Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of May 4

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, consider using the words of Psalm 119:33-40 to pray for yourself and others:

³³ Teach me, O LORD, the way of your statutes; and I will keep it to the end. ³⁴ Give me understanding, that I may keep your law and observe it with my whole heart.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish
 peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for teachers and students in our church family who are completing their final weeks of classes for the school year. Pray that God would help them to finish well and give them physical and spiritual strength to endure. See a list of our out-of-town college students toward the back of the church directory.
- Praise God for recent baptisms of Jay Addison and Michael King. May God continue his work of sanctification in them and help our church family to walk alongside them in faith. (Rom 6:4)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21; 1 Tim. 3:14-15)
- Pray that God would strengthen and encourage our Deacons and Ministry Team leaders as they
 work to meet the practical needs of our church family and those in our community (1 Samuel
 12:24; Deut. 31:6). See "Ministry Spotlight" pages for highlights and prayer requests.
- Pray that God would help our church family to radically love others in the way the Bible teaches us to love. Pray that our love would reflect the sacrificial love that God has shown us through Jesus Christ. (Mt 5:43-48; John 13:35)
- Pray that God would deepen our desire for prayer as a church family. May we not grow weary or apathetic in bringing our concerns to Him. May God help us to sense His presence and power as we pray. (Rom 12:12, Col 4:2)

Ministry Spotlight

We would like to bring to your attention active church ministries and programs at First Baptist Church of Upper Marlboro. We hope that each month you will pray for all those serving and consider how you may support their efforts. Children's Ministry

The Children's Ministry is a program of the church that encompasses several areas: ChildLIFE, DiscipleLIFE, Awana, and VBS. Each Sunday morning our Children's DiscipleLIFE classes begin at 9am for babies through sixth grade. Excited children arrive with their parents and are checked-in to join their classmates and teachers to explore the word of God.

The Children's Ministry does not stop there. During the academic year from September through May, we provide the Awana program on Wednesday nights. *But wait there's more,* we also have our VBS (Vacation Bible School) week during the summer. Each of these programs keep our children focused on the word of God and brings encouragement through memorizing scripture and working through materials that brings scripture to life. There is truly nothing more rewarding than to see how children respond when they actually gain understanding. Let's break this down so you may get a clear picture of what each one of these programs bring in discipling children.



Awana is a program that follows the academic year for children from PreK 3-Sixth grade. The children are registered to Awana clubs by age/grade: Cubbies - PreK 3-4; Sparks - K-2 Grade; Truth and Training (T&T) - 3rd –6th Grade). Each club receives an ageappropriate book to work with their parents to help them memorize, learn, and understand the context of scripture. As chil-

dren advance by demonstrating what they have learned with leaders, they receive badges for their accomplishments. Awana Clubs also gives children opportunities to develop Christian values through teamwork as they participate in games and activities. In Awana clubs, points are earned through various activities and achievements, mainly centered around scripture memorization, handbook completion, there

is remembering to be prepared and general participation. These points are used for individual rewards, team competitions, and to redeem items at an Awana SuperStore.

VBS is coming soon! Get ready for Magnified! Magnified is our theme for this years VBS, and it encourages us to see the bigness of God in the smallness of things! VBS will encourage kids to look closely at the details of God's amazing world and magnify, or proclaim, the greatness of God. God made us, cares about us, loves us, forgives us, and is faithful to keep all His promises to us. We can praise God together! We were



made to magnify God! If you total it up VBS results in 15 hours of intense discipleship, the gospel being shared daily, and 7 months of ministry in 1 week. **IT'S WORTH IT!** The team comes together in June to host VBS where children spend 3 hours each day, singing, crafting, games, Bible study and they hear the truth of the gospel.



The Children's Ministry has many moving parts and the person that oversees this magnificent program of the church has to be quite organized and have a heart to lead and serve children of the church. **Pam Jensen, Children's Ministry Leader** has been serving at this church for more than 20 years and has developed our Children's Ministry Guidelines for Care, Instruction and Protection. This is no easy feat. She is committed to her work and has encouraged leaders to grow! Our church has been blessed with her determination to bring opportunities for

children to grow in Christ. The gospel is heard every week. And the success of these programs reflect the work that she does.

She acknowledges the ChildLIFE Ministry Leader, Ashley Meekins-Smith, and the Awana Commander, Ronnie Sweetman, for the work that they do along with all of the volunteers that serve in Awana, ChildLIFE, the DiscipleLIFE teachers that prepare and instruct children each Sunday morning, and Monica Kergel for leading VBS. Pam is so grateful and appreciates everyone that has participated or will participate in the future.

The volunteers, leaders, parents, and children make the Children's Ministry a huge success. Next week we will discuss, how you may get involved in this amazing church program. Remember, VBS is coming soon!





1st Timothy: Church as Pillar and Foundation of Truth

1 Timothy 4:6-16

"Train Yourself for Godliness" – May 4, 2025



Introduction

It is hard to help someone else, if you are physically hindered. We must take care of our self so that we can care for others. Paul's focus here is salvation which was Paul's aim in this letter and God's heart in this letter. On the road of salvation, we have enemies out to destroy us. Satan wants to destroy us. The world wants to distract us, and our flesh is prone to shipwreck if we are not careful.

To help us in our road of salvation, God has given us the church - the pillar and buttress of truth. The church displays and protects the gospel. Here, Paul addressed Timothy personally, but he also addressed the church. The health and soundness of the local church depends somewhat in the health and soundness of the pastors of a church.

