¹ "Truly, truly, I say to you, he who does not enter the sheepfold by the door but climbs in by another way, that man is a thief and a robber. ² But he who enters by the door is the sheepherd of the sheep. ³ To him the gatekeeper opens. The sheep hear his voice, and he calls his own sheep by name and leads them out. ⁴ When he has brought out all his own, he goes before them, and the sheep follow him, for they know his voice. ⁵ A stranger they will not follow, but they will flee from him, for they do not know the voice of strangers." ⁶ This figure of speech Jesus used with them, but they did not understand what he was saying to them.

⁷ So Jesus again said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, I am the door of the sheep. ⁸ All who came before me are thieves and robbers, but the sheep did not listen to them. ⁹ I am the door. A Prayer Guide for the week of July 13

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Colossians 1:11 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to use as you pray for your church family this week.

"we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may... be strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might, for all endurance and patience with joy"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Beginning in March 2025, we began focusing on the ministries at First Baptist Church of Upper Marlboro through this 'Ministry Spotlight.' <u>Audio/Visual Ministry / Leader Deacon Mosi Winder.</u>

Praying Psalm 23 — Goodness and Mercy, Every Day

For 2 or 3 days this week, set aside 15 minutes to pray through Psalm 23. For help on how to pray the Psalm, refer back to

the insert "Singing and Praying the Psalms Guide"

Psalm 23 A Psalm of David. ¹ The Lord is my shepherd; I shall not want. ² He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. ³ He restores my soul. He leads me in paths of righteousness for his name's sake. ⁴ Even though I walk through the valley of the shadow of death, I will fear no evil, for you are with me; your rod and your staff, they comfort me. ⁵ You prepare a table before me in the presence of my enemies; you anoint my head with oil; my cup overflows. ⁶ Surely goodness and mercy shall follow me all the days of my life, and I shall dwell in the house of the LORD forever.

Praising God: What does Psalm 23 teach about who God is that is worthy of praise? What difference does God's shepherding care, presence, and provision make?

Confessing Sin: What are other 'shepherds' you tend to trust in and look to (other than God) to care for you and your needs? How are you tempted to think 'wrongly' about God?

Following God: Pray for the grace to let God's idea of what's good and right shape our wants. Pray we are restored, strengthened, and guided by God and His Word more than our subjective feelings. Pray we live confidently in light of God's presence with us.

Things to Pray for First Baptist Church:

- 1. Pray that we reminder each other of God's goodness, sovereignty, and watchful care throughout the week.
- 2. Pray that the reality of God's presence would be known and vanquish sinful fear in our lives

Singing and Praying the Psalms

Psalm 23

"Goodness and Mercy, Every Day" – July 13, 2025



Introduction

This Psalm is probably the most well-known Psalms in all the Bible. In fact, it is probably the most well-known passage of scripture in all the Bible. This Psalm has brought comfort to those in need. It is filled with comfort and hope for the people of God. Do you long for comfort? Do you long for a lasting rest?

While these words bring comfort and hope, they can also be dangerous. If taken out of context, these words lead to a false sense of security. We often look for contentment and rest in other places. True rest only comes by relying on God. Where do you look for rest and protection? From God? Or do you look in other places?

This Psalm offers profound comfort and solace, but this Psalm is about God - Who He is and what He is like. The ability to say, "I shall not want;" "I shall fear no evil;" and "I shall dwell in the house of the Lord," are only found in God! We see two pictures of God in this Psalm: God as our Shepherd and God as our Host. He is the one Who takes the initiative to care for His people.

Sermon Outline

- 1. Follow the Good Shepherd. Vs. 1 4
- 2. Feast with the Good Host. Vs. 5 6

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1 - 4

David was a shepherd, and eventually, he was chosen and anointed as King of Israel. Don't think of David as a delicate, "momma's boy" who spent his time writing poetry. He was a strong man, able to kill what would be a danger to the sheep. As David looked back at his life, he was able to see that God was his shepherd who protected and provided for him.

The book begins and ends with "The LORD" - God's covenant name. God's name shows who God is. It shows His character. In Exodus 3:13-15, He tells Moses to tell the people of Israel that He is "I AM" - the eternal, never created, self-existent One who relies on no one but Himself. He never grows weary. Don't forget who your Shepherd is! He is the LORD. He can meet all of our needs. (Psalm 24:1-2)

Notice Davis says that "the LORD is 'my' shepherd." This relationship is personal. Contentment comes from knowing God personally as your shepherd. Can you say that He is your Shepherd? To have that personal relationship, you must walk through the door of the sheepfold. (<u>John 10-1-18</u>; <u>John 14:6</u>) It is then that we experience His good care. You shall not want for ANYTHING, EVER! The word for "want" here does not mean that God will give us all that we ask for. The word "want" means "not lacking what we need." Do you need to calibrate your sense of need to be in tune with what God provides?

