Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of December 1

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as an inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Colossians 1:9a-10:

"9 And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you...

10 to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him:
bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those effected by natural disasters around the world, especially recent hurricanes
 through the Southeast U.S. Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life.
 Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to
 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we are directly involved with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for our students wrapping up a semester at school this month. Pray that they would be diligent in their studying/training and finish well. Pray they would grow in their faith and seek opportunities to glorify God with their skills and education. (Prov. 3:5-6; 1 Cor. 10:31).

- Pray we would care more about God's opinion of us than the praise of man. (Pr 29:25; 14:26)
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in – a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray God would guard our church from fear, anxiety, and disunity. Pray that we would trust that God is good and be assured that He is in control. (John 13:34-35)



God's Word for God's People

<u>James 1:16-17, John 12:1-3</u>, and <u>Romans 1:1-3</u>

"Contrasting Pictures of the Heart" – December 1, 2024



Introduction

The heart. An EKG will give a depiction of the health of your heart because it is central to everything you are physically. Scripture mentions the term "heart" over 1,000 times. It is a key ingredient to understanding biblical revelation.

A grateful heart is a sign of a believing heart. The condition of our heart is revealed by our attitude toward gratitude. Your heart is who you are. It is what makes you who you are in your inner life. Seeing life through the eyes of faith causes you to see the Lord's hand in all your life.

God gives us good gifts - His word, His law, His Son. (<u>James 1:16-17</u>) Everything that we have that is a good gift is from God. You can believe this or reject it. In the universe that God has created, there is constant change, but God never changes. In His goodness, He is constant. God's goodness is at the center of His handiwork.

God is not only perfect and powerful, but He is also unchangeably good. In light of this, the only appropriate response to this is gratitude. Gratitude of heart is foundational to our moral behavior, financial choices, time management, and emotional health. Is there something in your life that causes you to struggle with gratitude? Do you see God's hand in the trials of life? What are some of the things that you have learned through the trials of life?

Sermon Outline

- 1. A dark heart Romans 1:18-21
- 2. An enlightened heart John 12:1-3
- 3. A deceived heart. John 12:4

Read & Discuss

1. Read Romans 1:18-21

The Apostle Paul paints a picture in this passage that all men are without excuse. No one can ask, "who is God, where is God, what does God want?" Creation speaks to who God is. The problem is that we enjoy sin so much that we refuse to acknowledge Him. What are some of the ways you see God in nature?

When man sees God in nature, he suppresses that truth because he likes sin. (<u>John 3:19</u>) One way we suppress the truth is by not being grateful. You are going to worship somebody or something. You are going to serve somebody. Who are you serving? What does your checkbook, credit card statement or calendar indicate about who you are serving? Are you grateful for all of God's good gifts.

2. Read John 12:1-3

Can you imagine what it would be like to watch this scene? Mary sat at the feet of Jesus, listening to His teaching. She came in gratitude to wash Jesus' feet with an expensive ointment. This occurred a little less than a week before Jesus went to the cross.

The religious leaders were looking for Jesus as if He was a fugitive. Mary's act was risky. The world will do everything it can to get rid of Jesus. Mary came with a grateful heart. She believed that Jesus was the Messiah. Mary knew what she was doing. She was showing her love and gratitude for her Lord. This scene moves from a general revelation to a special revelation. She was in the presence of the Christ. She could see this in Jesus' words and in His person. She was in the presence of the Light of the world. What are ways that you can show your gratitude for what Jesus has done for you?

3. Read John 12:4-8

Standing by Mary was Judas. Instead of gratitude, he is grumbling. Satan had entered him. Satan is the great deceiver - the father of lies. Judas didn't care about the poor. He only cared about himself.

Complaining and gratefulness are incompatible. What does God think about complaining? (Exodus 15-17 and Numbers 11) God finds complaining frustrating. Look at what God did the nation of Israel for complaining. They complained when they were in want **and** when they had enough.

People are suffering all over the world. You may not like what is going on in the world today, but your complaining will not make a difference in those things. What will make a difference is your gratitude to God. It's not just in your words. It's your thoughts. Are there grumbling thoughts that you need to replace with grateful thoughts?

Judas had a dark, deceived heart. It is a picture of unbelief and a stark contrast to Mary's heart. He was in love with money. Where are you? Is your heart deceived? Is your heart enlightened? Is your heart dark?

What are some things you can do to apply these truths to your life?

- Remember gratitude may be now or never. (<u>John 12:8</u>) This could be your last day on this earth. Let it be filled with gratitude toward God for all He has done.
- Recognize the tragedy of ingratitude. Grumbling and complaining will affect you and those around you. Imagine what our church and nation would be like if we began thanking God for everything He has done. (2 Timothy 3:1)
- Follow Jesus. If you are going to be a grateful person, you need to follow Jesus. (<u>John 1:12</u>) Turn from sin that has been causing you to run away from God and follow Jesus with all of your heart.

Work at being grateful and expressing gratitude every day. You must work at it. Express gratitude to God for your physical and spiritual blessings. God has given you so much! Keep looking for blessings. Always thank God before you ask Him for something. We can all be grateful! Humble yourself. Fall at the feet of Jesus. Give your heart to Him. Do it today!

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of December 1st, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
