Nicholas of Myra was born to a wealthy Greek family in southwest Asia Minor (modern-day Turkey) in 270_{AD}. His name Nicholas derives from two Greek words, νίκη (*nike* ="victory") and λαός (laos = "people"), meaning, "victory for the people". Unlike many leaders in the early church, Nicholas was born and raised a Christian. Greatly influenced by his uncle, the Bishop of Patara, Nicholas would be ordained as a priest in 289, and was imprisoned during the persecution of Christians by Roman Emperor Diocletian in 303. Nicholas was highly respected because of his refusal to recant his faith. He was released after the ascension of Constantine as emperor in 312, and following a pilgrimage to the Holy Land, Nicholas was consecrated Bishop of Myra in 317 upon his return.

According to tradition, Nicholas arose to prominence at the Council of Nicaea arguing against the influence of an Egyptian priest named Arius, who taught that Christ the Son was a created being and was therefore subordinate to the Father. At one point the debate became so heated that Nicholas allegedly struck Arius in the face! The council would uphold the orthodox understanding of the Trinity, Father and Son being "coequal" and "consubstantial" with the formulation of the Nicene Creed in 325.

There are several legends attributed to Nicholas. The most famous involves Nicholas using his inheritance to provide for a poor man with three daughters who could not afford a dowry. As such, the daughters risked being sold into prostitution. Nicholas goes to the house at night to throw purses filled with gold coins through the window of the home, one for each daughter, over three consecutive nights. After the second, the father resolves to keep watch to discover his mysterious benefactor. Nicholas, however, learns of this and drops the third bag down the chimney instead, which falls into the stocking of the third daughter who had set it above the embers of the fireplace to dry.

Nicholas of Myra died December 6, 343, which would be established as the saint's feast day. The exchange of gifts would become a customary practice for the celebration. As the patron saint of Amsterdam, St. Nicholas would become known to the Dutch as Sinterklass. who would journey from Spain each year to deliver gifts and oranges to children on the night before his feast day. During the Reformation, Martin Luther moved the observance to coincide with Christmas, in an effort to move Protestants away from the Catholic practice of venerating the saints. Even so, Sinterklaas would remain a popular figure, migrating to American shores with the settlement of New Amsterdam (now New York City) in the 17th century. As the tradition gained popularity among English settlers, Sinterklass would become Anglicized to the more familiar, "Santa Claus".




