A Prayer Guide for the week of February 2

Prayer of the week:

It's often helpful to pray the Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. As you pray for yourself and others this week, consider praying the wisdom of Proverbs 3:5-7:

⁵ Trust in the Lord with all your heart, and do not lean on your own understanding. ⁶ In all your ways acknowledge him, and he will make straight your paths. ⁷ Be not wise in your own eyes; fear the Lord, and turn away from evil.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)

- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)

Good News from a Good God

Matthew 5:43-48

"Love Your Enemies" – February 2, 2025



Introduction

The text today is all about contrast - contrasting interpretation of the law and contrasting pictures of love. Jesus is going to put down the tools of the divine carpenter and pick up the tools of a divine communicator. He will use the literary tool of antithesis, a figure of speech that uses contrasting terms to create a memorable effect. In the text today, it is the careful description of one system or standard and then a contrasting picture of another standard. So different are the two standards that there isn't any way to say they are the same thing even if there is a common thread that connects them.

Today, we will look at Jesus' antithetical statement, "You have heard that it was said...but I say to you."

Sermon Outline

- 1. Contrasting interpretations of the law to love. Vs. 43-44
- 2. Contrasting sources of love. Vs. 45-48

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 43-44

When we drop in on this statement that Jesus is making, we are dropping in at the end of Jesus' comments regarding the law. Here, He speaks of the law of love. With each of these statements, Jesus paints two very different pictures. One picture is the standard of Judaism. The contrasting picture is the standard of the kingdom of God. These are not suggestions or guiding principles, they are commands. Jesus is emphasizing his Lordship and speaking from divine power and authority.

The starting point for each of the contrasts in Matthew 5 is the same. There is a stark contrast between the law and what Jesus was saying, but there is no contradiction here. God is holy and righteous. He is perfect in all His ways and rich in mercy, faithful, true and abounding in steadfast love. He is unchanging. There is no division of attributes within the Godhead. However, there was a tendency in Jewish culture, as well as in our own hearts today, to relax the tension of the law to something we can "do," something with challenging but attainable goals with measurable outcomes.

In order to address this, Jesus clearly said that He did not come to abolish the law. He came to fulfil it. (5:17-18) Have you been tempted by a self-righteous heart to relax the law to be able to keep it? The scribes and the Pharisees did this with each of the commands that Jesus addressed in this section. When Jesus quotes their interpretation of the law, the religious leader knew that they got that part right. But they leave out how to love by omitting two words and narrow the field of who they must love by adding four words.

If you leave out "as yourself" then you are free to set the standard for what love is. If you are bound to love your neighbor as yourself, you have to think about what that means. We place a high value on self-love, meeting our needs and seeking the best outcomes for ourselves. When you are angry or frustrated or in conflict with another person, ask yourself how much of your reaction to something is related to what you want, when you want it, and in the quantity that you want it? Loving ourselves well is a good thing as long as we don't relax the high standard of loving our neighbor. Do you put the same energy into loving others as you love yourself?

In addition to wanting to know how to love, the Pharisees wanted to know exactly **who** they were required to love. Who was their neighbor? They needed to pay closer attention to the entire chapter of Leviticus 19. Love was to be extended not only to the children of Israel, but to the sojourner. (Leviticus 19:33) In Luke 10, Jesus clearly explained to them who their neighbor was by sharing a parable - the good Samaritan. The Samaritan was hated, but he is the one who had compassion on the man who was beaten and robbed. He was the only one who proved to be a neighbor. A simpler question might be, is there anyone who isn't my neighbor?

Are you convinced? Do you just think that this is Jesus' words for the New Testament? What about enemies we see in the Old Testament? A clear answer can be seen in <u>Exodus 23:4-5</u>. **Anyone** who is in need or needs to be treated in the same manner in which you want to be treated is your neighbor. There is no biblical license to hate anyone even if they hate you. Jesus said, with divine power and authority, to love your neighbor. Falling short of

this command is sin. There should always be a personal recognition of our own hearts and an evangelistic zeal for God to save when we pray for those who persecute us. Who do you find hard to love? Do you pray for those who persecute you? The standard by which you love reveals to whom you belong.

Additional Reading: Leviticus 19; Luke 10; Job 31:29-30; 1 Samuel 24

2. Read Vs. 45 – 48

Here Jesus showed a picture of limited love with license to hate contrasted with a picture of divine love displayed. One picture says your picture of love looks no different than those you consider to be vile. The other picture says that your love looks like God. When you seek to meet the needs of someone who has wronged you and when you love your enemy with impartiality, you love like God loves.

You will have enemies. The Beatitudes says, blessed are those who are recipients of hate yet respond with love. (<u>Matthew 5:11</u>) Remember the Apostle Paul's words in <u>Romans 12:18</u>? Live peaceably with all men. What kind of love is this to proactively bless while being cursed? Jesus says that godly love looks different than worldly love.

If you only love yourself and those like you, you are no different than the ones you hate and who hate you. The key to all of this is that Jesus was highlighting the contrast between the standard of worldly love and the standard of divine love. The demonstration of that love reveals source of your love. Jesus' standard was higher. He says love all without partiality. Let love radiate out of you to shine on all without exclusion. Pray for those who persecute you.

All of these statements that raise the bar and set the standard for love. As Jesus ended this section, He tells the crowd that they must be perfect as their Heavenly Father is perfect. Who can love like this? Do you love yourself well and extend the same kind of care an commitment to meet the needs of those you love? That's one thing. What about extending that kind of love to meet the need of a stranger? Is that a stretch for you? Can you extent that kind of love to someone who hates you? Can you pray for someone like that? The standard Jesus set seems unattainable. Isn't that the point? Jesus reminds us that with man, this IS impossible, but with God ALL things are possible.

As you reflect on your opportunities to love that you have neglected, are you discouraged? Have you relaxed the law of love and created a "do not love" or a "free to hate" list? There is a reason to rejoice today! If you hate the fact that you have hated or hate the fact that you have failed to love, the right response is to turn from your sin and run to God. He sent His only Son to die for enemies like you and me. Jesus fulfilled the entire law and met the perfect standard of the law of love and died on a cross for His enemies. There is reason to rejoice because if you turn from you sin and trust in Christ, you can know that all of your sin is covered by the perfect love of Christ. It is only then that you can satisfy the requirements of the perfect standard and be reconciled to God.

He transforms you. He gives you a new heart. He gives you a new capacity to love. Do you love in a way that is unachievable? Do you have a desire to love with a Christ-like love? Do you love like you belong to Jesus?

Family Guide for week of February 2nd, 2025

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc...)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.

Bible Intake (Listening to God)
