Scripture Reading — Matthew 3:1-17 (ESV)

¹ In those days John the Baptist came preaching in the wilderness of Judea, ² "Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand." ³ For this is he who was spoken of by the prophet Isaiah when he said,

"The voice of one crying in the wilderness:

'Prepare the way of the Lord; make his paths straight.'"

⁴ Now John wore a garment of camel's hair and a leather belt around his waist, and his food was locusts and wild honey. ⁵ Then Jerusalem and all Judea and all the region about the Jordan were going out to him, ⁶ and they were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins.

⁷ But when he saw many of the Pharisees and Sadducees coming to his baptism, he said to them, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the wrath to come? ⁸ Bear fruit in keeping with repentance. ⁹ And do not presume to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father,' for I tell you, God is able from these stones to raise up children for Abraham. ¹⁰ Even now the axe is laid to the root of the trees. ¹¹ "I baptize you with water for repentance, but he who is coming after me is mightier than I, whose sandals I am not worthy to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire. ¹² His winnowing fork is in his hand, and he will clear his threshing floor and gather his wheat into the barn, but the chaff he will burn with unquenchable fire."

¹³ Then Jesus came from Galilee to the Jordan to John, to be baptized by him. ¹⁴ John would have prevented him, saying, "I need to be baptized by you, and do you come to me?" ¹⁵ But Jesus answered him, "Let it be so now, for thus it is fitting for us to fulfill all righteousness." Then he consented. ¹⁶ And when Jesus was baptized, immediately he went up from the water, and behold, the heavens were opened to him, and he saw the Spirit of God descending like a dove and coming to rest on him; ¹⁷ and behold, a voice from heaven said, "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

Church Covenant

A Prayer Guide for the week of July 6

Prayer of the week:

Consider using the Apostle Paul's prayer from the book of Colossians 1:10 as a springboard for your own prayer time this week. If you're praying through the church directory, this is a great prayer to use as you pray for your church family this week.

"we have not ceased to pray for you, asking that you may... walk in a manner worthy of the Lord, fully pleasing to him: bearing fruit in every good work and increasing in the knowledge of God;"

We recognize our need for God's help in all the areas of our lives. The categories and requests listed below are intentional ways to pray for each other as a church family. For help in knowing how and what to pray for, look up the Scripture included with each item.

Ongoing prayer items in the life of our church:

- Pray for opportunities and boldness to share the gospel with loved ones (Matt. 28:19)
- Pray for conversions (John 3:3, Acts 16:14)
- Pray for the children of our church to hear and understand the gospel and be saved. (Luke 8:8)
- Pray for the preaching of God's word for faithfulness, fruitfulness, and God's glory (2 Tim. 4:2, 1 Cor. 2:4-5, Isa. 55:10-11)
- Pray for increased one to one discipleship relationships in our church family (Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray for unity in our diversity both on Sunday and through the week (Rom. 15:13, Eph 4:2-3)
- Pray for continued growth and joy in the gospel (1 Cor. 15:1-5, 2 Pet. 1:12)
- Pray for growth in holiness, hatred of sin and growth in humility (Prov. 8:13, 1 Pet. 1:14-16)
- Pray for honest, loving relationships in our church (Col. 3:12-13, James 5:16)
- Pray for families: marriages to thrive, parents to teach/love/discipline carefully, and children to obey (Eph. 5:22-6:4)
- Pray that giving would be faithful, joyful, consistent, and sacrificial (2 Cor. 8:9)

Prayer items outside our church:

- Pray that our elected officials would fear God, seek His wisdom, have integrity, humility, and work together for the good of society and not self. (1 Tim. 2:1-2, Rom. 13:1-7)
- Pray for fruitful ministry in other gospel-proclaiming churches in our area. (Rom. 15:20, 1 Cor. 16:1-3, Matt. 28:19-20)
- Pray that God would bring a swift end to wars going on throughout the world and establish peace.
 Pray for protection and care for the many refugees fleeing to safety. Pray that those impacted would trust in God in the midst of their suffering. (Ps. 139:23-24)

