¹Therefore, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses, let us also lay aside every weight, and sin which clings so closely, and let us run with endurance the race that is set before us, ² looking to Jesus, the founder and perfecter of our faith, who for the joy that was set before him endured the cross, despising the shame, and is seated at the right hand of the throne of God.

³ Consider him who endured from sinners such hostility against himself, so that you may not grow weary or fainthearted. ⁴ In your struggle against sin you have not yet resisted to the point of shedding your blood. ⁵ And have you forgotten the exhortation that addresses you as sons?

Shall we not much more be subject to the Father of spirits and live? ¹⁰ For they disciplined us for a short time as it seemed best to them, but he disciplines us for our good, that we may share his holiness. ¹¹ For the moment all discipline seems painful rather than pleasant, but later it yields the peaceful fruit of righteousness to those who have been trained by it.

¹² Therefore lift your drooping hands and strengthen your weak knees, ¹³ and make straight paths for your feet, so that what is lame may not be put out of joint but rather be healed. ¹⁴ Strive for peace with everyone, and for the holiness without which no one will see the Lord. ¹⁵ See to it that no one fails to obtain the grace of God; that no "root of bitterness" springs up and causes trouble, and by it many become defiled;

Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of November 24

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as an inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Colossians 1:9a-10:

"9 And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you...

10 to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him:
bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those effected by natural disasters around the world, especially recent hurricanes
 through the Southeast U.S. Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life.
 Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to
 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Praise God for two very fruitful mission trips by teams from our church over the past few
 months (South Africa & Bangkok, Thailand). Both teams were able to care for and serve the
 local churches and pastors they were working with as well as identify potential ways we can
 continue to meet needs there in the future. Continue to pray that God would strengthen the
 leaders and members of these churches and that the Gospel would flourish through their
 ministry. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)
- Pray for our ministry leaders, deacons, and elders during this budget season as they pray and prepare a budget to present to the church next month. Pray for wisdom and a God-centered vision for how to use the resources that God has given our church. (James 1:5)
- Pray for our church family as we consider amendments to our church constitution. Pray that we would work together to comprehend and establish God's good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)
- Pray God would guard our church from fear, anxiety, and disunity. Pray that we would trust that God is good and be assured that He is in control. (John 13:34-35)



Christmas According to Ruth

Ruth 1

"Wrestling with Bitterness" – November 24, 2024



Introduction

Very soon, families will gather for the holidays. Decorations will be put up. You will hear the song, "It's the most wonderful time of the year" and be told to be of good cheer. It is our prayer that it is a wonderful season for you, but for some, this season will be filled with tears, complaints, and bitterness. The cheerful atmosphere is a sad reminder of difficult circumstances.

Do you ask why God allows the tears, regret, or sadness in your life? Often the answer to this question is not found on this side of Heaven. Can you love and trust the God who has dealt you this painful hand in your life?

The book of Ruth is a wonderful love story. It is a story of redemption. Ruth was a young woman who trusted God in a difficult situation, traveled to Bethlehem and gave birth to a child who would change the world. This is the Christmas story!

Sermon Outline

1. Scene One: Tragedy Vs. 1 – 5 2. Scene Two: Loyalty Vs. 6 – 17 3. Scene Three: Empty Vs. 18 – 22

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1 - 5

This book takes place in "the days of the Judges," which is more than a time stamp. The last verse of the book of Judges sums up the time period. (Judges 21:25)

God's people were in the promised land. If they followed God, they would be blessed. If they rebelled, there would be discipline which included famine. Elimelech makes the decision to move to Moab where there is food. While their physical need would be met, it was a morally poor decision. In his decision to move to Moab, he wasn't trusting God as King. He is trying to escape from his problem by looking for greener pastures, but he is overlooking the problem of sin in his own heart. Do you ever think that if the circumstances in your life were different that things would be better?

In his attempt to escape tragedy, he moved his family to Moab. Yet tragedy followed - Elimelech died. While this was devastating, Naomi remained in Moab for 10 more years. Maybe they had become comfortable. There was food there. Maybe they stayed because of pride. What would people think of their choice to leave Bethlehem? Have you made a wrong turn in your life? Does pride keep you from admitting it and making it right? It is better to make it right now. Don't let pride stand in the way. (Proverbs 16:18)

Naomi didn't ask for this life - this tragedy. She is a foreigner with no family support. She can't provide for herself or her daughters-in-law. This tragedy sets up the tension for the rest of the book. But it also paints her into a corner. Yet if she wants to live, she must return to Bethlehem.

