A Prayer Guide for the week of March 30

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using examples in Scripture to inspire our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from Ephesians 3:14-16:

¹⁴ For this reason I bow my knees before the Father,
 ¹⁵ from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named,
 ¹⁶ that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being,

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)




Deacon of the Book Stall


Team members will be trained on processing digital purchases using Square and how to send the weekly deposit to the FBCUM Treasurer.

1st Timothy: Church as Pillar and Foundation of Truth

1 Timothy 3:8-13

"Qualifications of a Deacon" – March 30, 2025



Introduction

If you are in a situation where you need lifesaving surgery, how important are the doctor's credentials? Qualifications matter, not just for those who care for your physical body, but also for those caring for your soul.

Deacons serve by meeting practical needs and by supporting the role of the elders. In <u>Acts 6</u>, we see people coming to Christ, but we also see a problem. The Hellenistic Jewish widows were being neglected. The Apostles brought the disciples together to select men who would come up with a solution to meet the need.

Elders and deacons have different roles, but they come together for a common goal - for the word of God to increase. How we structure ourselves as a church matters because the church is to be the pillar and buttress of truth. It is God's heart for all people to be saved, so coming together in a unified purpose is essential.

Discussion

1. Read Vs. 8-10

Deacons must live a life worthy of respect. They must not be double tongued. A double tongued person is like a snake, speaking from both sides of the mouth. This is gossip. You can gossip with your mouth AND your ears. If you refuse to speak it or listen to it, it dies out. (Proverbs 26:20) "Gossip is bearing bad news behind someone's back out of a bad heart." Gossip can be temptingly delicious. (Proverbs 26:22) Gossip tastes good in the moment, but it is poison that divides friends and destroys communities and churches (Proverbs 16:28) A deacon must promote unity, not destroy it with their words.

Deacons must be self-controlled. We must be careful about how we treat wine or wealth so that it doesn't become an idol. Deacons must know and hold fast to the gospel of Jesus that reconciles sinners to God and people to each other. Paul made the gospel clear in 1 Timothy 1:15. Jesus came to save sinners who need to be rescued. All have sinned and can't get to God on our own merit or good works. Sin separates us from God and each other and is so destructive that it leaves us spiritual dead. (Ephesians 2:1) When we come in repentance and faith in Christ, we are reconciled to God and each other. If a deacon is to come into a contentious situation to bring peace, they MUST know the gospel! They must be able to absorb complaints. It is only by holding on to the gospel that a deacon can have the strength and wisdom to keep going. This is applying the gospel with a clear conscience. How well do you know the gospel and how do you apply it to situations of life?

How do we know if they are qualified? Rushing a person into a position of leadership is a dangerous thing to do. There isn't a timeline or step-by-step process, and it will look different from church to church. A church must have a way of examining a person.

2. Read Vs. 11

There are two main interpretations of <u>verse 11</u>, with disagreement of the word "wives." It could be "wives of deacons" (ESV) or it could be "women deacons." (NASB) There is a biblical case for both.

In the church, we operate by practical theology. We can't just theorize. We need to decide but not divide. On essential and clear biblical teachings, we must protect truth. This is not one of those issues. There is a case for women deacons. Some will be persuaded and other will not, and that's ok. Culture and tradition are hidden

influences in how we think. Changing and rethinking this idea may be unsettling. We must all work to submit our cultural thinking, our thinking on tradition, and our fear to the word of God. This is true for ALL of life as we think about difficult decisions. You don't need to hide from difficult questions and decisions. Come to them with an open Bible which is the ultimate authority. The case for women deacons only works if deacons in a church operate like deacons and not elders, because the role of pastor is limited to qualified men. Are there cultural or traditional influences that have effected your thinking about this topic? Is there something unsettling to you about having women deacons?

Seven reasons that verse 11 refers to women deacons:

- 1. "Gune" (Greek) in vs. 11 can mean "wives or "women" depending on the context. It is translated "women" in 1 Timothy. (1 Timothy 2:9)
- 2. The absence of the pronoun "their" in the Greek
- 3. "Likewise" in vs. 11 introduces a new section parallel to deacons in vs. 8.
- 4. The placement of "husband of one wife" (Literally "one woman man" in vs. 12) It is at the beginning of this next section which is parallel to the qualifications for elders. (vs. 2)
- 5. It is unlikely to have more stringent qualifications for deacons than elders. (There are no qualifications for an elder's wife.)
- 6. The example of Phoebe in Romans 16:1, a servant, "daikonos," of the church of Cenchreae
- 7. The deacon's role (rightly defined) does not violate the prohibition in <u>1 Timothy 2:12</u>. The authority in that verse refers to broad authority over the whole church. The deacon's authority is a narrow administrative authority under the oversight of the elders. Teaching is not a requirement for deacons.

Will you take the time to think all of this through, pray about it and/or talk to the elders about this issue? We will take the time to teach on this more.

3. Read Vs. 12

Here, Paul gave two specific qualification for men. We know that he was speaking of men because they must be the husband of one wife. While being married is not a requirement, if he is, then a male deacon must be devoted to his wife. He must also lead and love his family well, but it doesn't mean that he must have children.

4. Read Vs. 13

Being a deacon is hard work. It is demanding work. Deacons are called to step into difficult, sometimes tumultuous situations, receive complaints, and absorb the shock to promote unity and further the ministry.

The work of a deacon is often behind the scenes. It is often thankless. Those who serve well, earn the respect of the community and the church. They also gain great confidence in the faith. The deacon relies on God and His grace, and God assures them.

True greatness is being a servant. (Mark 10:35-45) When we call someone to serve as a deacon, we, as a congregation, vow to pray for, support, encourage and cooperate with them in their work. This will strengthen our church to be a pillar and buttress of truth so that many come to Christ as we go according to God's command. (Matthew 28:18-20)

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at fbcum.org

Family Guide for week of March 30th, 2025

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
