Praying with First Baptist Church

A Prayer Guide for the week of February 1

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Hebrews 13:20-21 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're a church member praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to use as you pray for your church family this week.

²⁰Now may the God of peace... ²¹equip you with everything good that you may do his will, working in [you] that which is pleasing in his sight, through Jesus Christ, to whom be glory forever and ever. Amen.

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word – for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)

- Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)





The Gospel of Luke: Confidence about Jesus

[Luke 3:23-4:13](#)

“Jesus, the Second Adam” – February 1, 2026



Introduction

There is no end to the concerns that surround us. They may lead you to ask: “Will my marriage make it? Will my depression ever lift? How will my kids turn out? Will I have a job tomorrow? Will I recover?” This doesn’t even take into account what is going on in the world: war, crime, housing, the economy and on and on. The world is broken. The root problem of the chaos in the world is a direct result of sin. The sin in our hearts is revealed in our actions. We are born with a sin nature, inclined toward evil. When the world is broken, many look for solutions in the world: politics, science, sports, entertainment, etc. Power and fame look like salvation. While these things, in and of themselves, are not bad, you cannot trust in them for hope and salvation. All mankind is flawed

In Luke chapter three, we see a list of names. This is Jesus’ genealogy. These people are long gone, but they have left a legacy. We see familiar names like David, and Abraham that go all the way back to Adam, who was the representative for mankind. Adam sinned, and it was passed down to all. By the time Jesus came, the people were longing for a Savior. A Savior had come – Jesus. ([Luke 2:11](#)) His mission was to seek and save the lost. ([Luke 19:10](#)) The “lost: is **ALL** of mankind. He is the Savior for all who come to Him in repentance and faith.

The Big Idea of Chapter 4 is: Jesus’ victory over Satan proves He is qualified to save.

When we look at each of the temptations of Jesus, we need to look at the context. Luke traced Jesus’ genealogy back to Adam right before Jesus’ temptations. We are meant to read this with the backdrop of the temptation of Adam as well the wandering of the children of Israel in the wilderness. Both Adam, mankind’s representative, and the children of Israel, God’s chosen people failed. Jesus would not fail. Jesus, the Second Adam, comes as a better representative. Jesus is revealed as the God-Man. He laid aside the rights and privileges of being God, not using those rights and privileges to His advantage. In His humanity, Jesus obeys God and relies on the Holy Spirit to overcome temptation as an example for us. ([Galatians 5:16](#))

Sermon Outline (From Luke chapter 4)

1. Trusting God for His needs. Vs. 1-4
2. Trusting God in His timing. Vs. 5-8
3. Trusting God for His care. Vs. 9-13

Read & Discuss

1. Read Vs. 1-4

After being in the wilderness for forty days, Jesus was hungry. Remember how God provided the manna for the children of Israel? For forty years, God provided manna to see if they would obey. They grumbled and complained. Jesus’ hunger represents any legitimate need that you may have. Satan wanted Jesus to meet His own legitimate need (food) with an illegitimate means. Satan wants you to do the same thing.

Satan starts by questioning whether or not Jesus is really the Son of God. He is; at His baptism, that was proclaimed by God Himself. Satan wanted Jesus to doubt the God’s goodness, and he wants you to do the same when you experience needs. This temptation lurks in all of our hearts. You may think that the path God wants you to take is pain free. It will not be. Don’t justify sinful shortcuts by thinking that God wants you to be happy. The believer can have joy in the midst of painful circumstances.

Jesus could have turned the stones into bread, but He doesn’t. He responds with God’s word. Jesus didn’t need to prove Himself to Satan. He didn’t need to prove Himself to Himself. He knew Who He was; God told Him. ([Luke 3:21-22](#)) God’s word to Jesus was enough, and Jesus believed His Father’s word. What about you? Do you know who you are in Christ? Do you believe it? You must know and trust what God says about you.

2. Read Vs. 5-8

Satan showed Jesus all of the kingdoms of the world - ALL of them. Satan promised Jesus all of this authority and glory. However, the focus here is not just on the offer of authority and power. It is on the immediacy – right away; that moment. However, these things had already been promised to Jesus. ([Psalm 2](#))

At Jesus' baptism, He had already devoted Himself to a different path to identify with mankind so that He could take the punishment for sin. First the cross - then the crown. Satan was offering a shortcut. Jesus knew the cross was coming, but He didn't back down. In love for us and the for the glory of His Father, He walked toward it.

Jesus didn't take anytime to answer Satan. He didn't weigh His options. He didn't see how close He could get to the line without crossing it. He immediately said, "No!" Then He backed it up with scripture. You must remember, temptation is dangerous. When temptation hits, how do you respond? Don't linger. Flee. Run. You have about five seconds to decide before you lose the battle.

Waiting on God is hard. It is especially hard when life is hard. Temptation promises a short cut. To be a Christian means to be a follower of Jesus. If Jesus' path was first the cross, then the crown, that is your path as well. Relief cannot come at the cost of obedience. You are set free from gaining the whole world and lose our soul **now** because you will inherit the world. Hold on. Don't take the bait.

3. Read Vs. 9-13

Have there been times when you just knew that God protected you? In this passage, Satan didn't just want to prove that God would protect Jesus; his plan was more diabolical. He wanted Jesus to doubt God's love and tempted Jesus to demand more of God's word. Jesus knew God's word. He didn't need anything else prove God's word and love.

What about you? Do you doubt God's love for you? The Bible is clear. God loves you. If you are in Christ, He is well- pleased with you. You shouldn't base your thoughts about that on your comfort level. What demands are you placing on God before you believe His character? God's word is true. He loves you and is well-pleased with you.

The main application of Luke 4 is that Jesus won a battle against sin and Satan that had already been lost. Remember, the Lord will fight for you. He did fight for you and won! Believe! You must fight against temptation and sin, but you fight from a position of victory already won by Jesus. We fight against sin and temptation now as people loved, forgiven, and justified by God. Trust Him.

What if you are not a Christian? Do you believe that Satan actually exists? He believes in you. He doesn't want you to listen to God's word. He'll let you think you are a good person and that you don't need this. He will distract you. On the day of judgement, you will either be represented by the first Adam who failed, or by the Second Adam who won. Jesus upholds the righteous demands of justice by standing in our place. He lives today to offer representation. Will you trust Him?

Prayer of Response

- 1) After hearing God's Word, what sin do I need to confess? From what do I need to *repent*?
- 2) How should my life be lived this week based on what I have heard? What should I *understand*, *believe*, *desire*, or *do*?

Suggestions on getting started:

- Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)
- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are *optional* if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like [The Big Picture Story Bible](#).]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you do! Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids – don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.
