Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of November 16

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as an inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul in Colossians 1:9a-10:

"9 And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you...

10 to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him:
bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace.
 Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)

 Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/ Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for our ministry leaders, deacons, and elders during this budget season as they pray and prepare a budget to present to the church. Pray for wisdom and a God-centered vision for how to use the resources that God has given our church. (James 1:5)
- Pray that good spiritual fruit would come from discipleship efforts in small groups, one to one meetings, and as people show hospitality to others in our church. (1 Pt 4:9; Gal 6:2)
- Pray God would guard our church from fear, anxiety, and disunity. Pray that we would trust that God is good and be assured that He is in control. (John 13:34-35)
- Pray our church family would not grow weary of doing good. Pray we would live and interact with one another in a way that reveals God's steadfast love and mercy to the world. (Gal 6:9)
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in

 a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Women's Ministry

The FBCUM Women's Ministry exists to provide Christ-centered opportunities for women to grow together, be equipped, and serve. This ministry facilitates women building up one another in love for the work of the ministry through prayer, discipleship, teaching, fellowship, service and evangelism. The Women's Ministry supports all FBCUM women and facilitates connections, coordination, and resources for: discipleship, Bible studies, fellowship gatherings, evangelism/works of service opportunities, training topics for practical Christian living, and women's retreats/events.

The Vision of the ministry is to foster a strong foundation encouraging spiritual growth, obedience, good works, and reliance on the grace of God to His praise and glory. Through the Women's Ministry we strive for a commitment to love, unity, service, diversity, equipping, and prayer.

Last week we learned that there are ongoing activities in the Women's Ministry like the Prince George's County Dept. of Corrections (DOC) Bible study with the women inmates. DOC inmates may choose to attend a 6—8 week study, sharing insights and prayer requests. This has been an intensely rewarding opportunity to see God's word impact others for Christ. This is enhanced by the Monthly Zoom gathering where members of the team pray for the teams leading the Bible studies, members of FBCUM and the inmates that have shared their prayer requests.

We also learned that there are special events that occur throughout the year, specifically, gatherings where all of the ladies of FBCUM come together to enjoy workshops, fellowships, conferences or the Spring Retreat. The focus is building a strong foundation relying on the Word of God and encouraging one another in spiritual growth in Christian love.



The Gospel of Luke: Confidence about Jesus

Luke 1:57-80

"A Light for Those Sitting in Darkness"– November 16, 2025



Introduction

If you live long enough, you will experience great disappointment or frustration. What you hoped for hasn't come to pass. (Proverbs 13:12) When hopeful optimism is shattered, believers can live on the edge of cynicism. When cynicism creeps in, you may find yourself no longer hoping or dreaming. You stop thinking that God can and will do the big thing. You may think that if you assume the worst, as a defense mechanism, you won't be disappointed.

Zechariah and Elizabeth lived with years and years of disappointment because they didn't have a child. It could have been that, when the angel announced the impossible to Zechariah, he was guarding his heart, looking only at life from the viewpoint of what was humanly possible. Zechariah could only see a barren wife and two elderly people who couldn't bear children.

Because of his unbelief, Zechariah was left in absolute silence until the child was born. This was a long time to be quiet. This was God's loving discipline on Zechariah to move him from cynicism to divine hope. What about you? Has your child-like faith become shattered? Do you find yourself hesitant to take risks for the gospel because you are afraid of being let down again? God has shown us the light of salvation in Christ. How should we respond to that light?

Sermon Outline

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 57-66

Zechariah was promised that Elizabeth would bear a son. In this passage, we see John's birth. God was faithful to them. He made promises and kept them. God IS faithful. Now the question was, would Zechariah and Elizabeth be faithful to what God called them to do? Many assumed that the baby would be named after Zechariah because that was the custom. But his name was to be called John. Zechariah and Elizabeth resisted social pressure, custom, and even their own desire to carry on the family name to obey God and do His will. They named him John. This is the name chosen by God to express the true identity of the child. John means "God is merciful."

