*History of the Nicene Creed

Knowing the historical context of the Nicene Creed of 325A.D. can help us appreciate the truths it declares. In the early fourth century, a preacher named Arius began to teach false doctrine such as: 1) God the Father alone is God; 2) Jesus Christ is a created being; and 3) there was a time when Christ did not exist. About 220 elders gathered in the town of Nicaea (in modern-day Turkey) to address Arius' false teaching. They wrote a brief statement in biblical language to clarify that Christians believe Jesus Christ is fully God, and that those who believe and teach anything less lack biblical faith. We have omitted one paragraph that condemns a particular false teaching of the time.

At First Baptist Church, we believe Scripture teaches that at the center of our faith is Christ, Himself. Therefore, we rejoice in joining with saints through the centuries who have confessed the same biblical truth.

A Prayer Guide for the week of September 21

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Ephesians 3:14-16:

14 For this reason I bow my knees before the Father,
 15 from whom every family in heaven and on earth is named,
 16 that according to the riches of his glory he may grant you to be strengthened with power through his Spirit in your inner being,

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1
 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)

Ordinance Ministry

Let's take a look behind the scenes on the day of the Baptism with the Ordinance Ministry. When a candidate for Baptism arrives at 9:30am we escort them to the changing quarters to assist them in preparing for Baptism and to field any of their questions or concerns. We familiarize participants with their accommodations and provide any necessary instructions and make them aware of any safety precautions. After individuals are dressed, we meet with the pastor to pray, review their testimony, and provide an overview of the Baptism protocol. As the worship service begins, the individual and pastor enter the Baptism pool and ministry members prepare to open the curtain. At

the conclusion of the Baptism, ordinance members assist the newly baptized individual to their separate changing quarters and ensure the area is appropriately maintained.

Baptism is always a special and important time, not only in the life of the newly converted, but also ministry members and the church, as a whole. It is during their testimony that we are able to see the tangible and personal work of Christ in another's life and are reminded of his work in ours. It is then, too, that our family is enlarged and we reflect on God's good gifts toward us.

Now, let's take a look behind the scenes on the Lord's Supper with the Ordinance Ministry. Prior to the Sunday worship service, available deacons are identified to assist with distribution of the elements for the Lord's Supper. Ministry members meet at 8:00 am to place the elements (bread and juice) in trays for completion prior to the start of DiscipleLIFE classes (Sunday School). An important step we take prior to preparing the elements is praying for the worship service and everyone who partakes in the Lord's Supper, as this ordinance is such a sacred and spiritual act of remembering Christ's sacrifice towards the redeemed. In addition to preparing the twelve trays that are placed on the altar for the congregants, trays are also prepared for the comfort rooms, ChildLIFE care leaders, and for individuals with specific dietary needs. After the sermon, the pastor leads the congregation in renewing the church covenant and the elements are served by the deacons. At the conclusion of the worship service, ministry members remove remaining elements and store the supplies.

Ministry Spotlight

There are currently four (4) members of the Ordinance Ministry for Baptism and the Lord's Supper. You may not know that our very own, Sylvia Lowry bakes the bread and ensures we have enough for Communion. Crucial to our ministry is the faithful participation of church Elders, Deacons and the Hospitality Team, and others. Our ministry members typically meet on the day of a Baptism and the Lord's Supper to prepare participants



Testimony from Deacon Leslie Fleet: "Leading the Ordinance Ministry is a profound, soul-stirring, and humbling experience. It serves as a reminder of the personal sacrifice Christ made for me. It is a sobering reminder of how his body was bruised for my iniquities, that I might have a right to eternal life. I am also reminded of our covenant with each other as a church family, and to love and give sacrificially as Christ has for us."

As you consider where you might serve in our church, you should know our ministry is neither labor nor time intensive. You just need to have a heart for God and his people; and the willingness to serve. Any *church member* is eligible to assist the Ordinance Ministry. We generally only meet on the days we serve. *If you are interested in joining our ministry, please contact Deacon Leslie Fleet for additional information. We would love to have you.*

Praying Psalm 27 — The Lord Is My Light

For 2 or 3 days this week, set aside 15 minutes to pray through Psalm 27. For help on how to pray the Psalms, refer back to the bulletin insert from July 6 "Singing and Praying the Psalms Guide".

Psalm 27. THE LORD IS MY LIGHT AND MY SALVATION. ¹ The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear? The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?

Praising God: Take a moment to reflect on the significance and meaning of God being our 'light,' 'salvation,' and 'stronghold' (vv1-2). Are there ways you are lost in darkness or threatened? Praise God for who unchangingly IS with fresh confidence.

Confessing Sin: David asks for God to lead him 'on a level path' in the day of trouble. Are there ways you've taken a sinful shortcut and excused it because of the difficulty you're in? Take a moment to confess any sinful compromise and ask God, 'Teach me your way' (v11).

Following God: Obeying God means there will be times you will have to wait on Him, and waiting can cause our hope to wither. David would have despaired lest he believed he would 'look upon the goodness of the Lord' (v13). Pray for God to strengthen you while you wait on Him (v14).

Things to Pray for First Baptist Church:

- 1. Pray that we seek God with the singular zeal and passion David models for us in v4 'one thing have I asked...to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord.'
- **2.** Pray our hearts fear God more than man such that we know the confidence David exhibits, even when surrounded by enemies (v3).

³ Though an army encamp against me, my heart shall not fear; though war arise against me, yet I will be confident.

