and all the bad we have done. Only those who have dipped their robes in the blood of the Lamb. We cannot get the stain of sin out by ourselves. It is only through Jesus Who gave His life for ours. If you confess your sin and come to Christ in repentance and faith, He will protect and shield you by His presence. (7:15-17)

The trumpet judgements are God's gracious warnings. (Chapters 8-9; 12) The two chapter pause in the judgments (Chapter 10-11) shows us God's patience, calling people to repent. We are called to shine the light of the good news of the gospel to all nations. This message was received with a mixed response. Some will die for their faith, but persecution cannot destroy the church - it strengthens the church, and it grows. (Revelation 12:11) With whom do you need to share this good news?

What if the wicked don't repent? What if God's people are still persecuted? The bowl judgments show us that all wrongs will be made right. (Chapter 16-19) All of God's enemies will be defeated and cast into the lake of fire. Jesus is a Lion who conquers His enemies, but He is also the Lamb who was slain. What is amazing and surprising is how He conquers sin, Satan and Death - The Lion conquers by dying as a Lamb, purifying and protecting a people for Himself. He will bring perfect justice. (5:11-13)

3. Read Chapters 21 – 22

Are you discouraged? Often, the trials of life chip away at our spirit. Throughout scripture, Jesus is pictured as a groom. Right now, we are betrothed, and we are waiting. John sees the day when we will be joined to the Groom. (21:1-4)

We can become so accustomed to being let down that we become cynical. We expect people to be untrustworthy. As we wait, we may assume this of God as well. Even after a couple of good days, we wonder what bad things are coming. We may feel that way now, but it will not be that way in Heaven. The more you get to know God, the more you will see His goodness. The thing that makes Heaven heavenly **is God**, and He will satisfy! Do you have this hope? Does this hope for tomorrow fuel your living for today?

We all have days when we want to call it quits. Jesus sends the angel to testify of these things to the church. (Revelation 22:16) We gather in obedience to stir each other up to love and good deeds until we see the day approaching. (Hebrews 10:24-25) We must intentionally encourage each other through His word so we might not lose hope.

In a marriage relationship, what's mine is yours. The same is true when you trust in Christ. It's not a fair deal - it's grace. Jesus took our penalty. He paid it in full, so we don't have to. Jesus wins in the end and what is His is ours. He is Lord of lords and King of kings. (Revelation 17:14) We will conquer! Because of Jesus! We can say with John, "AMEN - Come Lord Jesus!!"

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of November 17th, 2024

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
