Scripture Reading — Romans 8:18-39 (ESV)

¹⁸ For I consider that the sufferings of this present time are not worth comparing with the glory that is to be revealed to us. ¹⁹ For the creation waits with eager longing for the revealing of the sons of God. ²⁰ For the creation was subjected to futility, not willingly, but because of him who subjected it, in hope ²¹ that the creation itself will be set free from its bondage to corruption and obtain the freedom of the glory of the children of God. ²² For we know that the whole creation has been groaning together in the pains of childbirth until now. ²³ And not only the creation, but we ourselves, who have the firstfruits of the Spirit, groan inwardly as we wait eagerly for adoption as sons, the redemption of our bodies. ²⁴ For in this hope we were saved. Now hope that is seen is not hope. For who hopes for what he sees? ²⁵ But if we hope for what we do not see, we wait for it with patience.

²⁶ Likewise the Spirit helps us in our weakness. For we do not know what to pray for as we ought, but the Spirit himself intercedes for us with groanings too deep for words. ²⁷ And he who searches hearts knows what is the mind of the Spirit, because the Spirit intercedes for the saints according to the will of God. ²⁸ And we know that for those who love God all things work together for good, for those who are called according to his purpose. ²⁹ For those whom he foreknew he also predestined to be conformed to the image of his Son, in order that he might be the firstborn among many brothers. ³⁰ And those whom he predestined he also called, and those whom he called he also justified, and those whom he justified he also glorified.

What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us? ³² He who did not spare his own Son but gave him up for us all, how will he not also with him graciously give us all things? ³³ Who shall bring any charge against God's elect? It is God who justifies. ³⁴ Who is to condemn? Christ Jesus is the one who died—more than that, who was raised—who is at the right hand of God, who indeed is interceding for us. ³⁵ Who shall separate us from the love of Christ? Shall tribulation, or distress, or persecution, or famine, or nakedness, or danger, or sword? ³⁶ As it is written,

"For your sake we are being killed all the day long; we are regarded as sheep to be slaughtered."

³⁷ No, in all these things we are more than conquerors through him who loved us. ³⁸ For I am sure that neither death nor life, nor angels nor rulers, nor things present nor things to come, nor powers, ³⁹ nor height nor depth, nor anything else in all creation, will be able to separate us from the love of God in Christ Jesus our Lord.

A Prayer Guide for the week of December 8

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Colossians 1:9a, 11:

" ⁹ And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be ...

11 strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might,
for all endurance and patience with joy; "

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

 work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). 

Christmas According to Ruth

Ruth 2

"The Thrill of Hope" - December 8, 2024



Introduction

In life, there is no reset button. We take things - good and bad - as they come. Here in the book of Ruth, we see Naomi taking blow after blow. Even in all her heartache, she knew God was sovereign. She went back to Bethlehem hoping for a fresh start. As she limped back into town, it seemed that she had lost all hope. She and Ruth return after the famine at the beginning of the barley harvest. We are left asking, "could this be a new beginning? Could this be a fresh start?"

What about you? Have your choices or circumstances left you feeling empty, hopeless, and/or alone. There is no reset button, but is a fresh start possible? Is the hope of a new beginning absurd? Are we right to even hope for a new beginning? God can bring about a new beginning for all those who take their refuge in Him.

Chapter two begins with an "editorial comment." It is a detail that the author of the book wants us to know. We are introduced to Boaz. We know this, but Ruth and Naomi didn't. This raises the tension of the story because they need help, but finding Boaz is like finding a needle in a haystack.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Scene One: Take a step of faith. Vs. 1-3
- 2. Scene Two: Wait in hope for God's grace. Vs. 4-17
- 3. Scene Three: Open your heart. Vs. 18-23

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1 - 3

It can be hard for us to imagine what it was like for Ruth, a foreigner, to live in Bethlehem. She was an outsider, a foreigner from Moab. Ruth was a widow with no children, no welfare, and no support system. She only had Naomi who was in despair. They needed food - that was their most pressing need.