Singing and Praying the Psalms

Psalm 27

"The Lord is My Light" – September 21, 2025



Introduction

Do you remember the story of David and Goliath? Goliath, the Philistine giant, taunted the army of Israel. David came along and fearlessly defeated him. (1 Samuel 17) Do you want to be fearless like David? (Psalm 112) or the Godly women in Proverbs 31? In reality, fear is all around us. You may worry about being left out, rejected, having or not having a relationship, illness, death, etc. Do you wrestle with fear? We all do in some shape or fashion. What do we do with fear? David had the temptation to fear, and there were times when he was afraid. How did he handle fear?

Sermon Outline

- 1. Be confident in who God is. Vs. 1-3
- 2. David delights in the beauty of God. Vs. 4-6
- 3. Resolve to walk in God's way. Vs. 7-12
- 4. Hope in God. Vs. 13-14

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 1 – 3

David was confident about who God is. How do you feel in potentially dangerous situations? Some situations, that we may think of, are hypothetical. David was in real danger. He could have felt fear, but his confidence was rooted in the character of God. He reminded himself of God's unchanging nature, and that gave him confidence.

God is a light that shows us the way. God was David's light. God knows all things perfectly. He declares the beginning from the end. God was David's salvation who would deliver him from his enemies. He was David's stronghold - a fortress that could not be overtaken. What about you? You probably don't have enemies out to kill you, but you may have days of trouble. No matter how big (or small) your problem is, this Psalm is for you.

How does David have this confidence? David knew the LORD - Yahweh. This is the name of God who makes and keeps covenant promises to His people. David had a relationship with God. David referred to God as "my" light, "my" salvation, and "my" stronghold. God IS all of those things to David and to you. It doesn't change - present tense - all of the time. It doesn't depend on your feelings. It is truth.

The beast may be ferocious and the army might be big, but they don't stand a chance against God who is a light, salvation, and stronghold. Is God all of these things to you? Whom shall you fear? Of what will you be afraid? What can man do to you? God is the same every day.

2. Read Vs. 4-6

The beauty of the Lord is the truth about who God is. Do you see God for who he really is? (Psalm 50:2) He is wise, just, powerful, etc.. It is one thing for you to know, cognitively, the truth about God, but it is quite another to delight in it. Being a Christian means tasting and seeing the goodness of God. Have you experienced this? Is God delightful to you? If you are not tasting and seeing His goodness, you are not seeing Him rightly.

What does "delighting in God" have to do with fear? David longed to gaze upon the beauty of the Lord, because God would hide him in the day of trouble - loss of a job, sickness, grief, etc. How did "delighting in God's beauty" change David? His head was lifted up. He is able to walk in the presence of his enemies with his head held high. He had joy, singing and making melodies to the Lord. His joy was not rooted in circumstances or feeling, but in the truth of Who God is.

Are you overwhelmed with the sense of the goodness of God in good times AND in bad? Do you seek after God as a means to an end, or do you seek Him for Him? David asked for one thing. He wanted to know God. David's joy was in God, so his enemies could not touch him. What you desire most reveals where your confidence lies. What does your heart desire? It isn't wrong to have desires, but if they become an end in and of themselves rather than a means to enjoy God, then they will not satisfy. **Pause today and take an inventory of your desires**. What do those desires say about where your confidence lies?

3. Read Vs. 7-13

There is a shift in these verses. Here, David is pleading with God. Hear me! Be Gracious to me! Answer me! Teach me! Why does he move from confidence to pleading? That's what it means to be a frail human being. Has this not been your experience? Strong belief and trust and then wavering faith?

Seeking God's face is similar to seeing the beauty of God. God's face refers to His saving presence. Why did David focus on the temple, the tent, the house? He was longing for the presence of God. The temple, the tent, or the house was where the Spirit of God dwelt. David wanted to be close to God. David was a sinner - a liar, murderer, and adulterer. He wrestled with wondering if God would forsake him. David asked for grace because he knew he didn't deserve to be heard. He reminded God of His invitation to seek His face. (Deuteronomy 4:29) God's promise pointed to His mercy. This left David with confidence in light of his sin. (Vs. 10) God will not forsake His own. His love is greater and stronger than the love of a parent. Do you wrestle with your worth? The LORD will take you in!! He will never leave you or forsake you. (Hebrews 13:5) This is the confidence that gave David the confidence to pray. It can give you confidence as well. (Matthew 6:5-14) Do you pray like David did in your day of trouble?

The worship of God leads to the obedience of God. Adoration leads to action. When it comes to obeying God, do you dread what you might lose? It's very easy to be self-focused on a day of trouble. The more we think about self, the less you think about God and other people. Are you afraid of what others will think of you? If you care about what others think of you, you will ride the rollercoaster of pride and fear. Love and worship God instead of looking in the mirror. Worship sets your feet on a level path.

4. Read Vs. 13-14

David believed that he would look on the goodness of the LORD in the land of the living. He didn't despair. He believed that God would deliver him. David then turned to the reader, telling them to wait and hope. This is expectant hope. Can you sing this psalm with confidence? When fear and worry are welling up in your heart, can you sing it? On what can you place your confidence? How do you claim these truths? Sin leaves us all separated from a Holy God. His face will turn away. It is only through Jesus, who can and will take away the sin your sin and the sin of the world. Jesus is able to sing this Psalm perfectly, and He invites you to sing it with Him. David looked forward to Jesus, and we look back to the cross. Jesus took the sin of all of the world - past, present, and future. The worst thing that can happen to you is for God to turn His face away from you. Jesus was forsaken so that you don't have to be. Come to Jesus. Repent and trust Him. It is then that you can have the face of God's favor and the joy of His presence.

Do you know that in Christ, as an adopted son or daughter of God, you can sing Psalm 27? Because of Jesus, you can confidently sing "the Lord is my light and my salvation! Because of Jesus, you have hope! You might have to wait, but we wait together. Be strong. Let your heart take courage. Wait for the Lord.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
