Atonement is defined as reparation for a wrong or injury. Scripture describes Christ's atonement for the sins of humankind in a variety of ways: As a good shepherd [Jn. 10:11-14], a religious sacrifice [He. 7:26-28], a legal ruling [II Co. 5:18-20], the settlement of a debt [I Co. 7:21-24], and a military victory [I Co. 15:24-26]. And in the centuries to follow, theologians would build upon this imagery to articulate what atonement is and how it works.

Irenaeus of Lyons (130-202) would borrow Paul's image of Christ as the "New Adam", promoting the idea of *recapitulation* – that Christ's perfect obedience to God's will reverses the original sin, and through our union with Christ through faith, humanity is redeemed. Anselm of Canterbury (1033 –1109) was among the first to promote substitutionary atonement – the idea sin constitutes a debt to God compounded over time that we can never repay. Christ's obedience to God fully accounts for the sins of humanity and wipes out our collective debt. John Calvin (1509-1564), an attorney by trade, adapted Anselm's theory using legal language, creating penal substitution, arguing that, because of our sins, God has rendered a legal judgment against us justly deserving of death – a sentence that Christ would serve in our place through his death on the cross.

As we've noticed with other theological mysteries, each theory of atonement possesses strengths and weaknesses. While these theories reflect common Christian beliefs, they're often criticized for failing to account for the whole witness of scripture, instead focusing on select parts. If the fear of God is the beginning of wisdom, we must bear in mind how God's wrath is another expression of God's great love. While we may struggle to articulate the mystery of atonement, how it works is far less important than the fact that it does work – for us. Unlike other religions where human beings are expected to make a sacrifice to a god, we trust in a God who sacrifices everything for us. It's a sacrifice by God, for God, on behalf of God's people!

The Season of Lent invites Christ's followers to faithfully consider the mystery of atonement, and how principles of forgiveness, grace, and unconditional love shape our identity as the community of God's chosen – ransomed, redeemed, and called into God's service as a people holy and beloved. Through his obedience to God's will, Christ provided us the perfect model to imitate in our lives together, as we use sacrifices we offer gratitude to the Lord for all we have freely received.

Join us for our Ash Wednesday service on March 5 at 11:30am in the SPC Sanctuary as we begin our journey toward the empty tomb!



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