Pray for our ministry partners locally and around the world—Baptist Convention of Maryland/Delaware (BCM/D), North American Mission Board (NAMB) and International Mission Board (IMB). Pray especially for those we have direct partnerships with: Jeremy McClain (Mercy of Christ Fellowship Church, DC), Joel Kurz (The Garden Church, Baltimore), Daniel and Brandy Spandler-Davison and Susanna Schriever (Bangkok City Baptist Church, Thailand). Pray the gospel would flourish and churches would be planted and strengthened through their work. Pray that God would supply their needs. (Ps 93:4, Col. 1:5-6, 1 Pet. 4:12-17)

Grief & Bereavement Ministry

The Grief & Bereavement Ministry is organized to support the ministry of the church by providing for the needs of those who are grieving the loss of a family member or loved one. The pain of loss and the process of healing can be overwhelming and a very difficult path to walk alone. Our church is so very grateful for this ministry and how they have blessed others by their outpouring of love and support.

As a member of this ministry, we have learned that even when the loss is anticipated, because it may have followed a long-term incurable disease or illness or someone that died unexpectantly, we all grieve the loss. Our hope is that once you experience the loss, although it is a difficult time, that this ministry will help provide encouragement to you and your family.



When members of the church call or make a notification that a church member or a family member of a church member passed away, the Grief and Bereavement Ministry (led by Deacon Norris and Rachel Norris) is notified as soon as possible. When asked to share how they proceed once they receive a notification. He responded, "Rachel and I immediately take time out to pray for the bereaved individual and fami-

ly and ask the Holy Spirit to guide us in our service for God and how to serve the bereaved." Norris says that when he contacts the bereaved family member, he asks about their immediate needs. The responses may vary, but could include, meal assistance, providing information about grieving or transportation. These are a sampling of what the bereaved member may need us to do for them.

Joining Grief & Bereavement....



New members in the Grief & Bereavement Ministry will be part of a supportive team that is willing to be flexible to individuals and/or families that are going through the grieving process. Teams will be sensitive to the fact that everyone grieves differently, and will seek understanding, by asking questions, that will be helpful to them as they serve both spiritually and tangibly.

Teams should prepare for times when the bereaved may not be able to effectively express what they need and should seek prayer.

Therefore, what we do may vary based on the bereaved individual or family. For instance, we may be assisting at the funeral service by ushering and providing service during the meal. We may also coordinate efforts through other ministries of the church like Benevolence or the Meal Train. Some individuals and families may not require as much hands on support. However, communication is essential to know how best to serve the bereaved family or individual.

After the funeral service, your team will continue to care for the bereaved through contacts to include: occasionally sending notes, praying, visits and making calls. We also encourage being mindful of certain dates like birthdays, anniversaries, and holidays that may be difficult for the bereaved.



Benefits.....

As a member Grief & Bereavement, you will experience the Holy Spirit's comfort, guidance, and strength as He blesses the bereaved. Deacon Norris says, "We have learned that serving is much bigger than any of us and we are humbled by how God sends his Comforter in these instances to grant peace. This ministry definitely makes you appreciate the time God has gifted each of us here on earth and to not take our time here for granted."

Singing and Praying the Psalms at FBCUM

This summer, we plan to study the Psalms not only to understand, but to be *transformed* by them. Psalms are not something we just read; they're something we *do*. As the hymnbook of God's people, they shape how we relate to God and create in us new attitudes, hopes, commitments, and emotions. The 8-inch gap between our heads (what we know) and our heart (who we trust in) can feel an impossible chasm to bridge. Singing and praying the Psalms help bridge that gap.

Benefits of Singing and Praying the Psalms

- 1. Psalms teach us how to pray In the midst of pain or sorrow, we may not know what to pray. Psalms are a sort of spiritual template where we learn to pray through imitation and response. Moreover, when we find ourselves praying a monotonous list, praying the Psalms pushes us out of our prayer 'rut' and breathes new life into our prayers thru biblical categories and language. We have a big God, we should pray big prayers!
- 2. Psalms confront us with who God is, not who we wish he was "Left to ourselves, we will pray to some god who speaks what we like hearing, or to the part of God we manage to understand. But what is critical is that we speak to the God who speaks to us, and to everything he speaks to us...the Psalms train us in that conversation." (Peterson. "Answering God", p.5)
- 3. Psalms are a medicine chest for the heart We're not the expert on ourselves! Psalms help us to recognize what's going on in our heart. Then, by God's grace, transform fear, worry, and despair, to hope and joy in the presence of the Living God.
- 4. Moments before the cross when His heart was in anguish, Jesus sang a hymn (Mark 14:26) with the disciples (likely a Psalm of praise). Psalm singing is a spiritual weapon to fight the devil, doubts, and despair.