To glean meant to follow the reapers and pick up the pieces of grain that they had missed. It was slow, difficult work. God's law required landowners to allow the fatherless, the widow, and the sojourner to reap in the fields. Even though there was a law, it was the time of the judges when people ignored God's law, doing what was right in their own eyes. There was no guarantee that she would be allowed to glean. This is why Ruth looked for God's favor.

Ruth didn't just sit around waiting. She took the initiative. "She set out and went." Why didn't Naomi go with her? She was stuck in the pit of bitterness and depression. Ruth's character and faith shone. She was determined to help Naomi. Her love for Naomi and her trust in God compelled her to go.

Where did she end up? She "happened" to come to Boaz's field, and Boaz just "happened" to be of the same clan as Elimelech. But was it really happenstance? No, there is no such thing as luck for the Christian. (Proverbs 16:33) God is sovereign over all things. He guided her to that field. Ruth had no idea that this day would change the course of her life forever.

To be in God's favor, we must find the right field. The church is God's field. (1 Corinthians 3:9) Has God, in His providence, brought you to this church today to hear His word and give you a new start? Do you need to hear God's voice? Get out your Bible and read it. Do you long for friendships and community? Pick up the phone and call someone in the church. Invite them for lunch or coffee. Get to know them. Don't grow weary in doing good. Trust God to guide you as He guided Ruth. (Psalm 23:6) We can take a step of faith forward and trust God.

Additional Reading: Leviticus 19; Deuteronomy 24

2. Read vs. 4 – 17

Ruth was in a very vulnerable spot, needing protection and provision. God provided both of those things in Boaz. The way Boaz treated his servants gives us a glimpse of his character. He noticed Ruth and asked about her. The foreman made sure Boaz knew she was a foreigner - an outcast. Imagine the impact of Boaz's words to Ruth. He spoke to her as if she was family, making sure she knew that she belonged. Why? She has taken refuge in God. Just as Ruth was considered family to Boaz, God, in Christ, has taken people from every walk of life and made them family – the church. Do you see the church as family?

Boaz had heard about Ruth and all she had done. Boaz protected Ruth. He insisted that she stay and glean in his field, and he told the young men to not touch her. These left Ruth stunned by his grace. Where did her fearlessness come from? She took refuge in God, and God used people like Boaz to protect. In Genesis 1:26-28, we see that God created men and women as equals, but with different roles. Men are called to sacrifice their comfort to protect but must use their authority in a proper way. Boaz was a godly man - a worthy man who protected Ruth.

Boaz also generously provided for her. Ruth left the field that day with almost five gallons of grain. Like Boaz, we are to welcome the outsiders who come to this church. Do you tend to miss the "Ruths" because you are looking for people like you? Do you see people on the fringe, on their own, in need, hurting, and/or overlooked? Do we as a church care for these people, reach out to them, care for them, believing that God can give them a fresh start just like He did for us? Can you imagine what our community would look like if we took the initiative to reach out to others?

3. Read vs. 18 - 23

Boaz qualified as a "kinsman redeemer." A kinsman redeemer could buy back a relative who was enslaved due to debt. They could also marry a childless widow and raise a child with her in order to preserve the family line. When Ruth revealed whose field she found, Naomi's bitterness and depression began to fall away. Naomi realized that God's kindness had not forsaken the living or the dead.

God's kindness is his covenant love. It is His commitment for our good. He obligates Himself with a covenant promise - so committed to our good that He will bless no matter what it costs Him. It cost Him His Son. We deserve His curse because of sin. But Christ redeemed us from the curse of the law by becoming a curse for us. (Galatians 3:13-14) Jesus bore the righteous wrath of God to bless anyone who would come in repentance and faith. Have you taken refuge with God in Christ? One day, you will stand before God and give an account to Him. Run to Christ and take refuge under His wings. Jesus wants to be our refuge. Don't let pride keep you away. Take shelter in Him. Then you can know the thrill of hope of a new beginning.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of December 8th, 2024

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
