Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of October 26

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Romans 15:13:

"May the God of hope fill you with all joy and peace in believing, so that by the power of the Holy Spirit you may abound in hope."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1
 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace.
 Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)

 Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/ Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Praise God for making us members of one body, fellow heirs, fellow citizens, and partakers of God's great promises. (Eph 2:19; 3:6)

 with one another in a way that reveals God's steadfast love and mercy to the world. (Gal 6:9)
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in

 a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Widows Care Ministry

The New Testament in (Act 6 and I Timothy 5:3-10), provide direct instructions on why it is necessary to tend to widows, how to minister to widows, and establish structure such as the first deacons to oversee their care making it one of many important mandates the church should prioritize. Our church is no different, through the pastoral leadership understanding of the importance of Widow care and continuing to honor this biblical mandate through scriptural leadership training, bible teaching and preaching; and by identifying a need for support and assistance where necessary. Widow care is prioritized in the FBCUM annual budget and organized by church leadership, members who are widows, and members who have observed the unique challenges widows face.

FBCUM has established diaconate oversight of the Widows Care Ministry (along with other ministries in the church) to observe, stay in touch with our widows, and regularly communicate back to church leadership any practical needs, one-on-one support, physical or emotional challenges, and other support assistance. The ministry's leads work hand-in-hand with other church leaders/ministries to coordinate any overlapping support services necessary for our church widows. The widows of FBCUM have also taken up the mandate to support one another through gatherings, fellowship, scripture/prayers, one-on-one support, visitations, transportation assistance, and other light touch needs to help sustain the three aspects of encouragement, fellowship, and support for daily living principles of the ministry.

The focus and ministry mission is to establish care through a loving sense of awareness, promote and sustain spiritual growth, joy of life, and commitment to serving; emphasizing the importance of fellowship and staying active in the church, providing support and communication with those experiencing similar grief and loneliness; and offering spiritual, emotional, and physical support services as needed. For example:

• Encouragement – whether through outreach, prayer, meal deliveries, gentle care and hugs, sharing time and fond memories during holidays, emotional or family grief and loneliness periods, and sending cards or appropriate uplifting scriptures or reading materials.

Ministry Spotlight

- Fellowship which involves staying active and involved with church ministries and functions, staying in touch with church members and other widows, or providing outreach/mentoring to our youth and young adults. This may also include periodic phone calls, visitation, and outreach to other widows to solicit support for new widows of the church.
- Support identify immediate support needs, referral for benevolence assistance, personal care
 and emotional support, and solicit volunteers to help with home and yard care, auto/
 transportation needs, and other special needs as determined.

The bible mentions in I Timothy 5 "true widows" where Paul gives instructions to honor and care for those of certain age, qualifications, and with no other family support. The bible first instructs family members to provide care for the widow which our church is very blessed to have, but in absence of family support is when the church is called to help in any way.

The Widow Team discusses responsible budget and spending efforts according to scripture to ensure the focus is clearly aligned to support *true widow* care needs.

The team is structured to oversee and periodically outreach (as necessary) to those widows assigned to them and to report back to the Team leads on well-being and any specific needs for the awareness of FBCUM Elders/church leadership. The Team coordinates quarterly, and the Leads assess accomplishment of goals semi-annually.

The Widow Care Ministry is committed to the work of the Lord and as the name stresses, *care* for the widows and widowers of this church. The fact that each widow and widower is being prayed for by this team and given the time to reach out to provide help through service and social connections means the world to some. We are so thankful for this ministry and know that God will continue to bless their efforts and obedience to His call to look after His people.

Christmas Preparations

Malachi 4:1-6

"Make Read for the Lord a People" – October 26, 2025



Introduction

Malachi was a prophet who was preparing the people for the Kingdom of God. His message is as important today as it was in his day. The exiles had returned. It seemed as though God's people were on the right path, but they were developing a hard-heartedness. Malachi was giving them a stern warning to return to whole-hearted worship.

