Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of November 30

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as an inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul in Colossians 1:9a-10:

"9 And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you...

10 to walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him:
bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace.
 Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)

 Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/ Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for our students wrapping up their semester at school. Pray that they would be diligent in their studying/training and finish well. Pray they would grow in their faith and seek opportunities to glorify God with their skills and education. (Prov. 3:5-6; 1 Cor. 10:31).
- Pray for our upcoming Members Meeting on Dec 14 after worship. Pray that God would continually help us to grow in unity and service to one another as fellow believers here at FBCUM and help us work together for kingdom purposes. (Eph 4:2-3)

- Pray we would care more about God's opinion of us than the praise of man. (Pr 29:25; 14:26)
- Pray that good spiritual fruit would come from discipleship efforts in small groups, one to one meetings, and as people show hospitality to others in our church. (1 Pt 4:9; Gal 6:2)
- Pray God would guard our church from fear, anxiety, and disunity. Pray that we would trust that God is good and be assured that He is in control. (John 13:34-35)
- Pray our church family would not grow weary of doing good. Pray we would live and interact with one another in a way that reveals God's steadfast love and mercy to the world. (Gal 6:9)
- Pray that we know a profound contentment no matter what circumstances we find ourselves in

 a contentment from knowing God is our help. (Heb. 13:5-6)
- Pray that God would help us comprehend his good design for the church and center our lives around it for the sake of his glory being made known. (Eph 3:10; 3:21)

Young Adult Ministry

The Young Adult Ministry has a mission to see young adults grow and develop as disciples of Jesus Christ. The ministry consists of Christian adults ages 18 - 35 who will gather at least once a month or a minimum of 12 times a year. Coming together on purpose to pour into the lives of one another. Scripture tells us that Jesus called His disciples to follow Him, observe and apply His teaching. Pastor Zach Schlegel has encouraged the leaders of the Young Adult Ministry to follow Christ's example through gatherings with mature believers that the young adults may explore how a life richly immersed in God's word transforms into the desire to seek Christ likeness.

This was at the heart of why Treonte (Trey) Fields and Manase Langi united to serve in this ministry. In fact, Trey shared his personal story, that when the Lord saved him, he did not have a spiritual mentor that could understand the pressures confronting young adults. Although he was able to learn from mature Christians, he also felt that there was a need to have someone that was in the same status in life, dealing with the



same struggles that confronted him as a young adult. Proverbs 27:17— Iron sharpens iron, and one man sharpens another. When Pastor Zach presented the opportunity to Trey, he felt it was blessing to be able to encourage the young adults and point them to a community of people who were experiencing the very same things in life. The interesting thing about the Young Adult Ministry is the diversity within the group. Some members are just beginning adult-hood-college bound students making decisions about the future, others are working full-time jobs and are making decisions about how to advance their career while others are married with children and are not only maintaining a home but deciding how they will raise their children.

Ministry Spotlight

Gatherings are an essential part of our growth in the Young Adult Ministry. Gatherings are opportunities to have fellowship with members of the ministry and some of our mature Christian church members around a comforting meal and just spending time sharing. There is always something inspiring about hearing how God has impacted a person's life. Some of the benefits of the gatherings includes, developing new relationships and witness how God impacts many lives for His glory.

A Gathering at the Moorehead's......

A typical gathering took place at the home of the Tyrone & Sharon Moorehead for about ten (10) members of the Young Adult Ministry. As with any new group gathering, prayer, ice breakers and some snacks opened the flow of conversations. The time together was spent sharing details about specific challenges that they face and sharing how they could see God's hand at work in their situation. Tyrone said, "The young adults inspired me by their shared belief and devotion to the



Lord. It was so encouraging seeing and hearing them discuss how much they seek and desire to follow the Lord." Charles Kirkland, III shared, "The Young Adults Ministry has allowed me to have biblical conversations with people of a similar age, as well as, gain insight into how the Lord is working in other people's lives, at my age, and how we all share similar struggles."

Thank you, to Treonte Fields and Manase Langi (currently on military deployment) for their dedication in serving on this ministry and for all of the hosts that have selflessly opened their homes to engage with our Young Adult Ministry at FBCUM. 

Christmas Preparations

Isaiah 42:1-9

"A Bruised Reed He Will Not Break" – November 30, 2025



Introduction

The book of Isaiah tells the story of the salvation of God's people through judgement. Because of their sin and idolatry, Jerusalem will fall and God's people will be exiled. However, Isaiah's message of judgment comes with a message of hope. God will fulfill His promise to His people – promises made thousands of years before in Genesis 12. Even though God promised deliverance and comfort, the people were discouraged and doubted.

God responds in chapter 41. The exile was divinely orchestrated judgment for their sin. He told them to look at His sovereign work in history, put away the idols, and live in a way that the nations would see that Israel's God is the King of all.

Do you ever read the passages of scripture and wonder what was up with the Israelites? How could they act the way that they did? But if you are honest with yourself, you often act as they did. We all do. Do you ever feel weary? Do you fight for faith? Are you ever confused with where you might fit into God's plan? Do you long for God's plan to be completed? Waiting is hard. We can all attest that the trappings of the world can pull our hearts toward lesser things. Are you tempted to allow those lesser things to take the "driver's seat?" This is idolatry.

