Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of May 25

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, consider using the words of the psalmist from Psalm 25:4-5. If you're praying through the church directory, consider asking God to work in these ways in those you're praying for each day:

⁴ Make me to know your ways, O Lord; teach me your paths. ⁵ Lead me in your truth and teach me, for you are the God of my salvation;

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for teachers and students in our church family who are completing their final weeks of classes for the school year. Pray that God would help them to finish well and give them physical and spiritual strength to endure. See a list of our out-of-town college students toward the back of the church directory.

- Pray that God would strengthen and encourage our Deacons and Ministry Team leaders as they
 work to meet the practical needs of our church family and those in our community (1 Samuel





1st Timothy: Church as Pillar and Foundation of Truth

1 Timothy 5:17-25

"Instructions for Leaders" – May 25, 2025



Introduction

When a leader of an organization is involved in a scandal, it undermines the credibility of the organization. This is not just true of businesses, educational institutions, or even the government. It is also true of the church. An annual Gallup Poll asks people to rate the honesty and ethical standards of people in various occupations. Over the last 50 years, clergy have gone from high up on the list for having honesty and ethical standards down to the middle of the pack. This could be the result of our 24-hour news cycle broadcasting scandal after scandal and never putting the focus on faithfulness. While this is a lopsided view of the big picture, sadly, there are times when there is a scandal in a church that hurts the witness of that leader and the church.

Such was the situation of the church in Ephesus where Timothy was the pastor. Remember Hymenaeus and Alexander from <u>chapter one</u>? They rejected a good conscience and made a shipwreck of their faith, tarnishing the witness of that church. The church is the pillar and buttress of truth, serving the living God who has the power to change lives. In Chapter four, Paul called Timothy to train for godliness. Timothy was to set an example for the church. His life was to reflect the truth that he taught. Paul told Timothy to watch his life and his doctrine carefully. This is something that we all must do.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Honor faithful elders. Vs. 17-18
- 2. Hold elders accountable. Vs. 19-21

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 17-18

The job of an elder is to know the sheep, feed the sheep, lead the sheep and protect the sheep. Paul emphasized this in vs. 17 - "those who labor." Pastoring is soul work; it is weighty. It can be a joy to step into people's lives, but faithful, biblical pastoral work is difficult. However, it is a privilege.

Elders should be supported financially and respected. We are called as Christians to set aside a portion of our salary to give to the church because the church is a family, a household. The church is central to God's plan for displaying His glory and protecting His truth. It is central to His plan for evangelizing the world. (1 Timothy 1:15) If a church is able to pay their pastor, then that church should. As the pastor works for the church, it is lawful and right to pay them. What does respect for an elder look like?

Obey your elders and submit to them. (<u>Hebrews 13:17</u>) There is a mutual benefit here. If the elders are doing what they are called to do, it benefits the congregations. When the congregation submits, it makes the elder's job a joy.

Open your heart. (2 Corinthians 6:11-13) Elders work in the arena of the heart. A faithful elder loves and wants what is good for the flock. They want the flock to stand firm in the faith. Be honest with your elders so that they know what is going on in your life and know how to help you. Is there something that you need to tell your elders so that they can rightly care for you?

Be teachable. Sometimes the biblical teaching or guidance given by an elder can sting. You must test what they are saying to make sure it IS biblical, but if it is, you should listen. (<u>Proverbs 14:4</u>) If you listen to biblical council, you will be fruitful. How have you or do your respond to the counsel of an elder?

Pray for you elders. (Colossians 4:3-4) They cannot do what God has called them to do without the grace and power of God.

Paul needed to remind Timothy to honor faithful elders. That church had endured the scandal of Hymenaeus and Alexander who drug the church through the mud. When that happens, it is easy to be distrustful. The authority of a faithful elder can bring life. But what if an elder falls into unrepentant sin and fails to rule well?

2. Read Vs. 19-21

This is the congregation's responsibility. Paul wanted accountability, but it must be fair and just. (Deuteronomy

19:15) The accused must be protected from false accusations. This isn't special treatment for elders. Jesus emphasized this for all believers in <u>Matthew 18:16</u>. If an elder does sin against another church member, seek Godly council for wisdom in handling the situation.

If you hear a rumor about an elder, are you quick to believe it? Do you think the worst or spread rumors? When you hear of an allegation or rumor, don't accept it as true without a fair hearing or evidence. Paul was seeking to guard against that. Those in leadership are more vulnerable to this. A pastor cares for people and families who are dealing with sin. Sometimes, the counsel of a pastor is difficult to follow. People get angry and want to slander the pastor. This is a scheme of the Devil to estrange the people in the church from their pastor and diminish the authority of God's word. We are a family. We should be careful to now spread unsubstantiated rumors. (Proverbs 18:17)

What if the charge is true? Elders are not expected to be sinless. Paul is referring to a pattern of sin and lack of repentance. The qualifications of elders matter for the health and witness of the church. Unrepentant sin should not be ignored or swept under the carpet. That belittles the role of the pastor and the role of the church. The rebuke must be done in front of the church because trust has been broken. This public rebuke to reminds the church that sin is serious.

Paul reminded Timothy that the governance of the church is serious and falls under the watchful eye of God. Do you find it difficult to submit to flawed and imperfect authority? Part of the encouragement that helps us obey is to remember that the authority will answer to God and Christ on the day of judgment for how they led and what they taught.

Don't prejudge without evidence, and don't show partiality. Sin is sin, and it must be dealt with. Why does this matter? Jesus gave His life to save sinners. It was a great cost. The mission of the church is salvation. The church displays and protects the gospel. A church that tolerates unrepentant sin in its elders or members looks like a powerless assembly that is no different than the world. How do you respond when sin is exposed? Repentance displays God's grace and mercy. If the elder persists in sin, public rebuke is in order.

3. Read Vs. 22-25

When Paul mentioned "laying on of hands," he was talking about commissioning someone to take up the role of elder. Paul emphasized being patient and examining the candidate thoroughly. It's not a popularity contest. Persistent sin must not be overlooked.

Verse 23 may seem "random," but Timothy was being pulled into the legalistic beliefs of the time. Paul was giving Timothy freedom to take a little wine for his health. Remember, drunkenness is a sin. (Ephesians 5:18)

Time and circumstances expose sin. This is why it is wise to be slow to evaluate a man for pastoral ministry. But this raises a question for all of us...what kind of person are you? With enough time, what kind of person will you be revealed to be? Are there things that you are doing that you hope no one will ever find about?

No person is hidden from God. (<u>Hebrews 4:13</u>) We might be able to fool some people for a while, but we won't fool God. He expects and demands perfect obedience to His good law, yet we all have failed in that. But Jesus came to take our punishment. Our only hope before a holy God is not in pretending, but it is in confessing our sin and coming to Jesus. In exchange, we can be clothed in Jesus' perfect righteousness. This is the good news!! Come to Jesus!

Paul ended this chapter by reminding us that some good deeds are done in secret that no one will know about. God sees it, and He is well pleased. In the end, He will reward the faithful. We must have an eternal perspective and serve to the glory of God.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
