How to Use These Study Guides:

- 1. **Before the meeting:** Consider sending out the Scripture passage to your group members ahead of time.
- 2. Check In: Begin each meeting with a short time checking in with one another.
- 3. **Read Scripture:** You may want to begin the discussion by reading the Scripture passage together out loud, or by summarizing the passage if everyone has read it ahead of time.
- 4. **Ask Questions:** Don't feel like you need to discuss every question included in the Study Guide. Pick one or two to start with and see how the conversation flows.
- 5. **End with Prayer:** Be sure to set aside time for sharing prayer requests and praying together.

LIFE GROUP STUDY GUIDE

CRYING AT KFC - Mark 14:32-36



I. Introduction

This past Ash Wednesday marked the beginning of Lent – a time of 40 days leading up to Easter where Christians reflect more intentionally around the life and death of Jesus. Our series for Lent is part 2 of our Kingdom Come series, entitled *Kingdom Come: Thy Will be Done.* Each week we will be focusing on something different that Jesus calls us to surrender. And we hope that this prayer of surrender that Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, *thy will be done*, would be our prayer as well. To be clear, this series is not about trying to figure out the will of God for your life, but focuses on the will of God for Jesus to surrender and give his life, and also the will of God for us to live a life of surrender.

Questions: What does surrendering your own will and desires for the will and desires of God look like?

<u>Bottom Line</u>: The invitation to surrender our self-preservation is an invitation to live vulnerably and authentically.

Let's begin in prayer before we begin reading and discussing our text.

Main Scripture Readings:

Mark 14:32-36

³² They went to a place called Gethsemane, and Jesus said to his disciples, "Sit here while I pray." ³³ He took Peter, James and John along with him, and he began to be deeply distressed and troubled. ³⁴ "My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death," he said to them. "Stay here and keep watch."

³⁵ Going a little farther, he fell to the ground and prayed that if possible the hour might pass from him. ³⁶ "Abba, Father," he said, "everything is possible for you. Take this cup from me. Yet not what I will, but what you will."

Mark 10:43-45

⁴³ Not so with you. Instead, whoever wants to become great among you must be your servant, ⁴⁴ and whoever wants to be first must be slave of all. ⁴⁵ For even the Son of Man did not come to be served, but to serve, and to give his life as a ransom for many."

II. Group Discussion Questions:

- 1. Surrender in many cultures, past and present, is considered a sign of weakness or failure. Giving up is especially unnatural for a culture in which we tell people from childhood that they should never give up.
 - Ask your group to share examples of surrender that left a deep impression in their own lives.
- 2. When Jesus says to his disciples: *My soul is overwhelmed with sorrow to the point of death,* he shows weakness and vulnerability.
 - Imagine if you were Peter, James, or John. How would you have reacted to Jesus' admission? Now imagine if one of your closest friends said the same words to you. How would you react to them? How do your reactions compare? Share your thoughts and feelings with the group.
 - We can go to great extremes to cover our weaknesses. We even lie about the smallest things because we want to preserve the image of what others think about us. What about Jesus' example here stands out to you?
- 3. Pastor Jon points out that **being AROUND Jesus is not the same thing as becoming LIKE Jesus.** Even talking about Jesus isn't the same thing as becoming like Jesus.
 - Read Mark 10:43-45 together as a group.
 - Apply the three steps of inductive Bible Study together: 1) Observe, 2) Interpret, and 3) Apply.
 - What does it mean to be a disciple of Jesus?
- 4. Pastor Jon pointed out that Mark was not concerned with trying to convince people to be a disciple of Jesus. Rather, Mark is trying to convince people that it is not through power Jesus is going to be the Messiah. It is through serving, suffering, and surrendering. Surrender is the currency of the kingdom of God. Because in God's Kingdom, it isn't power, wealth, or status that gives you access; it's surrender.
 - **Jesus surrenders his desire for self-preservation.** How does this stand in contrast with our instinct for self-preservation?
 - How does our world's social currency of success, wealth, power, and status contrast with the currency of the kingdom of God?
- 5. Pastor Jon shares, "the invitation to surrender our self-preservation is an invitation to live vulnerably and authentically. Instead of trying to save your life, **share your life."** Pastor Jon then shares a personal story of when he saw his father cry for the first time. When Jon's father showed weakness and sadness, Jon was able to understand his father's hurts and pains.

- Ask your group to share their own experiences with showing vulnerability or observing it, and then to describe what impact it had on that relationship.
- What pain, weakness, sadness are you carrying right now? How can the group support and pray for you?
- 6. As you close in prayer, ask the Lord to put on your heart the name of someone you can share your life with. Not the perfect self-image that you want to project, but to share your weakness, sadness and emotions. This might be someone in your family, a friend, neighbor, colleague, or a brother or sister in Christ. Conversely, if you find someone revealing their vulnerabilities to you, pray that you would listen with care with a true desire to know them more fully.

Take Home Message:

Jesus offers a vision of the kingdom of God – where we can express our emotions, our weaknesses, and still be loved and cherished. If we could be more vulnerable with each other, maybe we would begin to understand each other's hurts and pains. Instead of trying to save your life, share your life with God and the people around you.

V. Support for the Leader

These Teaching Points are provided to help the group leader make connections from the message to their group with both insights from the Biblical text and opportunities in the life of our church.

Teaching Points:

- Mark is not concerned with trying to convince people to be a disciple of Jesus. He is
 trying to convince people that it is not through power Jesus is going to be the Messiah,
 the savior of the world, it is through serving, suffering, and surrendering
- Although surrendering our desires for God's desires isn't easy, surrender is the currency
 of the kingdom of God. Because in God's Kingdom, it isn't power, wealth or status that
 gives you access; it's surrender
- Jesus wasn't someone who just prayed when he was going through a hard time, he
 prayed all of the time so that when he encountered a hard time, that he would be more
 ready
- Being around Jesus is not the same thing as becoming like Jesus
- Jesus came not to be served, but he came to serve and to give his life for us
- Jesus surrendered his desire for self-preservation
- Share your life with Jesus, talk to him, let him know exactly how you feel.