2. Read vs. 6 - 17

<u>Verse six</u> gives us a glimmer of hope. She decided to return to Bethlehem, hearing that the famine was over. At some point in their journey, Naomi tells her daughters-in-law to return to Moab. This is a heart-wrenching scene.

The Hebrew word for "return" occurs fifteen times in this book. Twelve of those times are in chapter one. This is to get our attention. The book of Ruth is not just about a return trip to the land of Judah. It is a book about returning to God after you have made a wrong turn. So, why was Naomi urging them to go back to Moab? Naomi was going home. It was never the home of Ruth and Orpah. They were outsiders and would be viewed as unclean. It would be tough. It would also be uncomfortable for Naomi as a constant reminder of how she allowed her sons to marry outside the covenant community.

This highlights Naomi's misery. She had nothing to offer the women. She saw God's hand as against her. Blow after blow, wave after wave crushed her. The focus of this scene zeros in on the decision that Orpah and Ruth must make. Naomi couldn't promise them anything. They had to weigh their options - gain Yahweh in Bethlehem and lose everything or go back to Moab to gain everything but lose Yahweh.

Orpah didn't let emotions cloud her decision. She made the sensible, logical choice and returned to Moab. This decision seemed right in her own eyes. Her choice stands as a warning to us today. (Matthw 16:24-26) Ruth makes a different choice. She clung to Naomi. She was ready to leave her land and go with Naomi wherever she was going.

For ten years, Ruth had a front row seat to what God was doing in Naomi's life. All she saw in Naomi's response was bitterness. Somehow, by God's sovereign grace, Ruth trusted in Naomi's God. Her loyal expression of love is found in the beautiful words beginning verse sixteen. Ruth was ready to risk everything, having taken refuge in God. How does a Moabite woman enter this covenant community of God's people? She came in faith, with empty hands. She threw herself on the mercy of God, and God delighted to make her a part of His family.

We come to God the same way that Ruth came to God. (Ephesians 2:11-13) We deserve God's wrath, but Jesus shelters us under His wings. He drank the cup of God's wrath in our place for anyone who would come to Him in faith. Are you willing to come to Him in faith, with empty hands and fall on His mercy? If you come to Him, you will not be turned away.

3. Read vs/ 18-22

How did Naomi respond to Ruth's loyalty? "She said no more" - stopped talking to her - after Ruth's pledge of loyalty, love and courage. Naomi was so hurt by the tragedies of life; she couldn't say a thing. She seemed to just tolerate Ruth.

After being gone for ten years, there was a buzz when Naomi came into town. She described those ten years as "bitter." She was hurting and felt hollow. She left with everything and came back with absolutely nothing. She was angry with God. She said all this even after Ruth's heartfelt vow. Can you put yourself in Ruth's shoes? You have left everything, and this is how you are being talked about?

Before we criticize Naomi, we must remember what she has been through. She was seeing God's providential hand in her suffering. Theologically, she was right. Do you believe that in your life? Do you see God's hand in everything in your life? What she gets wrong is that because God is sovereign and all these tragedies have occurred, God must be against her. This produced a bitter heart, blurring her vision of reality. She was so hurt that she was blind to what God had given her. She couldn't see God's grace - Ruth had come to God and He had visited His people! Has there been a time when the trials of life have left you wondering if God was for you?

There is power in gratitude. Instead of dwelling on what we don't have, gratitude pauses and looks around at what we do have. We look at what God has given - good things that we don't deserve. Is your heart filled with gratitude? What good things has God given you that are undeserved?

It's hard to be around someone who is bitter. Ruth was filled with gratitude for God's grace in her life. She also didn't give up on Naomi. This isn't the end. God will use Ruth to pull Naomi out of her bitterness. We must pray for those people in our life who are like Naomi. As you give thanks for what you have - this will spread to others.

When life goes bad, do you think that God is out to get you? Does your pain make you think God hates you or that He looks harshly on you? When He feels distant or harsh, remember that is not true. "Behind a frowning providence, He hides a smiling face." (Cowper) There is more going on behind the scenes.

Do you feel like Naomi because of the trials of life? Do you wonder why God lets these things happen? Often, we just don't know. We must trust because of God's grace! Jesus, our Emmanuel - God with us - is our guarantee that God is for us! (Romans 8:31-32)

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at fbcum.org

Family Guide for week of November 24th, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
