

Sermon Discussion Guide October 26, 2025

Refresh

Read Psalm 145 to get the Scripture passage back in your mind.

Discuss

David exhausts his vocabulary in Psalm 145 in order to describe God's greatness. How does our language for God reveal the depth (or shallowness) of our worship? What are some ways we can cultivate a richer vocabulary of praise in everyday life?

The sermon reminded us that eternity isn't long enough to fully praise God. How should that truth shape the way we worship and live now? Do you ever find your worship limited by what you understand about God rather than by who He is?

Psalm 145:4 says, "One generation shall commend your works to another." What are some practical ways you've seen God's praise faithfully passed down between generations? In what ways have you seen older generations struggle to pass down God's praise? How can we as parents, grandparents, or older saints intentionally "commend" God's works to the next generation?

Why do generational or stylistic preferences tend to distract us from joining together in praise? How can we ensure that our differences in worship style or preferences don't keep us from worshiping God?

David's vision of praise includes all creation proclaiming God's Kingdom. How might remembering that "God reigns" help us respond differently to today's cultural fears, political tension, or personal struggles? Why do we sometimes act as though we have forgotten that God reigns when there are trials in our lives?

We see in Matthew 28 that Jesus' first resurrection word to the disciples was "Rejoice." What does it look like to praise God with joy even in seasons of suffering or loss? Can you share a time when praise became a source of strength in hardship?
