



The Sacred Confusion of Advent THE REV. DR. BILL MURRAY

Every family observes and maintains certain holiday traditions. My wife's family chooses to never label their presents. This tradition is not born from some deep egalitarian purpose where all the gifts are the same or a quirky desire to simplify the process with wrapping paper themes. The goal rests in thwarting inquisitive minds and impish hands. As the family story goes, Jessie, my bride, loved the build up to Christmas. However, she has never received the gift of patience. Many years

ago, as Christmas day in Birmingham inched closer and filled a certain little girl with expectations, her fascination and day-dreams were overtaken by action. The myriad wrapped boxes under the tree were a target far too tempting to resist. One day she carefully opened all her presents, took inventory of the surprises, and then wrapped them all back up. She will openly confess that she ruined her own Christmas that year. I suspect that a combination of Jessie's bad acting and of gifts not quite perfectly re-wrapped led to the enduring tradition of never labeling Christmas presents. Their family tradition is meant to preserve expectation, surprise, and hope.

Advent rests comfortably at the opening of the Church calendar, filled with longing. The season is meant to be more than a way to help us count down the days to Christmas. The reality of Advent dwells closer to opening presents and hoping desperately for more. The four-week season exists as a liturgical pun. We are indeed preparing ourselves for the coming of Christmas, to revel in the wonder and majesty of God in a manger, to recall the gift of incarnation to the world. In the same breath, we are preparing for the return of Jesus in glory, for Christ's second coming, for a future moment technically named the eschaton. In Romans, Paul theologically connects this time of both the presence of Christ and the future return of Christ to pregnancy. The missionary from Tarsus sees the whole of creation groaning in expectation even as we groan in the hope of a better world as children of God. Even the Spirit of God groans with us in prayer as we recall the gift of the Incarnation and inexorably yearn for Christ's return to set all things to right.

As Christmas creeps closer and fills us with expectations, we are placed in a wonderful tension. We will celebrate again the joy of the nativity with family and friends gathered. We must also wait, hope, and pray, with sighs and groaning too deep for words, for a second gift that will come one day soon that has no label but will surprise and redeem us all.

10:00 AM • DECEMBER 25 • CHAPEL


CHRISTMAS DAY EUCHARIST

(1982 Hymnal P. 65) And so we know that in his kingdom there are no children without pleasures, no hungry without a feast, no poor without plenty, no lonely without company. Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight, mountains made low, valleys filled, crooked and rough made straight and smooth. A picture of justice and equity. We feed the hungry, and give to the poor, because in Advent

we are trying to bring in the kingdom. We give to the homeless and the needy because we have become activists for the kingdom of God, and we do justice, where we live, in our schools, and households, and in our neighborhoods, for a domestic kind of spirituality, because Advent is about darkness, and light, and birthing God at the very heart of human existence.

We busy ourselves with outreach and social ministries in Advent. We think we do this because Christmas is a sentimental and joyful season, but really, we busy ourselves with outreach and social ministries because our King is coming, and we need to hurry up! Because sometimes "coming in from the noise," means going out into the noise to see what the ruckus is. We're feeling our way in the dark, and imagining the earth filled with his glory, and it compels us to assuage the cries, comfort the pain, and sooth the sorrows that create the very noise that deafens and disturbs us.

We need to tidy our house. We know just enough about this king to know that our house is nothing like his kingdom, and we scramble. We have heard that he champions the widow and orphan, he lifts up the lowly, and crushes the oppressor. He defends the cause of the poor and gives deliverance to the needy.

This is a kingdom we want. We want to usher it in, and we ourselves want to be part of it. This is where we want to live, and we become activists to dispel the darkness. All our holy work, for peace on earth and the kingdom come.

Red used to be my favorite color. But somewhere along the way, green quietly took over. We painted our kitchen green. I have green pants and a green sweater I love. Maybe it tracks: I was a horticulture major. But it's more than aesthetic; there's something about greenery that speaks to me now in this Advent season.

The glossy magnolia leaf. The scent of pine boughs drifting in when you open the door. Holiday greens are as powerful to me as the fragrant blossoms of Easter. So come be green with us. Come breathe. Come deepen your roots. Come wait with hope for the light that is already on its way.

Anyone who knows me at all knows I'm obsessed with Christmas. I'm talking listeningto-Christmas-music-in-April kind of obsessed. There's something about the lights,

the music, and the anticipation of celebrating Jesus' birth that just fills my heart with joy.

But for me, Christmas has come to mean even more than tinsel and carols. It reminds me of waiting, and of God's perfect timing. After years of IVF and what felt like endless waiting and hoping, God gave me the most perfect Christmas gift: my son, Liam, born on Christmas Day. That moment was a beautiful reminder that God's timing is never off, even when we think we can't wait another second.

The Bible is full of people who knew what it meant to wait. Think of Moses and the Israelites, wandering in the desert for forty years before entering the Promised Land. Or Joseph, who waited in prison for years before God elevated him to save nations. Even David,

anointed as king as a young man, had to wait through rejection, danger, and years of uncertainty before he finally sat on the throne. Each of these stories reminds us that waiting isn't wasted, it's part of God's preparation and plan.

Advent is a season that calls us to live in that waiting, expectant, hopeful, and trusting. It's a time to remember that God is at work even when we can't see it, and that His timing is always perfect. Just like I waited for Liam, we are called to wait for the fulfillment of God's promises in our lives, big and small.

So this Advent, whether you are waiting for something in your heart, your family, your faith, or even just a quiet moment of peace, remember: God is faithful. He is working behind the scenes, weaving everything together for our good, even when it feels like the waiting will never end. And when the moment finally comes, like it did for me on Christmas morning, it will be more perfect than anything we could have imagined.

I took my kids trick-or-treating on Halloween night this year. They're 7 and 11, and we had just enjoyed an amazing time at the church fall festival the weekend before. They also

had class parties during the week, and we did some festive things at home, too. So, by the time the actual holiday rolled around, they didn't have a lot of excitement left for celebrating. We started walking around the neighborhood collecting candy, and things were going fine—but no one was overjoyed until we came across a house with over-the-top decorations and a guy sitting at a table at the end of the driveway.
