A Prayer Guide for the week of December 7

Prayer of the week:

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Colossians 1:9a, 11:

" And so, from the day we heard, we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may be ...

11 strengthened with all power, according to his glorious might,

for all endurance and patience with joy; "

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)

- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Youth Ministry

The principal mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus; the Youth ministry is a part of the church body serving 7th-12th grade students and their families. During this time - students are figuring out who they are and what they believe. There are major decisions around every corner: school, interests, careers, relationships. For many, these are the years that the faithful teaching of parents and teachers sprouts into genuine faith and the decision to follow Jesus becomes their own.

The transition from 6th grade to the Youth Ministry is transformational because it involves stepping into your beliefs and exploring where you are spiritually. Effort is put into ensuring that the students receive biblical education, using the Gospel Project curriculum, during DiscipleLIFE at 9am each Sunday morning. Then on most Sunday evenings at 6pm throughout the year, students meet at the church to gather for activities and focused learning to enhance understanding biblical context and most importantly applying what has been learned.

Students are challenged, and are given opportunities to be kids while learning how to lean into the Bible as they develop Christian values. When the word, 'fun,' is mentioned smiles will come to the leaders and student faces because it is a lot of it. The talent of the leaders to use activities to support biblical concepts are masterful. Students are encourage to recognize their God given abilities and this builds confidence as they learn and serve. Leaders present activities that require team work and leadership roles that may be uncomfortable for students. Over time the students learn to support one another through their tasks and respect shared responsibility.

Ministry Spotlight

As the students continue through their years in the Youth Ministry they are given opportunities to serve others and develop relationships with other members and ministries. The Youth Ministry has students growing in Christ and serving in various ministries in the church. Thes are but a few of their engagement: ChildLife Ministry (nursery), Hospitality Team, Choir, VBSSS (Vacation Bible School for Senior Saints), Community service at the homes of church members.

There are two major events each year, a Winter Retreat (3 days) and Summer Retreat (5 days) (or MFuge –mission outreach). These days are filled with activities and Bible Study with discussion time to check understanding. There is a time for Q & A where leaders are given ample time to listen to student concerns and answer questions. The parents are always kept in the loop and are invited to attend or participate in various events to include their Sunday gatherings.

This church has some of the finest students attending and serving. Anyone interested in learning more about the Youth Ministry, should contact Jason Brown. Next week we will share a testimony from one of our students and a youth leader.



The Gospel of Luke: Confidence about Jesus

Luke 2;1-7

"Christ is Born!" – December 7, 2025



Introduction

Imagine being on a committee that is in charge of planning for the most important event in human history. You would have an unlimited budget and resources. What would you include? Who would you have speak? What food would you serve? What venue would you choose?

We know how the world commemorates such a day of importance, but how would God? The day that Jesus was born was one of the most important days in human history. The Son of God took on human flesh. Yet on that day, there was no fanfare, no media frenzy. It was just a normal day in Rome, but a tremendously hard day for Joseph and Mary because she was about to have a baby and there was no room anywhere for them.. However, you must remember that with God things are not what they seem to be.

Sermon Outline

- 1. It's not what it seems; God is in charge. Vs. 1-5
- 2. It's not what it seems; humility is the path to life. Vs. 6-7

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 1-5

Joseph and Mary had to travel to Bethlehem to be registered for tax purposes. This is recorded for us as a historical event with historical people - Caesar, Quirinius and historical places - Syria, Nazareth, Bethlehem. This eyewitness testimony was put together as a historical account so that we might have certainty about Jesus. This is not a made-up story to make us feel good at this time of the year. It is a real story with real people, real places, with real events.

Luke was a careful historian, but he was a purposeful historian. He wants you to be certain about Jesus. Why does Luke mention Caesar Augustus? He was Julius Caesar's heir, Octavius, who changed his name to Caesar Augustus which means "one who is to be worshipped." He was a very proud ruler. When he issued the command for the census, people went to be registered. There was no questioning it. Take moment and put yourself in Mary and Joseph's shoes. She was nine months pregnant. This was a 90 mile trip from Nazareth. They would walk or ride a donkey. Ladies, how would you feel if you had to go on this trip? Mary and Joseph may have felt anxious, helpless, alone.

If you pause the story here, who would you think is in charge? Remember, things are not as they seem. Joseph was of the house and lineage in David. God had established a covenant with David about a king that would come - an everlasting king. (2 Samuel 7) In these verses in Luke 2, there is a contrast - a rivalry of kings - the "great" Caesar Augustus and Jesus - the King of kings in a feeding trough. Who do you consider to be in charge of world events? Who is ruling over all circumstances?