This was a major part of Isaiah's warning to the Israelites. Just as he told the Israelites to put away idols, so must you. Whatever your heart clings to is really your god. It needn't be an image of wood. What are you to do? Take a good look at Jesus! When you see Jesus clearly, you will see that He is better than any idol that you can build or hold in your hearts. You play a vital part in His sovereign plan.

Sermon Outline

- 1. See that Jesus is better. Vs. 1-4
- 2. See that you play an important part in His sovereign plan. Vs. 5-9

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 1 - 4

"Behold!" Take a good look at "my servant." This servant would have been understood by the Israelites as the coming Messiah. This Messiah is Jesus. God wants you to see Jesus in contrast to the worthless idols in your life. (Isaiah 41:24, 29) In contrast to these idols, the servant of the Lord is a delight, bringing peace and justice to His people. He is the glorious alternative to your idols. He is so much better.

How much better is He? He is the One that God upholds; He is hand-picked of God. His Spirit is upon Jesus. He has the very essence of God within Him - the God-Man. He is a living, breathing, active God as opposed to the dead, lifeless and worthless idols. You can call on Him in prayer. He has ears to hear all of your joys and sorrows. Honor Him in public and private. Trust Him to guide your future. He has eyes to see. He knows your past, present and future circumstances. Listen to His voice in the truths of His Word. Delight and lean into the living God. He is better!

Jesus is better than other earthly rulers. <u>Isaiah 41:25</u> refers to King Cyrus of Persia who was a proud ruler, stepping on and crushing people to get what he wanted. In contrast, God will set things right without calling attention to Himself. He won't disregard the small and insignificant. He won't grow weary! Jesus gave lives back to suffering people, and He didn't do it for fame. God's plan is for a gentle Servant to bring justice to the nations. You should seek to emulate Him in any authority in which He has put you. Where has God placed you in a position of authority or influence? When you take a good look at Jesus as your model, are you using that position of authority and influence for God's glory and for the good of others?

God has a plan for human existence. He knows how humans and human society can be at their best. He knows what will make you happy. God's kingdom will come and His will will be done. There will be no corrupting idolatry. He will set things right. The massive disorder of the human condition is an indication of idolatry. You must use wisdom and understanding, discerning that the human plan for salvation has an idolatrous agenda. True order will come through Jesus. He is the hope of the world. He took your sins and miseries on Himself to bring you salvation. Do you see how Jesus is better?

You should want this message to get to all nations. How? You can take the time to **learn** about the different cultures and nations that need Jesus. We can all **pray** that God will bring the Gospel to these places. You might be in a position to **give** in ways for the Gospel to go to those far reaches of the world. Maybe God is calling you to **go** to take the gospel to a place that is dark and unknown. But we can go to our neighbor and share the good news.

Do you delight in Jesus or is He in the corner of your life? Do you see that Jesus is the only hope for the world and for your own life? Have you come to Him in humility, repentance and faith? Repent, submit to Jesus and obey Him. Jesus is better.

2. Read Vs. 5 - 9

Here, God is speaking **to** His servant, commissioning Him to do the work of God on earth. He will be a covenant and light. (vs. 6) He will deliver mankind from the darkness of idolatry, opening the eyes of the blind. (vs. 7) Do you sometimes think that you will never change? Thanks be to God - He is committed to lead you into new life. His name is at stake. He will not give His glory to anyone else. (vs. 8) God will make His love known to you; you are not confined to your sinful life. God took on flesh, died on the cross to pay the penalty for sin, victoriously conquering death in the resurrection to make redeem you and reconcile you to God.

You play an enormous role in making His name great. You are intended to be a beacon of hope to the lost. Your acts of humility, forgiveness, repentance, and worship are meant to open the eyes of the blind so they can behold the glory of Jesus. The New Testament writers made it clear that the church is essential to God's glory. (1 Peter 2:9-10) Nothing else exemplifies God's glory like the church! The church is built of broken sinners saved by the righteous, glorious grace of a merciful God. When the church lives in unity, she plays a significant part in God's plan to proclaim His excellencies to the world. Pray that He will continue to strengthen us for this task.

Keep your eyes fixed on Jesus. See, believe, embrace and live out your part in His sovereign plan. God has kept His word. (vs. 9) Get rid of your worthless idols and trust Him - the real, merciful, living, just God. He is your only hope. When you submit to Him, He will NOT let you go! Then, when you see Jesus clear and rightly, the response is always worship. (vs. 10)

This is the first Sunday of Advent. It is a time to remember and reflect on the Old Testament saints who longed for the promised Messiah and on the nervous anticipation the New Testament saints must have felt when the announcement was made that the Messiah was coming as a newborn child. Today, even though you reap the glorious benefits of the mystery of the gospel that has been revealed to you, do you long for the fulfillment of the future promise of Jesus' return? When He returns, He will bring about the full consummation of His glory, deliver the final blow to evil and usher in the new heavens and the new earth. All will be made right just as it was in the very beginning - God's people in God's place under His righteous rule, forever. Are you weary of waiting? Are you tempted to turn to lesser gods? Take a good look at Jesus this advent season and beyond. Resolve to worship Jesus and no other.

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
