# **Praying with First Baptist Church**

A Prayer Guide for the week of December 21

### **Prayer of the week:**

One of the ways we learn to pray is by using the examples in Scripture as a springboard and inspiration for our own prayer life. This week, we encourage you to use the prayer of the Apostle Paul from the book of Ephesians 3:17b-19:

"...that you, being rooted and grounded in love,<sup>18</sup> may have strength to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, <sup>19</sup> and to know the love of Christ that surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled with all the fullness of God."

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

### Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)

- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish
  peace. Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)
- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

### Particular prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for our Members Meeting today after worship. Pray that God would continually help us to grow in unity and service to one another as fellow believers here at FBCUM and help us work together for kingdom purposes. (Eph 4:2-3)

# **Youth Ministry**

The principal mission of the church is to make disciples of Jesus; the Youth ministry is a part of the church body serving 7th-12th grade students and their families. During this time - students are figuring out who they are and what they believe. There are major decisions around every corner: school, interests, careers, relationships. For many, these are the years that the faithful teaching of parents and teachers sprouts into genuine faith and the decision to follow Jesus becomes their own.

The transition from 6th grade to the Youth Ministry is transformational because it involves stepping into your beliefs and exploring where you are spiritually. Effort is put into ensuring that the students receive biblical education, using the Gospel Project curriculum, during DiscipleLIFE at 9am each Sunday morning. Then on most Sunday evenings at 6pm throughout the year, students meet at the church to gather for activities and focused learning to enhance understanding biblical context and most importantly applying what has been learned.

Students are challenged, and are given opportunities to be kids while learning how to lean into the Bible as they develop Christian values. When the word, 'fun,' is mentioned smiles will come to the leaders and student faces because it is a lot of it. The talent of the leaders to use activities to support biblical concepts are masterful. Students are encourage to recognize their God given abilities and this builds confidence as they learn and serve. Leaders present activities that require team work and leadership roles that may be uncomfortable for students. Over time the students learn to support one another through their tasks and respect shared responsibility.

# **Ministry Spotlight**

One of our Youth Leaders, Renata Janes, has graciously provided us with a glimpse of her experience as she has served with the Youth Ministry. You should know that Renata was previously a member of the Youth Ministry as a student herself, here at FBCUM. She has seen this Ministry from both sides. Renata began serving as a leader 22 years ago, in 2003. Renata loves studying the Bible and the students are very interested in the text and through some of their questions they keep her on her toes. She sees these questions as opportunities to grow in her knowledge and that keeps her in God's word. She also enjoys being with the students and watching how God unveils His truths as they discover insight through their studies.

The Youth have two trips, a Winter Retreat (3 days) and Summer Retreat (5 days) each year. Renata was asked to share her thoughts about the retreats. Renata shared how the retreats really bring everyone together. Renata said, "After a retreat you really feel like you know each other. Before a retreat everyone is nice and pleasant with each other, but after you feel like you really know that person, and you can put your guard down. You get to see all the sides of everyone. It's fun to see them get silly and you can only do that when you feel safe. I really enjoy our conversations on those trips.

The most rewarding thing in this Ministry is seeing them fall in love with Jesus. When they understand and grasp the love of Jesus, you see their entire person change and that makes all the craziness worth it."

# The Gospel of Luke: Confidence about Jesus

Luke 2:8-20

"Glory to God in the Highest" – December 21, 2025



### Introduction

What do you consider to be bad news? What do you consider good news? Do you see "bad news" in the proper perspective? Perspective is very important. When we look at Jesus' birth, it was met with indifference. He was pushed aside with no room in any inn.

Dr. Luke wrote this gospel to Theophilus (as well as us) so that we might be certain about the things of Jesus. Do you waver in your faith? Do you wonder if all of this is true? The response of those in Bethlehem was not the final word. Let's look at God's word for a different perspective on the birth of Jesus. How can you be certain that, on the final day, you will not be ashamed at the fact that you've trusted in Jesus?

#### **Sermon Outline**

- 1. Pay attention to Heaven's perspective. Vs. 8-14
- 2. Rejoice in Heaven's perspective. Vs. 15-20

### **Read & Discuss**

#### 1. Read Vs. 8-14

Shepherds represent everyday folk. God breaks the biggest news in human history - not to royalty, celebrities, or politicians - but to lowly, smelly shepherds. These shepherds represent Heaven's perspective. Glory pierced the night and woke up sleeping shepherds. The angels came to give them Heaven's perspective.

