Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of September 14

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Ephesians 3:14-16:

14 For this reason I bow my knees before the Father,
 15 from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named,
 16 that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being,

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1
 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)

Ordinance Ministry

The Ordinance Ministry serve the essential doctrines of the Baptist Church. This ministry service includes the ordinance of Baptism and Communion (or the Lord's Supper). Christian Baptism is the immersion of a believer in water symbolizing: a believer's faith in the crucified, buried, and risen Savior, Jesus Christ; the believer's death to sin; the burial of the old life; and the resurrection to walk in newness of life in Christ Jesus. The Lord's Supper is an act of obedience by the Lord's command for the universal church through the partaking of bread, which symbolizes His body which is laid down for us, and fruit of the vine, symbolizing His blood which was shed for us. We do this in remembrance of the death of the Redeemer, Christ Jesus and the anticipation of his second coming.

BAPTISM: Our church invites anyone interested in learning more about our church and church membership to attend Starting Point. Starting Point opens up for a new believer or a current believer, details about our church which includes the doctrines that we follow to include the ordinance of Baptism and the Lord's Supper. If the person attending Starting Point acknowledges that they believe in the Lord and would like to join this body of believers, an elder of our church walks alongside the potential candidate (new convert) or believer joining from another faith that have not been baptized by immersion to prepare for their Baptism. Baptism follows after their profession of faith and evidence of regeneration. To witness a Baptism, is to witness the outward profession of an inward spiritual conversion and rebirth, which is nothing short of miraculous. The work of God is evident in the extraordinary transformation of their heart and soul when an individual experiences a profound change in their beliefs and values, leading to a renewed commitment to follow Christ Jesus. It is a testament to God's grace and mercy, as He forgives sins and grants the convert a new life in Christ Jesus. It is exceptionally rewarding to hear the personal heartfelt testimony of the recently converted. During the Baptism, the Ordinance Ministry carries out the duties of ensuring that the candidates for Baptism are prepared and have what they need and comfort them if they have any concerns.

Ministry Spotlight

LORD'S SUPPER: With the help of our devoted deacons and others, every first Sunday the Ordinance Ministry serves the Lord's Supper to like-minded believers who have accepted Christ and understand the significance of his sacrifice. Prior to Communion, believers (congregants) should examine their heart and be free from unrepentant sin or have sought and received forgiveness and reconciliation through confession of their sin.

It is an opportunity for the church to renew its covenant and commune with the Lord and with one another as family and fellow believers in Christ in remembrance of Christ's death and the benefits of the New Covenant; a privilege available only to believers.

The celebration of the sacraments helps remind us of our relationship and commitment with God and our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ.

Praying Psalm 42 — When Your Soul Is in the Dumps

For 2 or 3 days this week, set aside 15 minutes to pray through Psalm 42. For help on how to pray the Psalms, refer back to the bulletin insert from July 6 "Singing and Praying the Psalms Guide".

Psalm 42. Why Are You Cast Down, O My Soul? ¹ As a deer pants for flowing streams, so pants my soul for you, O God. ² My soul thirsts for God, for the living God. When shall I come and appear before God?

Why are you cast down, O my soul, and why are you in turmoil within me? Hope in God; for I shall again praise him, my salvation ⁶ and my God.

My soul is cast down within me; therefore I remember you from the land of Jordan and of Hermon, from Mount Mizar. ⁷ Deep calls to deep at the roar of your waterfalls; all your breakers and your waves have gone over me. ⁸ By day the Lord commands his steadfast love, and at night his song is with me, a prayer to the God of my life. ⁹ I say to God, my rock: "Why have you forgotten me? Why do I go mourning because of the oppression of the enemy?" ¹⁰ As with a deadly wound in my bones, my adversaries taunt me, while they say to me all the day long, "Where is your God?"

Praising God: Psalm 42 helps us navigate the times in life when our soul is in the dumps. In those moments, we can feel abandoned (v3) or forgotten (v9). But in the moments it may feel like God has abandoned His child, He is there! Notice in v8 'the LORD commands his steadfast love.' God's steadfast love is His covenant, unfailing, I'm not going anywhere love. Are you in a dark place? Praise God for His steadfast love for you!

Confessing Sin: There are many places we can put our hope; this Psalm helps us to put our hope in the right place: in God (see v5, 11). Have you put your hope in circumstances, people, praise, money, or other things? If so, confess that and put your hope in God!

Following God: The psalmist both pours out his heart in honest prayer (v4) and tells himself the truth (v5, 11). Take time to come to God with the burdens you're carrying and be honest, pour out your heart to Him and tell your soul the truth about God, yourself, and reality – as the Bible lays it out for us.

Things to Pray for First Baptist Church:

- **1.** Pray that we would thirst for God as the Psalmist does (v1-2). Pray that we turn away from the empty cisterns of the world's muck and drink deeply from the living water of Christ (Jer. 2:13, John 6:35)
- **2.** Pray that God uses our corporate gatherings on Sunday to fan into flame an unfailing hope in God who is our Savior. Pray we check in, pray for, and strengthen each other in the Lord throughout the week (Heb. 10:24-25)

Singing and Praying the Psalms

Psalm 42

"When Your Soul is in the Dumps" – September 14, 2025



Introduction

There are many places in life where you can fall into the pit. If you have read <u>Pilgrim's Progress</u>, you know that Christian met many different people on his way to the Celestial City. One of them was Pliable. Along the way, he and Pliable fell in the Slew of Despond. They struggled to get out, and Pliable became discouraged. He got out, but left Christian alone to struggle. Can you relate to Christian? Is your life what you hoped it to be? What has discouraged you? Sometimes, you wake up and you are discouraged and you don't know why. There seems to be a dark cloud following you. God may seem distant. Do real, genuine Christians struggle with despair like that?