Suggestions on How to Pray the Psalms

1. Read the Psalm several times to try and understand what is said before you pray.

Singing and Praying the Psalms at FBCUM (continued)

2. Meditate on the Psalm phrase by phrase, taking what the Psalmist writes, and using it as a springboard for your own personal prayer. So if you're reading Psalm 23, it may look something like this:

Psalm 23:1 "The LORD is my shepherd; I shall not want."

My prayer: Father, You are my shepherd. I've been struggling with discontentment this week in my job. Help me to be satisfied in You; lead me a place where I'm resting not in my circumstances, but in You.

Psalm 23:2-3 "He makes me lie down in green pastures. He leads me beside still waters. He leads me in paths of righteousness for his names sake."

My prayer: Father, I trust that your paths are best, are right. Show me how to respond in this conflict with my spouse. I am yours and I need you to lead me because I am struggling to not be proud and defensive right now. Bring me to a place of peace.

- 3. To help you know how to pray in response to what the Psalm is saying, consider these questions in light of the Psalm you're praying:
 - What does this teach me about God that I can praise or thank Him for?
 - If he is really like this, what difference should that make in how I live today?
 - What does this teach me about myself that I could repent for?
 - What do you learn about life that you can ask for or act on?

The Plan

Lord willing, we'll look at a specific psalm of praise, confession, lament, or trust. Each Sunday, we'll include a prayer guides to help you pray that Psalm during the week. May God enlarge our hearts (Ps. 119:32) through His word this summer!

Praying Psalm 1 — Two Ways to Live

For 2 or 3 days this week, set aside 15 minutes to pray through Psalm 1. For help on how to pray the Psalm, refer back to the insert "Singing and Praying the Psalms Guide"

Psalm 1:1–6 Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; ² but his delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law he meditates day and night. ³ He is like a tree planted by streams of water that yields its fruit in its season, and its leaf does not wither. In all that he does, he prospers. ⁴ The wicked are not so, but are like chaff that the wind drives away. ⁵ Therefore the wicked will not stand in the judgment, nor sinners in the congregation of the righteous; ⁶ for the LORD knows the way of the righteous, but the way of the wicked will perish.

Praising God: What does Psalm 1 teach about who God is that is worthy of praise? What difference does God's 'knowing' and holding us accountable make?

Confessing Sin: Are there any stairstep sinful compromises you've made (v1)? What do you 'delight' in that rivals your delight in God and His law? Confess ways you've strayed from God's path.

Following God: Pray for the discernment to see and resist ungodly influences. Pray that we meditate on, delight in, and walk in obedience to God's good law.


Things to Pray for First Baptist Church:

- 1. Pray that we hate sin, love God, and grow in holiness.
- 2. Pray for God to give us a hunger and thirst for His righteousness and truth.
- 3. Pray for a deeper understanding of God's word and for the courage to put it into practice.
- 4. Pray that God makes us like the tree in v3, firmly planted, bearing fruit, and flourishing.

Family Guide for week of July 6th, 2025






Suggestions on getting started:

Decide on a time & place (breakfast, dinner, before bed, etc.)

- Start simple and short (ten minutes or less). Start with three things: 1) Read God's word, 2) Pray together and 3) Sing together. Scripture memory and catechism questions are optional if you have the time. Better to start small than bite off more than you can chew and give up.
- Be flexible. It doesn't need to look cookie-cutter similar for every family. Know yourself and know your kids: their personality, age, maturity, etc. [For younger kids consider starting with a good children's Bible like <u>The Big Picture Story</u>
- Bible.]
- If you don't know the answer to a question someone has, don't act like you do!
 Say something like, "Great question, let me look into that." Study, ask a pastor or Christian friend and get back to them.
- Embrace the chaos. Kids are kids don't expect it to be a perfect roundtable discussion with quiet, attentive children every time. Be patient and persistent. Patterns and habits help to set expectations over time.

Catechism question for the week¹