The angel told the terrified shepherds to "fear not!" The news that the angels brought created great joy - for all people. ALL people. This news is for anyone who will come to God in repentance and faith. Why is it good news? Unto YOU is born - FOR YOU! That is good news. This is good news and the source of great joy is because it is about Jesus! Luke focused on who Jesus is. He is the Savior, Christ, and Lord.

That He comes as Savior is really good news. It's also bad news. Salvation assumes we need saving. We have a need – that's the bad news! The announcement that He is Savior offers a gift to meet a great need. The shepherds are not offended by that because the gospel is good news for people who are broken sinners, poor in spirit.

He comes as the Christ - the Anointed one. This reminds us the God is faithful. When God makes a promise, He fulfills it.

He also comes as Lord. He was a helpless child born as God - the One who has absolute sovereignty. He is fully God and fully man. This is the incarnation.

How would these shepherds know which one was Jesus? The angels gave them a sign. The One wrapped in swaddling clothes and laying in a feeding trough. He was born in the midst of poverty. If you could see this scene with biblical eyes, you would see it with Bethlehem's perspective and be indifferent. The angels' message gives you the truth - He is the Savior, the long-awaited Christ, the Lord! Heaven celebrates!

A multitude of the heavenly host came to rejoice. How many is a multitude? More than can be counted. They were eager to see the Christ and give Him praise and worship. Heaven is praising God! This also has implications for mankind - Peace on earth. This peace is not a serene quiet day in the park. It is peace with God. Sin and rebellion separates you from God. You start our as an enemy of God. In Jesus' coming, peace is possible among those with whom He (God) is pleased.

Left to ourselves, what hope do you have for God to be pleased with you? None. BUT - this is what Christmas is about. Jesus came as a Savior. (Matthew 3:16-17) A holy God can only offer us peace through the Son with whom He is well pleased. The good news is for broken sinners who know that they need a Savior. In His great love, God took on flesh, lived a perfect life - one without sin, died on the cross as a substitute, rose again proving that His work on the cross was complete. He did it all for helpless, needy sinners. He takes all of your sin and gives you His righteousness. When God looks at you in Christ, He sees you as His beloved son or daughter with whom He is

well pleased. This is the good news. This is the gift. You must receive it. Turn from your sin and receive the gift of Christ.

### 2. Read Vs. 15-20

The shepherds could have responded with indifference and disbelief. The reason that we know that they did believe is their response. Based on what they heard, they went with haste into Bethlehem. What did they find? Mary, Joseph and the baby lying in a manger.

If you are wrestling with doubts about the truth - Luke wrote all of this so that you can be certain. God does exactly as He promises. God is faithful. He can be trusted. He can be believed. Yet not everyone believes. (vs. 18)

Luke highlights three groups with three responses - the crowds (<u>vs. 18</u>), Mary (<u>vs. 19</u>), and the Shepherds (<u>Vs. 20</u>). The crowds wondered, but they didn't believe. This is in contrast to Mary who believed. People wonder and are surprised about things they don't believe in. The crowds were impressed, but it stopped there. They wondered, but didn't trust.

Mary treasured all these things and pondered them in her heart. The word for "treasured" signified faith. Pondering describes someone who still has questions because they don't understand it all yet. All of her theological questions were not answered. Do you have questions? Ask them. But remember, you don't have to wait until all of your questions are answered to believe. Do you believe the Bible is true? Once that is settled, ask your questions. Learn and grow. We are called to think. Think in light of what the text is saying.

The shepherds had a simple response. They heard the news, they believed, they found the baby, and then they returned glorifying God for what they had seen and heard. Where do you fit in this? Which of the three describes you?

The point of this text is the message of the angels. The shepherds went to see this "thing" - or rhema - "saying" that was made known to them. Then they went to share the message to the crowd. Mary pondered these things - or "sayings" in her heart. The focus is the "saying" - the message - the word.

How are you responding to God's word given to you today? Do you believe? Do you have questions? Keep going. Keep believing. Jesus is who He says He is. God's word to you today is good news of great joy to all people. It goes beyond the decorations, gifts, and food. It is a joy that lifts you up out of frustration and fear. This good news puts everything into perspective. Hear and rejoice in Heaven's perspective of Jesus now and throughout 2026 and beyond.

### **Prayer of Response**

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to repent?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I understand, believe, desire, or do?

# Family Guide for week of December 21st, 2025

Deuteronomy 6:6–7 And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise.



### Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
  do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
  pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.

### Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u> <u>Bible</u>.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you
  do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a
  pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