The worship of God's people had become hollow. You, too, can go through the motions of worship and yet not truly worship. Has your worship become mechanical? Religion without reverence was common at that time. It can be common today as well. They got comfortable and forgot God. What about you? Are you too comfortable? Have you forgotten God's place in your life?

God is a holy God. He will exact His perfect judgement on those who reject Him. If you are a believer, God has chosen you.

Sermon Outline

- 1. The righteous and the unrighteous ready yourselves. Vs. 1-3
- 2. A lifeline for hope vs. 4
- 3. A promise and a warning from God. Vs. 5-6

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 1 - 3

Following <u>verse six</u>, God will remain silent for 400 years. He will remain active, but there will be no new word from Him. Malachi prophesied for about 90 years. The remnant had returned to Judah, and the temple was rebuilt. In spite of the warnings, the people became defiant. In <u>chapter one</u>, the people kept asking, "How?" God, through Malachi, was telling them their sins, but the people kept asking, "How?"

God loved them. He loved them completely. He had chosen them. (1:2) In His love, He disciplined them. They doubted God's love. They corrupted worship. They didn't believe that judgement was coming. They stopped giving back to God.

Do you really understand what God is saying to you in the scripture? God is unchanging. The things that concerned God about Israel, are concerning Him now. He is the Lord of Hosts, perfect, sovereign and deserving of true worship. You fail in keeping God's commandments, but One will come who will follow the Law perfectly. The Israelites were blind to their disobedience. (Proverbs 19:3)

Is God enough for you? Do your eyes wander to other things that you think are more important? What do your calendar and checkbook say about you? The Israelite priests considered their service a burden. Is service to God a burden to you? God wants your worship, your love and to be first in your life.

In spite of their defiance, God was merciful. In <u>chapter three, verse one</u>, the Lord told them that He was sending a messenger. This messenger (John the Baptist) would prepare the way for the coming of the Lord, and in spite of their disobedience, God did not destroy them. God wanted them to return to Him. (3:7) The first three chapters of Malachi help us to understand why the book ends the way that it does. In chapter three, verses 16-18, we see the mercy of God. If you could look into the future and you knew when Jesus would return, would there be a difference in your life? Who do you know that needs to hear the message of the Gospel? The day of judgement is coming. (4:1) Are you ready? You don't need to clean yourself up to come to Jesus. Come as you are. Come in repentance and faith. God's warning of judgment is a message of grace and mercy. (Proverbs 24:24; Revelation 20:15; Matthew 13:41)

Then in <u>verse 2</u>, we see the word "but." What a wonderful word! For those who reverie the Lord, He makes things right. He will right all the wrongs. He is the Great Healer and Comforter! The response of God's

people will be pure joy.

2. Read Vs. 4

God knew that this was His last word to the people. He told them to hold on to what He has said to them. Remember!! Remember Who God is. Remember His Word. In the midst of suffering and trial, remember Who God is and what He has done for you! Take time today or this week to recount some of the things that God has done for you and how He has been faithful.

3. Read Vs. 18 - 25

God promised a prophet who would come. This prophet would come to call people back to God. The Israelites were waiting. God was moving in the life of Israel. They were being disciplined, ending up under Roman authority.

True revival brings reconciliation, first with God then others. The Messiah was coming. God would speak again - through Jesus. He is calling you to come to Him. In His mercy and grace, He is calling.

Malachi called the people to repentance. After 400 years of silence, John the Baptist called the people to repent. He didn't flatter or entertain. John the Baptist told the people the truth. He wasn't the Light, but he bore witness to the Light - Jesus. God's promise fulfilled. God is calling you to come to Him. Will you come? He is coming soon. (Revelation 22:20) Are you ready?

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Spend time praying together in response to God's word asking for His help and greater faith to follow Him in the week to come. If you missed the sermon on Sunday or would like to listen again, visit our website at.

- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
