Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of August 3

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of 1 Corinthians 1:4-7a as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to give thanks to God for the work He has done in the brothers and sisters in Christ in our church family.

"I give thanks to my God always for you because of the grace of God that was given you in Christ Jesus, that in every way you were enriched in him in all speech and all knowledge—even as the testimony about Christ was confirmed among you—so that you are not lacking in any gift..."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1
 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for those recently effected by natural disasters (flooding in Texas and New York). Pray God would provide for immediate needs and preserve life. Pray God would comfort those grieving the death of loved ones. Pray for relief workers to work safely and quickly to bring stability (Psalm 119:88; 34:18)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/ Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Hospitality Ministry

Welcome is defined as greeting the arrival of a person with pleasure or kindly courtesy.

This is the case here at First Baptist Church of Upper Marlboro. Each Sunday morning we have a Hospitality Ministry that provides greeters ready to greet everyone with a welcoming handshake, warm smile, and willingness to serve.

"Our responsibility is to exhibit the attitude and practice of Christian welcoming, which provides the atmosphere and opportunity in which visitors and guests can feel accepted, included, and loved. We see Greeters as our front line ministers of welcoming, and providing the first official point of contact with this congregation."



When you consider that these are the people that God draws to our church so that the gospel can be heard, seen, and felt, we want to do everything we can to ensure this experience. We do this by making sure we show care and compassion toward those that God draws to Him. People bond to people, so our role is to help build or bridge relationships and friendships as people enter God's church. The atmosphere shifts when a person feels welcomed in

God's church. If we can make a person feel welcome, comfortable, and loved we know a barrier has been broken and maybe a new relationship can be formed.

Ministry Spotlight



The Hospitality team provides members and guests with information about our Sunday service. The team also helps connect members and guests with church staff and makes our members and guests aware of where to find information about the church and its programs and services.

Typically, Hospitality team members are asked by our visitors and guests for information about the

church, Sunday school (DiscipleLIFE) classes, new member's classes, locations of facilities and rooms within the church such as quiet rooms or comfort rooms, restrooms, and other spaces outside of the sanctuary. Team members are often asked to assist in helping to identify or locate members and/or guests during church services, which makes getting to know members of the congregation an important priority.

Though not required, team members may be asked to serve on occasions based on their availability. This might include serving during special church programs or services as requested by church staff for services not typically held on Sundays. However, there is no requirement to serve outside of Sunday services.



Now that you have an overview about the Hospitality Ministry. Next week we will discuss what it takes to join this team and learn the expectations of those serving. Praying Psalm 33 — Stand in Awe of God

For 2 or 3 days this week, set aside 15 minutes to pray through Psalm 33. For help on how to pray the Psalms, refer back to the bulletin insert from July 6 "Singing and Praying the Psalms Guide".

Psalm 33. THE STEADFAST LOVE OF THE LORD. ¹ Shout for joy in the LORD, O you righteous! Praise befits the upright. ² Give thanks to the LORD with the lyre; make melody to him with the harp of ten strings! ³ Sing to him a new song; play skillfully on the strings, with loud shouts.

Praising God: Take a moment to review the commands in vv1-3. Is your relationship with God marked by this fervency, joy, and zeal? What is true about God in vv4-19 that help us to praise, give thanks, and shout for joy?

Confessing Sin: Are there times you have grumbled and complained rather than trusted God's fatherly hand that works all things together for your good? In a search for security are their ways your heart has trusted in false hopes for salvation (v17) rather than waiting on God (vv20-22)? If so, confess your sin to God.

Following God: Take some time to reflect on the reasons to praise God in vv4-19. Based on those objectives truths, listen to and sing (with loud shouts) the truths of Psalm 33 with the help of the song we sang together, "Glorious" (see below).

Things to Pray for First Baptist Church:

- **1.** Pray that God helps us to see the beauty of God, to fear the Lord, and stand in awe of Him such that praise is 'befits' us.
- **2.** Pray that God uses our joyful, confident hope in God to adorn our proclamation of the good news so that 'all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of Him' (v8)!

Singing Psalm 33 — "Glorious"

Having prayed through Psalm 33, now take the time to sing a song that was inspired by the truths of the psalm titled, "Glorious", by Sovereign Grace Music. ⁴ For the word of the LORD is upright, and all his work is done in faithfulness. ⁵ He loves righteousness and justice; the earth is full of the steadfast love of the LORD.

⁶ By the word of the LORD the heavens were made, and by the breath of his mouth all their host. ⁷ He gathers the waters of the sea as a heap; he puts the deeps in storehouses.

⁸ Let all the earth fear the LORD; let all the inhabitants of the world stand in awe of him! ⁹ For he spoke, and it came to be; he commanded, and it stood firm.

Singing and Praying the Psalms

Psalm 33

"Stand in Awe of God" – August 3, 2025



Introduction

In <u>1 Thessalonians</u>, the Apostle Paul reminds us to give thanks in all things. Yes, you heard that correctly. If you are struggling under the weight of difficult circumstances, you may find this a challenge. How can you be thankful in difficult situations without faking it? Do you just grin and bear it? Is it possible to have real, heartfelt, genuine joy, hope and peace in the darkest of circumstances?

