# **How to Use These Study Guides:**

- 1. **Before the meeting:** Consider sending out the Scripture passage to your group members ahead of time.
- 2. Check In: Begin each meeting with a short time checking in with one another.
- 3. **Read Scripture:** You may want to begin the discussion by reading the Scripture passage together out loud, or by summarizing the passage if everyone has read it ahead of time.
- 4. **Ask Questions:** Don't feel like you need to discuss every question included in the Study Guide. Pick one or two to start with and see how the conversation flows.
- 5. **End with Prayer:** Be sure to set aside time for sharing prayer requests and praying together.

#### *If your group meets over Zoom:*


- Expect to do more overt facilitating over Zoom than you would in person. Feel free to call on people to invite them to share.

## LIFE GROUP STUDY GUIDE

for Monologue Sunday given on Dec 17, 2023 by Pastor Bryan Wilkerson



**GO IN PEACE - Luke 2:25-35** 

### I. Introduction

Welcome to our Advent Series, "And on Earth, Peace". First we learned from Pastor Bryan that regardless of your present life circumstances you can find peace in your heart today, there will be peace on earth someday, and we can be instruments of peace every day. Then we learned from Pastor Tim that having experienced the peace of Jesus, we can bring peace to conflict, to loneliness, and to anxiety.

Today is Monologue Sunday, where Pastor Bryan plays Simeon from the Christmas story. This is Pastor Bryan's last dramatic monologue and we are excited to hear the message he brings. Next week our Christmas Eve Candlelight services (Lexington campus) will be December 23<sup>rd</sup> at 7pm and 24<sup>th</sup> at 11am, 2pm and 4pm. **Questions**: How do we wait for God's promises?

<u>Bottom Line</u>: Because of the Holy Spirit within us, we can wait, believe and help others to believe. God's plan is not always what we expect, so we must be attentive to our surroundings and people around us in order to perceive the way God is preparing for us.

Let's begin in prayer before we begin reading and discussing our text.

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### Main Scripture Readings:

### Luke 2:25-35

<sup>25</sup> Now there was a man in Jerusalem called Simeon, who was righteous and devout. He was waiting for the consolation of Israel, and the Holy Spirit was on him. <sup>26</sup> It had been revealed to him by the Holy Spirit that he would not die before he had seen the Lord's Messiah. <sup>27</sup> Moved by the Spirit, he went into the temple courts. When the parents brought in the child Jesus to do for him what the custom of the Law required, <sup>28</sup> Simeon took him in his arms and praised God, saying:

- <sup>29</sup> "Sovereign Lord, as you have promised, you may now dismiss your servant in peace.
- <sup>30</sup> For my eyes have seen your salvation,
- which you have prepared in the sight of all nations:
- <sup>32</sup> a light for revelation to the Gentiles, and the glory of your people Israel."

<sup>33</sup> The child's father and mother marveled at what was said about him. <sup>34</sup> Then Simeon blessed them and said to Mary, his mother: "This child is destined to cause the falling and rising of many in Israel, and to be a sign that will be spoken against, <sup>35</sup> so that the thoughts of many hearts will be revealed. And a sword will pierce your own soul too."

# II. Group Discussion Questions:

- Simeon has been waiting a lifetime to see the Lord's Messiah. Maybe like Simeon, you find yourself in a season of waiting this Christmas – waiting for God to come through or to come near for you or someone you love.
  - In what area are you waiting for God to come through? Either for yourself, a loved one, a community?
  - What are you hoping to witness this Christmas? In the next month? In the next year? in your lifetime?
- 2. Simeon grows weary and frustrated of the Roman oppression of his people and the daily injustices he witnesses. He laments, "Lord! You have not kept your word. Your people are hurting, they are dying, they are alone. Where is the One who can save us? Where is the deliverer you promised?"
  - How would you evaluate your conversations with God? How open are you in sharing your feelings and revealing your honest thoughts? Do you feel close enough to Him that you can share your anger, frustration, disappointment, and doubt?
  - What have been some factors or barriers hindering you from being more open and honest with God?
- 3. After years of waiting, Simeon changes his perspective: "I changed, too as the restless agitation of your turned into something more suited for a long race. Because I gradually realized I had been given not just a promise but a task: the task of waiting; of believing, and helping others to believe."
  - Could it be that God has given each of us the same task? What are some ways that you can increase in your belief or help others to do the same? What ways can your group bless the faith of others?
- 4. There are times when Simeon doubt God's promise: "I could sense myself becoming like Jerusalem: bitter, and doubtful. Why would God have ever spoken to me, anyway? Maybe I –I had wanted too badly to believe." When we are faced with trials and tribulations, we are all at risk for becoming discouraged and losing hope.
  - Share with your group some of the things that you do to maintain your faith in the Lord and keep waiting.
- 5. After Simeon comes to realize that the Messiah is a baby he says, "The Lord is full of surprises. My people have spent generations looking for a warrior. We have spent generations ready to fight. And our God, our creator, sends his champion: the hope of my people, the hope of the world a tiny, baby boy." We all have our own expectational positioning system, our own hopes and dreams about where we

would be at certain times in our lives. As Christ-followers, we believe that God has a purpose and a plan for each and every one of us. But God's plans don't always align with our own plans.

 When things don't go your way, how can you open your eyes, ears, and heart to see God's way? How can our group encourage and edify one another during this period of waiting?

### Take Home Message:

We won't have the privilege Simeon had, of holding the newborn Jesus in his arms that day, but we do have the opportunity this Christmas of welcoming him into our hearts once again – to experience the peace that only he can bring, and to share that peace with the world around us.
