How to Use These Study Guides:

- 1. **Before the meeting:** Consider sending out the Scripture passage to your group members ahead of time.
- 2. Check In: Begin each meeting with a short time checking in with one another.
- 3. **Read Scripture:** You may want to begin the discussion by reading the Scripture passage together out loud, or by summarizing the passage if everyone has read it ahead of time.
- 4. **Ask Questions:** Don't feel like you need to discuss every question included in the Study Guide. Pick one or two to start with and see how the conversation flows.
- 5. **End with Prayer:** Be sure to set aside time for sharing prayer requests and praying together.

Kingdom Come, Thy Will Be Done – Mark 11:27-28



I. Introduction

We are continuing our Lent series - the 40 days leading up to Easter where Christians reflect more intentionally around the life and death of Jesus. Our series for Lent is part 2 of our Kingdom Come series, entitled *Kingdom Come: Thy Will be Done.* Each week we will be focusing on something different that Jesus calls us to surrender. And we hope that this prayer of surrender that Jesus prays in the Garden of Gethsemane, *thy will be done*, would be our prayer as well. To be clear, this series is not about trying to figure out the will of God for your life, but focuses on the will of God for Jesus to surrender and give his life, and also the will of God for us to live a life of surrender.

<u>Questions</u>: How should followers of Jesus treat those who they have profound differences with on convictions and opinions?

<u>Bottom Line</u>: "Thy will be done" means surrendering our certainty, our categories, and our need for control, and exchanging them for curiosity, connection, and confidence in God."

Let's begin in prayer before we begin reading and discussing our texts.

Main Scripture Readings:

Mark 11:27-28

²⁷ They arrived again in Jerusalem, and while Jesus was walking in the temple courts, the chief priests, the teachers of the law and the elders came to him. ²⁸ "By what authority are you doing these things?" they asked. "And who gave you authority to do this?"

Mark 12:13-17

¹³ Later they sent some of the Pharisees and Herodians to Jesus to catch him in his words. ¹⁴ They came to him and said, "Teacher, we know that you are a man of integrity. You aren't swayed by others, because you pay no attention to who they are; but you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. Is it right to pay the imperial tax to Caesar or not? ¹⁵ Should we pay or shouldn't we?"

But Jesus knew their hypocrisy. "Why are you trying to trap me?" he asked. "Bring me a denarius and let me look at it." ¹⁶ They brought the coin, and he asked them, "Whose image is this? And whose inscription?"

"Caesar's," they replied.

¹⁷ Then Jesus said to them, "Give back to Caesar what is Caesar's and to God what is God's." And they were amazed at him.

II. Group Discussion Questions:

1. We begin by spending time on a challenging and complicated set of topics today where followers of Jesus can grow and perhaps even model love, care, listening, and being conversant in disagreement.

Pastor Bryan began with an opening illustration of a esteemed pastor and respected scholar named Alister Begg who on his podcast was asked by a woman for his advice on attending her grandson's wedding who was marrying a member of the transgender community.

The woman did not **believe** the marriage is in keeping with God's design, but she does love her grandson and **Begg was clear** that while he, too, holds the historic Christian view of marriage, given the circumstances, she should feel free to attend the wedding as an expression of love for her grandson. He **acknowledged** that everyone might not agree with him, and that that might not be the right answer for every person in every situation.

Pastor Bryan stated that Begg was **widely criticized** for his counsel; accused of "abandoning Scripture," caving" to culture, and encouraging this woman to sin. Part of the fallout was his **long-running radio** show of forty years was promptly dropped by the American Family Radio network. "In other words, he was cancelled."

Maybe you have seen or experienced a similar story. Whatever your opinion is and without condemning Begg, the woman asking or the American family Network, what feelings come to the front of when you hear such a story?

2. Bryan continued to set up one of the Scriptural passages of the message by saying:

"I begin with that story to illustrate a **disturbing trend** in the church today to **shut down** anyone who might **challenge or stretch** traditional ways of understanding and living out our faith. **Many Christians** are so CERTAIN that their **point of view** is the RIGHT one, and the ONLY right one, that they not only REFUSE to even CONSIDER another point of view, they PUNISH and DISMISS the person **who dares** to ask a question. **Whether you agree** with Begg's advice or not – full disclosure, **I do** – surely the **question is worthy** of conversation and consideration, and surely a **fellow believer and faithful servant** like Begg is worthy of respect and a fair hearing.

But it turns out **this tendency** to SHUT DOWN dissenting voices and difficult conversations – with malice, and even violence – has **been a problem** for people of faith for a long time. And today, in Mark's gospel, Jesus is going to **confront it."**

What are some of the reasons we are seeing this unfortunate way of dealing with disagreement today? As we move in to our discussion time, what are some of our initial hopes you hold for us a society and for us as Christian community?

Mark 12:13-17

- 3. Let's read Mark 12:13-17
 - a. What strikes you as interesting or confusing in this text?
 - b. Why are the religious leaders the Pharisees and Herodians trying to trap Jesus?
 - c. Some context to appreciate the text: The Pharisees were arguably the most faithful and least corrupted of the Jewish sects of the day. The Herodians were a small but extremely wealthy and politically connected to Rome (i.e. Herod). These two groups did not care for each other. To the Herodians, the Pharisees were irrelevant and "too old-school" while the Pharisees saw the Herodians as compromised and worldly. They would have cancelled each other if they could but they had a shared enemy in Jesus whose popularity had grown so immense they decided to unite against him. What comparisons does this bring to mind? (Group Leader note not to read out loud now.

But ideas could include, this would be like Republicans and Democrats uniting against a political adversary or two cultural personalities who have criticized the other temporarily putting aside their grievances to attack a third party. The point we want to make at this point is that these Jewish sects were against each other until they decided to attack Jesus together.)

- 4. With brilliance and wisdom, Jesus answers their question with the simple words: Give to Caesar what is Caesar's and give to God what is God's. What does Jesus' profound answer bring to mind for you?
- 5. We all have certainties, categories and be in control of matters that perhaps we need to exercise more humility and graciousness in. Let's think for a few minutes silently. What good can surrendering our certainty, categories and our need for control bring to those in our lives and throughout our world?

Take Home Message:

"Thy will be done" means surrendering our certainty, our categories, and our need for control, and exchanging them for curiosity, connection, and confidence in God.

V. Support for the Leader

These Teaching Points are provided to help the group leader make connections from the message to their group with both insights from the Biblical text and opportunities in the life of our church.

Teaching Points:

- Mark is not concerned with trying to convince people to be a disciple of Jesus. He is trying to convince people that it is not through power Jesus is going to be the Messiah, the savior of the world, it is through serving, suffering, and surrendering
- Although surrendering our desires for God's desires isn't easy, surrender is the currency
 of the kingdom of God. Because in God's Kingdom, it isn't power, wealth or status that
 gives you access; it's surrender

- Jesus wasn't someone who just prayed when he was going through a hard time, he
 prayed all of the time so that when he encountered a hard time, that he would be more
 ready
- Being around Jesus is not the same thing as becoming like Jesus
- Jesus came not to be served, but he came to serve and to give his life for us
- Jesus surrendered his desire for self-preservation
- Share your life with Jesus, talk to him, let him know exactly how you feel.