God is merciful to us, sending John to prepare the way for Jesus Who would be the Savior of the world. The birth of John was a big deal. All those people wondered what this child would be. John was born, but Zechariah was still mute until he wrote on the tablet - His name is John! He had to act in obedience as an expression of faith. God's discipline had its right effect, moving Zechariah out of cynicism to a place of belief. That is what we should do. The sting of discipline may cause you to believe that it isn't good. However, loving discipline IS good. How do you respond to God's discipline in your life? Are you humble and teachable? Or are you proud, stubborn and unteachable? As a child of God, you will be disciplined in love. (Hebrews 12:6)

Trusting God isn't naive optimism. Following Jesus out of cynicism into obedience faces the evil in this world with the confidence that God is good and knowing that God is doing something about the brokenness in the world.

2. Read Vs. 67-75

Initially, Zechariah's praise was not about John. It was all about Jesus. John was important in the story of redemption, but Zechariah recognized that the purpose of John's ministry would be to put the focus on Jesus. Zechariah needed a refuge that was better and more reliable than the refuge of cynicism.

Zechariah saw God's faithfulness. He recognized that God was being faithful to the whole world. The promise of the Messiah coming from the line of David was being fulfilled. Do you see the emphasis on God's promises being filled? God made a binding promise to Abraham, about a future people and One through whom the whole earth

would be blessed. (See: Genesis 12, 15, 17) The time from Abraham to Zechariah was a LONG time! Centuries! Waiting is hard and tempts us to doubt, worry, and cynicism. Do you look for an answer in a sinful shortcut? Remember, when God makes a promise - He keeps it - He remembers it. God is faithful. Jesus is the solid rock upon which we can build our life!

God is faithful, but He is also good. The theme of Zechaiah's song is salvation. God has visited His people. Do you remember your life before you came to Christ? You were in the darkness and slavery of sin, with no hope. Then God enters your situation by coming to you. (Ephesians 2:8) He sets us free at a cost. Jesus is the horn of salvation that God has raised up. Christians have an enemy who is intent on total destruction. Can you picture an enemy raging against God's people? Now picture a massive bull with a horn of salvation entering the arena, pawing the ground, snorting. Do the enemies of God have a chance? NO! One day, the enemy will be defeated, and God's people will live with Him forever in peace. That is a reason to paise!

The horn of salvation will create a holy and righteous people. We don't appreciate gifts for which we think we have no need. If you think you are a good person, you will not see your need for Jesus today. If the Holy Spirit convicts you of sin, and you realize that you have sinned against a holy God, you will join with Zechariah to praise God for raising up a horn of salvation. All sin will be punished, but Jesus came in love, took on flesh, lived a sinless life, died on the cross for your sin, was buried, but on the third day, rose again to offer salvation to those who turn from their sin and self-reliance and trust Him and Him alone. He clothes us in His righteousness, making a holy and righteous people for God. This is a reason to praise God. There is a better refuge and a better fortress. Fear is gone. (Psalm 18:2)

3. Read Vs. 76-80

Zechariah's song breaks into two parts. In this second part, he blessed his son. John's ministry would point toward Jesus. John would give knowledge of salvation in the forgiveness of sin. (Vs. 77) Just as John was called to give this message, we are also called to give this message. We are sent out to make disciples. This is why we exist as a church.

What if you face disappointment? Has cynicism begun to creep up in your heart? Have you closed your heart? Do you avoid risk? Do you think small so you are not disappointed again? God doesn't want us to live that way. With God, all things are possible. He wants us to hope. Those who have gone before us have left the fingerprints of their love of God and service to Him all over this church. As those saints stand before the Lord, they have no regrets. We stand on their shoulders. We must do more than appreciate them, we must follow their example by serving, giving and taking Gospel risks.

As a church, we want members to display Christ in the marketplace - work and schools - to advance the Gospel in our town, state, country and around the world. These are ambitious plans. It will take money and time. Is it risky? Yes! That is what gospel hope does in our lives. We follow Jesus out of cynicism into bold evangelism. Light has come to those in darkness. Jesus is the horn of salvation. He is also the Bright Morning Star. (Revelation 22:16) It is a long, dark night. 2000 years ago, Jesus took on flesh. He came into a dark world as the Light. The Morning Star is risen. There is no stopping it. More and more light will shine. Christ has come. He has died and He has risen. The Morning Star has risen. We don't run around with a little flashlight - we pull back the curtains at dawn and share THE light!! This should bolster our confidence to risk-taking evangelism.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