The Psalms are known as the hymnbook of the people of God. Some of these songs are exuberant praise. But in a world filled with sin, betrayal, and brokenness, the reality is that life isn't always happy. Christians can get depressed. What do you do with that? What can miserable Christians sing? We have songs of lament like the one we see here in Psalm 42 - a God-inspired song to help you navigate seasons of discouragement and depression.

Sermon Outline

- 1. What causes spiritual depression?
- 2. The cures for spiritual depression

Read & Discuss

1. What causes spiritual depression? There are four reasons.

When God feels distant - Vs. 2 The image in verse one and two is a deer dying of thirst. This is what the psalmist feels like. He was longing to appear before the face of God. He longed to be gathered with God's people and to have fellowship with God, but he couldn't. (Vs. 6) He very likely had been captured and was on his way to exile. We don't know the reason. Do you hear his angst in Vs. 9? He felt like God had forgotten him. Even worse, he felt rejected. (43:2) This is why he couldn't sleep or eat. (Vs. 3) Can you identify with the psalmist? Do you ever feel like this? Do you feel like you can't find God? If you are in this moment, you will know the same spiritual depression of the psalmist.

The memory of better days - <u>Vs. 4</u> Sometimes those memories can act as an anchor for the soul, but sometimes those memories haunt us. You will remember the torments of sin. The psalmist was part of the sons of Korah who used to lead in worship, but they had been forced out of the city and lost their job. They felt useless because the job was a part of their identity.

The relentless nature of trials - <u>Vs. 7</u> Sometimes waves and waterfalls can be beautiful, but sometimes they can be dangerous. Have you ever noticed that trials don't come solo, but in twos, threes, four or more? The waterfalls and waves that the psalmist mentions are in the plural form. This can be overwhelming causing you to despair. Has there been a time when you felt the waves crashing on you?

The presence of enemies - Vs. 9 It seems that the situation here was that the psalmist had been captured by an enemy and held captive. Then the enemy taunted him asking "Where is your God?" "Why didn't He protect you?" This may lead you to ask the same questions. The psalmist understood that gathering with God's people was a means of divine grace. Some of our members are unable to attend even though they'd love to be here. Illness, age, or service may prevent them. However, it is tragic when a believer cuts themselves off. They miss Sunday by choice, and then they wonder why God feels so distant and their faith is weak. We need each other. (Hebrew 10:25) Gathering together is a opportunity to experience God's covenant grace.

These are not the only causes of spiritual depression. The Devil or spiritual warfare, one's own temperament that leans to the discouraged side can cause spiritual depression. Even a physical cause can lead to spiritual depression. Remember Elijah? (1 Kings 19) Our soul and body are connected.

2. The cure for spiritual depression.

Pray honestly - <u>Vs. 4</u> The psalmist poured out His soul. He came with all that was in his heart whether it was anger, fear, or anxiety. He asked God, "Why?" He brought his honest questions to the Lord. We know that complaining is wrong. (<u>Philippians 2:14</u>) However, there is a difference between complaining about God and complaining to God. Is it easy to get discouraged? Yes. We don't have to look far to see things that are discouraging. Events like the past week are hard. They call for us to pray for God's justice and mercy. They also cause us to lament. How did you respond to the events of the week? Prayers of lament are prayers in pain that lead you to trust. Run to this Psalm when you are in the dumps. This psalm is God's gift to help us.

Recall the truth about God - Vs. 6 Passivity is your enemy. You must actively engage your mind to read scripture and think about what is true <u>about</u> God. The psalmist recalls the sovereignty of God. To whom do the waterfalls and waves belong? They are God's. They are under His rule and sovereignty. God is good and wise. His hand never slips. We can rest confidently because He is using these things for our good. The psalmist recalls God's love - His covenant love - that never fails or goes anywhere. God commands His steadfast love - it is there! Our living God will carry us in our despair.

Speak, **out loud**, **the truth** - <u>Vs. 5</u>, <u>11</u> Who is the psalmist talking to in those verses? His own soul. He is preaching to himself. We should talk to ourselves – out loud! Most of your unhappiness in life is caused by the fact that you are *listening* to yourself instead of *talking* to yourself. Ask yourself: Why do you feel so upset? What am I so afraid of? Why is God not enough for me in this situation? Go to another brother or sister in Christ for help and for prayer. We should ask these questions as we counsel each other. Ask questions to expose what the person is hoping in and then to change the nature of that hope - Hope in God who will not fail.

Hope in God - <u>Vs. 5</u>, <u>11</u>, <u>43:5</u> You must tell yourself to HOPE IN GOD, knowing that you will again praise Him. He is your Hope and Your God. By the end of the psalm, the circumstances have not changed, but the psalmist ends in hope. Everyone's soul thirsts for something. Do you have the things for which your soul thirsts? Do you fear you will lose the thing for which you have hoped? They are not meant to quench your soul's thirst. Do you understand that our deepest thirst as a human being, is our soul's thirst for God? Hoping in God will never be in vain. Jesus is our example. He knew what it meant to suffer, to be taunted, to be rejected. Jesus' enemies asked, "where is your God?" The psalmist's limited perspective led him to think that God had rejected Him, but He hadn't. (<u>Vs. 8</u>) On the cross, Jesus was forsaken. He took our place bearing the wrath of God. In that awful moment, Jesus cried, "My God, My God, why have you forsaken me?" In love, Jesus willingly accepted being forsaken by the Father so that you and I could be accepted and that our soul could be satisfied in God. (<u>John 6:35-37</u>) If you come to Him in faith and repentance, you will not be cast out. Your sin will be forgiven, and you will be reconciled to God. Come to Jesus. Hope in Him. Feel His grace today.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of September 14th, 2025

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
