Join our Joy this Advent

When you are a seminarian studying to be a priest, you get to practice with Morning Prayer with other church nerds. It is probably the hardest thing you have to do. Mainly because you have 300 "experts" in the room judging anything you say or do. One of the opening lines for the service comes from Psalm 122, "I was glad when they said to be, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord.'" The only problem was that folks were so nervous and worried about doing it right, they said the words with a furrowed brow and an anxious voice. Nothing about the seminarian tended to match the phrase that was said. And I almost always laughed.

Psalm 122 is the first one we say together in the season of Advent. The opening line can be translated as glad or joyful or literally "I rejoiced." I said the words this summer when I stood next to the Western Wall and on the Temple Mount. And I was filled with joy. I was ecstatic to finally be in that sacred place with good folks from Holy Innocents.

The great challenge of Advent is to be filled with joy, to be joy-ful, to rejoice. Typically we are worried about Christmas shopping lists, parties, events, the dangers of the world, and the hurried, crazy feel of the season. We say we are excited and joyful, but like those anxious seminarians, our faces and voices seldom match the words. We are called to take a moment or twenty and celebrate God in this sacred season. Advent should be a time when we try to connect our hearts and souls with the words of celebration found in the texts.

To say it differently, join us on the four Sundays of Advent to celebrate God's presence in the world and rejoice that we are together. Join us as we celebrate the Rev. John Porter on December 4. Celebrate our long relationship with Temple Sinai when Rabbi Emeritus Phil Kranz preaches on December 11. Enjoy Lesson and Carols with our choir on December 18. There is so much to celebrate as a community returning together to the things we love. So, rejoice! Celebrate! Share the joy! "I rejoiced when they said, 'Let us go to the house of the Lord- to Holy Innocents- together!"


A Royal Visit | December 4


We close out our 150th celebration with a visit from one of England's royal composers, Paul Mealor. He will be here for the world premiere of his new piece for 15-piece string orchestra, tubular bells, and piano. Players include members from the ASO, Atlanta Ballet Orchestra, Atlanta Opera Orchestra, and Holy Innocents' Episcopal School. As divine choreography would have it, we will also be celebrating the 56 years of ministry of The Rev. John Porter that Sunday. What a way to close out an amazing year!

Composer and professor, Paul Mealor has written many pieces for multiple royal occasions. One of his most popular pieces, which you can find on YouTube, is his motet *Ubi caritas* that was commissioned for the wedding of Prince William and Kate Middleton. Paul has already been in the musical presence for His Majesty, King Charles and had many pieces performed at various functions for her late majesty, Queen Elizabeth II.

Paul Mealor, who is also a professor at the University of Aberdeen, will speak at formation at 9:00 AM on the intersection of faith and music. Come, invite your friends, and spread the word about this royal visit and as we honor a jewel in our crown – The Rev. John Porter. This will be a Sunday to remember.







Giving Update

Holy Innocents is so thankful for the pledges and donations that we have recently received. As of November 15, we have 119 pledges for \$1,606,700 to pay off our capital debt. In the last 5 weeks, donations have allowed us to pay down \$555,157!

The interest rate on the loan has increased to 5.88% from 2.35% in April, so principal payments make a big difference. As for our 2023 operating budget, we have 161 pledges for \$973,965. If you have not pledged, please consider pledging as we plan for the 2023 budget.





Discovering Joy, an Advent Practice

Joy, says Brené Brown, is a guidepost for wholehearted living. She coined this phrase from the Episcopal confession of sin where we say, "we have not loved you with our whole heart".

Joy, she says, involves risk. It makes us vulnerable. Subject to pain, sorrow, fear, disappointment, and a sense of foolishness. When we suspect Joy is rising up within us, we beat it to the punch, and bar the door. As Brené Brown puts it, we forbode joy.

But Joy resides deep within us. It is there and fully available. Joy is a fruit of the Holy Spirit.

A beautiful Sacred Story that evidences this Holy-Spirit-Joy is in Luke chaper one. Right before Jesus' birth stories, the Holy Spirit is twirling and swirling about, conceiving joy.

"When Elizabeth heard Mary's greeting, the babe leaped in her womb; and Elizabeth was filled with the Holy Spirit. . ." She said, "the babe leaped in my womb for joy." And next thing you know, Mary was singing a song of salvation.

These were not ideal circumstances for Mary and Elizabeth. Not the perfection of life. Not the moments of prayers answered. These were difficult days, and yet, the thrill of the Holy Spirit wells up from the depths. And produces Joy.

Imagine each of us, ridiculously subdued. Drearily walking this earth, unknowing and unaware. While all along, there is a deep cool well of refreshing effervescence, a potion for joy in such full measure that it could make our hearts sing. Not because of circumstances, or perfection of life as we want it, but just because. Because of the Holy Spirit.

It is not the absence of joy that prevents joy, but it is our experienced practice of inhibiting it.

Accessing Joy can be an Advent practice. We count days with Advent Calendars, and light four blue candles, one at a time. The idea isn't to make the time pass more quickly, but to make our journey intentional. A practice to locate ourselves exactly where we are, in this day, in these circumstances, and then opening our hearts to the light in it, opening our souls to the Holy Spirit Joy in it.

It is in this day and only in this day, where we can find Joy. This is where God's Holy Spirit is, right here, right now. Maybe we, too, can find ourselves leaping and singing, and twirling about!