As you read verse two, slow down and enjoy the imagery. Do you see the green grass and rolling hills? They are vast with plenty to satisfy. Weary sheep find rest in these pastures. What does this mean practically? How can we move to this? It is through God's word, our soul is revived. (Psalm 19:7) The still water is imagery of the Holy Spirit who enlightens and cleanses our soul. The food is an image of God's word. Is your soul weary? Have you been neglecting the green pastures of God's word? (Matthew 4:4) Read God's word on a daily basis, and make it a priority to gather as a church family to sing, read, pray and hear the preaching of God's word.

Sheep need a shepherd. Jesus, our Good Shepherd leads because He knows what is right. When you look back, do you see how God has led you? Could you have ever imagined that He would have led you down the paths on which you have traveled? It isn't wrong to make plans, but you must hold them with an open hand. We must be careful to not put our feelings and plans in the driver's seat where Jesus must be. He knows what is right and good. Will you trust Him? You may not be able to see or understand God's providence now, but when you look back, you will see that He has led you, over and over, in paths of righteousness. Why can we be confident of this? It is for His glory! By binding His honor and name to this, we can be confident of His care. It is not based on your performance; it is based on the sake of His name!

If you pause the Psalm here, you will be tempted to think that life is easy and pleasant all of the time. Verse four shows us something additional and different - the wilderness and deep darkness. In verses one through three, God is the Good Shepherd Who leads. In verse four, He is still leading, but sometimes the paths of righteousness are through the valley of the shadow of death. Does that sound strange to you? God's rule extends to the valley; His sovereignty includes the valley. What valleys have you been through? Are you in the valley now? Do you feel lost, confused, or overwhelmed? Jesus is not lost or confused. It is HIS valley. He is in charge of the valley, and He knows the way out. He is the living Shepherd Who will not fail!!

Jesus laid down for the sheep. (Isaiah 53:6) In your sin and rebellion, you deserve death and Hell. Jesus willingly laid down His life in your place as a substitute for those who would trust Him. He went through the valley of the shadow of death, but on the third day, He rose from the grave victorious! Left to yourself, you are alienated from God by sin. You must turn from your self-reliance and turn to God. Trust in Christ today! You will not stay in the valley; those who walk through the valley, emerge triumphant. The Shepherd is WITH you!! The deeper the valley, the closer your Shepherd is to you. You need not fear.

The rod mentioned in verse four is a weapon used by the shepherd to protect the sheep. The staff is used to pull sheep out of a ditch and to count the flock. Each sheep matters. If you are drifting or missing, the Shepherd will go after you. The Christian life is personal, but sheep are always part of a flock. It is important to be a part of a local church where we can encourage, admonish, and pray for one another and where pastors can point church members to the Good Shepherd.

2. Read vs. 5-6

The imagery shifts here from a shepherd to a host. We find ourselves as a guest at a table with a Host who has prepared a lavish feast. God's care is so complete, loving and personal, meeting all the needs of the guests. He embraces you, welcomes you, and anoints your head with oil. There is a beautiful feast prepared by the host. This is a celebration - the best food on the best dishes! He fills your goblet to overflowing because He is generous. He is a glad hearted host! Do you see God this way?

When you see the truth of Who God is, it changes the way you live - even in the presence of your enemies. You can feast and enjoy because He set the table. Your care is banked on His name. God is good, and He has your good in mind. Satan will try to convince you otherwise - that is a lie, and he has been doing this since <u>Genesis</u> chapter three. Don't believe the lie!!

See God's goodness in verse six. Goodness and mercy will "pursue" or "chase" you all the days of your life! Sometimes we run from God because we mistake Him for the bad guy. He is not out to get you and make you miserable. He is the Good Shepherd and the generous Host. He pursues you with goodness and steadfast love ALL the days of your life. You can dwell in the house of the LORD forever. You will dwell with God in Heaven forever. (Revelation 21 & 22)

Why does God lead you through the valley if He is the Good Shepherd and the generous Host? He wants something better for you. He wants Himself for you. True and lasting contentment is only found in God. Come to Him. He will restore your weary soul.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of July 13th, 2025

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