As we look at the big picture of Psalm 22, notice how it begins and ends. The psalmist begins with a command to "shout for joy to the Lord." This command isn't just for people who are in good, comfortable circumstances. It applies to people in difficult circumstances and trials as well. Do you think that this command feels cruel and hard?

Skip to the end...the psalmist says that "our heart IS glad in Him." Between those verses, something happened. Shouting for joy became a reality at the end. Even if the psalmist was in tough circumstances and suffering, his heart was glad. How did he get there?

Read & Discuss

1. Read vs. 1-3

Each week, we begin our time of worship with a call of worship. That is what the psalmist does here with six commands -shout for joy, give thanks, praise, make melody, sing, play skillfully on an instrument.

While you sing, you can have a fresh heart of grace as you sing. God will use a song or set of songs as a way to encourage you. When you see the glory of God, you should sing loudly because He is worthy. Sing loudly for others to hear so they can be encouraged. You can build up others by singing loudly.

Look at these verses as a mirror and ask yourself, "does this loud, exuberant praise describe me?" What is your relationship with God? Is it a burden or a duty? Now, there may be days when your walk with God seems dry. You are not on the mountain top every day. That is why you need to sing. Singing the Bible has a way of taking a cold heart and making it blaze again. Rich, beautiful doctrine, put to music, can fan the flame of your heart. Praise is fitting and beautiful for the upright.

When you are hurting and suffering, singing and giving thanks doesn't seem to fit, does it? What does seem more fitting to complain, grumble and doubt. This psalm reminds us that if you are a Christian, praise is fitting - it is appropriate in all circumstances. As a Christian, you have come to know something you couldn't see before - the glorious truths of God and His word.

2. Read vs. 4 - 19

There are two categories of reasons for praise that the psalmist includes here - God's word and God's eye.

You can praise God because God's word is **good**, righteous, straight. (vs. 4) God loves righteousness and justice. (vs. 5) Often people can be unreliable in keeping their word. Sometimes the results of that can be devastating. God is not unreliable. What He says, He always does. He is faithful and good.

God's word is **powerful**. The universe in which we live didn't just happen by chance. (vs. 6) God spoke creation into existence. He created every star, put them in their place and gave each one a name. He gathered all the quintillion gallons of water by His word. He is the Creator of all things. The proper response is to "fear the Lord;" be in awe of Him. God spoke, and it came to be! When God speaks into the darkness, "let there be light," there is light. Remember, God's word is not just a book. It is a person. (John 1:1-5) If God's word is only good and not powerful, He wants to help you but He can't. If His word is only powerful and not good, God is a tyrant. God's

word is both good and powerful.

God's word is also **caring**. God's plans are not cold, they are the plans of His heart. His words express his sovereignty for your good. Do you see why this is a reason to shout for joy and give thanks in every circumstance? He not only upholds the universe by the word of his power, but God's word is for our good. (Romans 8:28) This is God's providence. Nothing comes to us by chance. It comes by His Fatherly hand.

We can't see God's Fatherly hand. What we do see are wars, diseases, death, etc. We can't see the spiritual world. If we can't see this, how can we know that God is good? God see's what we can't see. (vs. 12-19) The Lord looks, observes, and sees. We can know that God is good and powerful and that He cares because God sees. He knows. He cares.

He sees you, and at first glance, that is terrifying. He sees everything you do. What if your evil thoughts, sinful words and sinful actions were put on the big screen for people to see? One day they will be put on the big screen. The all-seeing eye of God doesn't just see all the evil done TO you, but all the evil you have done and do. It is terrifying to know that all of our sin exposed before a holy God. Nothing earthly can help you. Your goodness cannot save you.

What hope is there? The nations raged against God's anointed - Jesus. They wanted to get rid of Jesus. (Psalm 2) When they had the opportunity, they crucified Jesus. This was the greatest injustice. Jesus did nothing deserving of death. People didn't understand. Where is the moral outrage for such an atrocity? If we only look with our eyes, it seems that praise for God would not be fitting. However, God saw what He was doing - He was working the plans of His heart. He was saving a people for Himself. Jesus' death, burial and resurrection brought the plans of the nations to nothing. Jesus took all of our sin, guilt, and shame and nailed it to the cross and exchanged it for His righteousness. You can shout for joy to the Lord because of what Jesus has done for you!! You have been made whole.

3. Read vs. 20 - 22

We've gone from the command in verse one to the experience of expressing joy in vs. 20-22. Remember, you must take your eyes off of yourself and your circumstances and look to God. This news must be shared. It is not only for you, but also for the inhabitants of the world. This is your mission. Think of a person you love who needs to be brought into the joy of the Lord. How do we share this joy with them? Through worship. The church is the nation that is blessed. (1 Peter 2:9)

The world is a mess. It has been that way since Genesis 3. The church is to be different from the world by giving thanks in every situation. The church isn't spared from the storm, but the church has peace in the storm. Will you join us as we seek to bring others to experience this joy?

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
