A Prayer Guide for the week of March 23

Prayer of the week:

It's often helpful to pray the Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. As you pray for yourself and others this week, we encourage you to consider the brief prayer of the Apostle Paul in 2 Thessalonians 3:5:

"May the Lord direct your hearts to the love of God and to the steadfastness of Christ."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)

Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)





Book Stall Ministry

1st Timothy: Church as Pillar and Foundation of Truth

1 Timothy 3:1-7

"Qualifications of an Elders" – March 23, 2025



Introduction

If a church were to put an ad in the paper for a person to apply for a leadership position, what would that ad say? Would it look like an ad for a business executive or CEO. In the mind of the world, the church is run like a business and should have people who have impressive credentials. Israel did this when looking for a king. They picked Saul who feared man rather than God and the nation began to crumble. Israel's next king was a man after God's own heart. David was probably unimpressive by the world's standards. Even the prophet Samuel overlooked him as a possibility. Yet David was called by God. (1 Samuel 8, 9, 15, and 16)

Leadership matters in a church. As the leadership goes, so goes the church. When we step back and look at these qualifications, this list is unremarkable. There is no requirement for intelligence, physical strength or great personality. These qualifications are things that we would expect of any Christian. The focus is on the character so that our faith rests on the power of God. Every Christian should know what the qualifications of elders and deacons are to be able to choose men to fill the positions. Qualified leaders in a church matter because God has designed the church to be a pillar and buttress of truth - to protect and display the gospel. This was Paul's concern in writing this letter.

Ungodly authority sacrifices others to serve self. Godly authority sacrifices self to serve others. You must ask, "Is the potential leader pursuing a Godly or ungodly authority?" Men aspiring to be elders must be honest, but also ruthless in putting the wrong motives to death to use authority in a Godly way.

Why does Paul assure the church that aspiring to be a leader is a noble task? The church had just fired two leaders for using their leadership in the wrong way, making it difficult to trust. (1 Timothy 1:20) If authority is misused anywhere, it creates real pain and suffering from real sin that demands real biblical justice. Not everyone in authority is bad. Some use it well. But we must remember that all authority comes from God for our good. Getting rid of authority was Satan's idea in the Garden of Eden. God redeems authority. What should the qualifications of an elder or pastor be?

Discussion

1. Read Vs. 2-3

To be above reproach does not mean sinless perfection. Paul meant that there should be no obvious inconsistency in the life of a potential elder. Their conduct should rise above accusations used to discredit them. Pastors are to be an example of how every Christian should behave. A potential elder must put to death every temptation, self-controlled, and open and accountable for their actions.

Passions are not good or bad but must be controlled. When passions take over, vision is clouded. Striving for the proper focus is essential. An overseer must have a sober mind, overreacting to everything coming their way causing danger for the church. Is there something that has clouded your vision of what is right and good from God's word?

Where does the stability of being sober minded or self-control come from? It comes from knowing God. (Proverbs 14:26) Knowing God's truth brings confidence. Do you know God in such a way that gives you confidence, self-control, and stability? How do we come to know the glory of God? First, we must understand our problem – sin which separates us from a holy God. Jesus came to shield us from God's wrath aimed at our rebellion. He died in our place for anyone who will trust in Him. He rose again on the third day. Anyone who comes to Christ can be reconciled to God because sin has been removed. Have you come to Christ in repentance and faith?

An overseer must be hospitable. God pours out his love into our hearts. That love begins to change us to make us more and more loving. (Romans 5:5) Do you open up your home and life to others?

The next qualification is "able to teach." It is one of the primary tasks of an elder - it's how he leads, encourages, corrects and helps the flock. The congregation should benefit from his teaching.

An elder must not be mastered by any outside substance. An elder should not be violent but gentle, not quarrelsome. Violence and quarreling reflect the opposite of being self-controlled. An elders must contending for the faith but not be contentious. (2 Timothy 2:14-19) An elder is one who stands up with confidence in the word of God.

A pastor must not be a lover of money. What do you love? What do you trust? Where do you find your identity? Where is your refuge? (Colossians 3:5)

2. Read Vs. 4-5

An elder must be able to lead others. We can see an example of that by looking at how he manages his home. Managing is synonymous with caring. (<u>Luke 10:25-37</u>) Is the man attentive to his home? Does he provide leadership there? What would his wife say about his leadership? Do his children submit to him as their father? This doesn't mean a perfect home. It means respect and regard for him. What is the man's attitude toward children? If you never become an elder in a church? If you are a dad or hope to be one in the future, you must shepherd your family. Know your family. Teach God's word. Lead them well. Protect them.

3. Read Vs. 6-7

An elder must be a mature Christian. A new Christian is not ready to handle the challenges, or he may become proud. An elder should be known for consistent godliness so that even the world will recognize his integrity. They should be the same at church as they are at work. Would a neighbor or coworker be surprised that you were asked to be an elder at your church? Does your walk match your talk?

There are potential pitfalls for the potential elders. Every Christian is at risk by being tempted by Satan (Ephesians 6:10-11, but Satan has elders in his crosshairs. Will an elder get something wrong? Yes. No pastor has "arrived." There are times that pastors will make mistakes and areas where they need to improve. Remember, the shepherd is also a sheep. There is a temptation for a congregation to grumble about what they think elders should or should do.

If a pastor is in sin, they should be corrected. If their ministry can be improved, pray for them. (Hebrews 13:17) A pastor is accountable to God. (James 3:1) God is not indifferent to the misuse of authority. It is to your advantage to offer good suggestions, but to also pray for your leaders. If Satan can create division, he can derail the mission of the church to go and make disciples.

Being a pastor can be dangerous work, but it is a privilege. It is a noble task. When you choose future elders, choose them according to what Paul lays out here in 1 Timothy. Pray for your elders and for their families. Pray that they will exercise godly authority so that the church flourishes.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of March 23rd, 2025

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