Jesus was born in Bethlehem which was prophesied in the Old Testament. (Micah 5:2) Joseph and Mary lived in Nazareth. She was nine months pregnant. How would she get to Bethlehem for the prophecy to be fulfilled? God used a proud, arrogant ruler to get them to Bethlehem. (Proverbs 21:1) Caesar thought this was HIS idea as he flexed his political muscles. Yet in God's providence, the Caesar was turned into an unwitting tool in God's plan. Christ alone is King. He is in charge. Do you believe that God in control of all of the things in your life? Our nation? The world? ALL things?

If Mary and Joseph looked with their earthly eyes, they wouldn't see God moving. However, God's sovereign plan was at work in the geography and politics of Christmas. His fingerprints are quiet. Sometimes, all you may see are the difficulties, trials, problems that make life difficult. How do you feel then? You CAN apply the truth about God to all of your circumstances. God is a big God for little people. He is in charge, and He is in charge for our good.

2. Read Vs. 6-7

It's so easy to gloss over this passage of scripture because of its familiarity and to forget the shocking nature of all of the events. In Luke 1, we learn that Jesus' birth is a miracle. He would sit on the throne of David and reign forever. There would be no end to His kingdom. He will scatter the proud and gather the humble. He would

trample the enemy and rescue His people. He is the Morning Star that comes to shine light in our darkness. He is the Creator. He is the all-seeing, all powerful, all glorious Son of God. What kind of reception does He deserve? A great one!! What does He receive? He is born in a cattle stall and laid in a feeding trough. The Creator of the universe came to earth as the Son of God, and He couldn't get a room.

Mary and Joseph just finished a 90 mile trek. She went into labor. She was far from home, in a strange place, in a stable surrounded by farm animals. She must have been overwhelmed, even scared. What about Joseph? He probably felt helpless. Don't let the shocking nature of this scene get past you. Take the time to ponder: The smells. The temperature. The birth. The animals. The filth. What would you feel? Can you understand how they might have felt? What does the crude nature of His birth teach us?

First, it shows us the ugliness of sin. The people knew the prophecies. They were looking and longing for the Messiah. When He showed up, they didn't welcome Him - there was no room. This unwelcome reception wasn't only seen at His birth. You can see it all throughout the gospel of Luke. People were blind to who Jesus is. How? Psalm 135:15-18 tells us. They had become like the idols with blind the eyes and deaf ears. They were trusting something other than the true and living God. This didn't just happen in the first century. It happens today, but the idols are not just objects made of wood and stone. Making a good thing something that you want more than anything else is idolatry. Self-absorption will cause people to not be bothered. How about you? How would you respond? How are you responding today? Do you make room for Jesus in your affections, thoughts, decisions, values, schedule, plans, bank account? Do you give Jesus the welcome that He deserves? God wants to fill your life with grace. He came to do you good, yet too often you may be indifferent to God's Son. Do you see the ugliness of your sin? Our biggest problem is sin. Jesus took on flesh to rescue us.

Second, the crudeness of His birth highlights the humanity of His birth. (Isaiah 9:6) Mary really, actually, historically, gave birth to her first born Son. She actually needed to keep Him warm, change His diaper, and feed Him. The eternal Son of God took on flesh. He was not created. (John 1:1-3) He never ceased to be God. (Philippians 2:6-8) He was fully God and fully man at the incarnation. His deity was veiled in flesh. Why? He took on flesh to die for the sins of the world and conquer and destroy the devil. (Hebrews 2:14) An idol cannot help us in your time of need. Shame exposes your idolatry, but it is also an invitation to you into God's grace.

Jesus' lowly birth was shameful. His family thought he was crazy. He was rejected, mocked and died the death of a lowly criminal. Jesus trusted God all the way to the end. In His death and resurrection, He courageously shamed shame! (Hebrews 12:2; Colossians 2:15) Do you see the point? Shame exposes idolatry, but it is an invitation to grace and life. Jesus offers cleansing from the defilement of sin. You can have forgiveness of sin and victory over death.

Jesus' birth is one of the most important days in human history. The birth of Jesus is where Christianity began. Jesus set the example of humility coming to the needy. He comes to those poor in spirit. Trusting Jesus means counting the cost. It means losing your life in order to gain the life that Jesus promises. Following Jesus demands that you humble yourself before the one who humbled Himself for your salvation. Come to Him today!

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

Family Guide for week of December 7th, 2025

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
 do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
 pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