Sermon Outline

1. Pastor: Grow in Godliness. Vs. 6-10

2. Church: Imitate Godly Examples. Vs. 11-16

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 6-10

A pastor must be faithful to God's word as they proclaim it. Proclaiming God's word can be dangerous. Paul told Timothy in his second letter that he must be ready to suffer. How would Timothy, as well as future pastors, prepare? There are three essentials for every pastor.

Nourish himself with God's word. Vs. 6 Pastors must have an ongoing lifestyle of being in God's word, guarding themselves and habitually nourishing their souls. Busyness cannot become an excuse. You must make time to get into God's word. Pastors are not just salesmen of God's word. (2 Corinthians 2:17)

Train himself for Godliness. Vs. 7-8 Growing in godliness doesn't come by accident. Pastors must go to the spiritual gym and train themselves for godliness. Bodily training is of some value, but we need to be realistic and acknowledge that our bodies get older and deteriorate over time. To ignore that fact is a chasing of the wind. The silly myths referred to controlling the body and staying away from certain things that were considered a defilement. This looks good on the outside. Sinful actions flow from a sinful heart. (Mark 7:14-23) A life of faith is strengthened not only by reading but obeying the Word of God.

To motivate us to get going, Paul reminds us that godliness holds promise for the present and the life to come. If you have real godliness, contentment is a by-product. (1 Timothy 6:6) If we toil to put sin to death, we see God at work. We grow in godliness, and we find satisfaction in our present circumstances. Trust God's promises in the present life, but Paul also points to the future which has the promise for eternal life. This requires an eternal perspective. Do you spend significant time in God's word each week, pouring over scripture? Do you pray scripture? Do you have an eternal perspective, remembering that your life here is temporary and this is not your home?

The world treats Sunday like every other day. You have to choose and decide what is true. Is it the world? Is it God's word? Are you running after godliness? Why not? Are you discouraged about how much time it takes to grow in godliness? We maintain the disciplines because we believe in God's promise. Keep going! We can trust God's word. (Psalm 25:1-3)

Hope in the living God. Vs. 10 This is the only way to push through the discouragement, suffering, and hard work of ministry. Our hope must be set on the living God, not programs or an eloquent minister. Jesus died, but He conquered sin and death in His resurrection. He is the living God. Jesus is the Savior of all people without distinction - for all who believe.

The world might say that godliness can be defined on your own terms. There is only one way!! It is Jesus. (1 Timothy 2:5 John 14:6) There aren't many roads to God. Jesus alone dealt with the problem of sin. He is the only one who can bridge the gap between those who turn from sin and believe and a holy God.

Every Christian should be doing these three things. Pastors must be an example of these things for the whole church to follow.

2. Read Vs. 11-16

Here, Paul gives Timothy command after command. He wanted Timothy to do these things so that he could teach the church. Timothy was young, so how do you overcome the generational gap? Set an example in speech, love, faith, and purity. Live out what you are teaching.

Be an example in what you say and in your behavior. Speak the truth in love. You must "walk your talk." Be consistent. Be an example in faith and love. The more we grow in those things the more we are able to show faith and love to others. Set an example in purity with self-control.

We need examples. (<u>1 Corinthians 11:1</u>; <u>Philippians 3:17</u>; <u>1 Peter 5:3</u>) Some truths are better caught than taught. Do you want to grow as a Christian? You need good examples. You must think through how to live like a Christian in any and every area of your life – career, family, marriage, parenting, etc. Read your Bible. Find Godly examples and hang around them. Ask them questions. Then, imitate Godly examples. (<u>Proverbs 13:20</u>)

You might think - what if I get this wrong? Well, you will. You will not be a perfect example. Your job as an example is to point people to Jesus. Don't be paralyzed by the fear of getting it wrong. We are forgiven by God, so we can take the risk of being an example.

Be an example in worship. Real change and growth doesn't come by cleaning up the externals. It comes from an internal heart transformation as you worship. We become what we worship. (Psalm 115:4-8, 135:15-18) If you worship the living God, you become like Him. (2 Corinthians. 3:18) What do you love, trust or find your identity in? What can you not live without? Does your heart worship and behold the things of the world or God as revealed in scripture?

Be an example in service. Don't sit on the sidelines complaining that you are not gifted in the way someone else is. A spiritual gift It is a manifestation of the Spirit for the common good to build up others. (1 Corinthians 12:7) Paul used the metaphor of "a body" when he talked about the church in 2 Corinthians 12. It is different parts working together making up one body. We need each other. When you don't use your gift, the whole body suffers. Are you serving the body? Have you considered where you might serve? We have many ministries in which to be involved. Leaders organize teams - they need you to serve and help. Look for a need and jump on in. Aside from that, we can serve each other by getting to know someone, finding out their needs, and serving them in practical ways. That is ministry!

Spiritual growth in a Christian is normal and should be expected. God gives us examples so that when we feel stuck and get discouraged, we can know that change is possible. Progress may seem slow, but it is progress nonetheless. Sometimes growth is holding ground. Progress in growth displays the life changing power of the gospel. How have you grown spiritual in the last year, five years, ten years? Look back at your growth. It will be used by God to confirm the living faith by those who are saved by Jesus in the church. How do you know if a tree is alive? It grows and bears fruit **over time**. The Christian life is not a sprint; it is a marathon. It calls for endurance. Keep going!! As you persist, you can look back to see God's work in your life and make your call and election sure.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
