







Growing Together THE REV. DR. BILL MURRAY

I was young when it happened- maybe 9 or 10 years old. My cousins were all significantly older than me. My dad

was the baby in his family by seven years, and my mom was thirteen years younger than he closest brother. One of my cousins was getting married, and we were all due to meet her fiancée at my grandparents' farm near Medina, Tennessee. He arrived and did his best to meet and impress the 15 plus souls all gathered to meet him. My mom's family all had a sharp sense of humor and loved to tease and joke about all sorts of things, large and small. This new fiancée asked innocently and earnestly, "What do y'all do fun around here?" And with a twinkle in his eye, my uncle declared, "We set up chairs and watch the cotton grow! Join us!"

Now even I knew that we do no such thing, but I quickly decided to get in on this moment of ridiculous fun. I grabbed a lawn chair, walked the 100 or so feet from the house, and set up in the line with the rest of the family to watch the crops grow. We still laugh that we all managed to do this without chuckling, smiling, or letting on in any way. A group of fifteen folks set up chairs in a single line, all facing a cotton field, sat down, and started chatting away like it was a normal event. After about fifteen minutes or so, the poor fiancée finally broke down enough to say, "This doesn't see too exciting, what did I miss?!"

In many ways, nurturing our faith and cultivating our community is a similar process. There is a ton of work to do, much to invest and pray over, and nothing at all to sit around and watch. In fact, much of the growth happens through God's hand while we are busy trying to take care of all sorts of other things. But if we are doing it right, then there should be great moments of laughter and fun and joy as we grow together.

Over the last three years, we have steadily invested more and more in our children and youth ministries, in our music programs, in growing our staff, and in outreach. The growth has not always been noticeable, unless you look at these trends. In 2021 we had an average Sunday attendance (ASA) of 155. In 2022 we increased to 296 a Sunday, and in 2023 we jumped again to 319. The number in 2023 is close to our pre-COVID numbers in 2019. So far in 2024, we have 336 each Sunday. We have roughly doubled the youth group and children's ministry numbers. Our choir has gone from barely five singers to a dozen and growing. Our outreach program is growing in gifts to the community and in programs to involve volunteers.

To nurture our faith and cultivate our community, we need to see what is working and continue to invest to grow and thrive in our relationships with God and each other. So this year we are seeking to put our money in five areas: Children and Youth, Music and Worship, Outreach, Our Lady of Guadalupe and Spanish ministries, and our staff. Each of those areas has been a key to growth in our church, each of those areas impacts many in our faith, and each of those areas are the key to the future success of our community.

As we begin this season of stewardship, take a moment and think about the ways our church has impacted your life and the lives of those you love. Take a moment to think on the many ways God has blessed you. Take a moment to dream of the good things ahead for us all as we share those gifts to nurture our faith and cultivate community. I believe you will see the Holy Spirit alive and well and moving powerfully in our church. I know you will quickly see how Christ draws near to us in faith and live. And, yes, I believe you will find it to be a lot more fun than watching the crops grow. You will see how God has raised up our church to be a witness to the world.

I had a joyful little thought about one of the Offertory Sentences the other day that made me chuckle. The Offertory Sentence I'm thinking of is the one I use most often. Most clergy use it most often. You know it:

> "Walk in love as Christ loved us, and gave himself for us, an offering and sacrifice to God."

It tickled me to suddenly think, "Well there ya have it! That's it! right in front of me:

People " "walking in love" " out there with dogs.

That's what it means, that's what it looks like, that's how we do it, this offering.

We tend. We treat. We set aside our own comfort.

We take care. We delight. We afford.

We put up with shenanigans.

We clean up. We companion. We feed. We play.

We walk... in love.

Sure, the animals are cute and everything, but it's the love that's so compelling. So life changing. Love keeps us alive!

The Offertory Sentences are on p. 376 in the BCP. It's a list of sentences (all from scripture), like a primer for each of us to work out our own theology of Stewardship, and how it is that we bring ourselves, our souls and bodies, our God-given gifts, and make an offering.

So, I'm thinking, what a beautiful theology of stewardship, to offer our God given gifts and natural resources, to walk in love; to create a habitat of love in the world. To offer all that we have, to God, for the love of the world: an oasis of kindness, goodness, gentleness. And to walk in it, by the doing of it. To be in it, ourselves, to be in, the love.

I'm craving the big love. The walking in love. The falling in love. All of it like a wrap, a mantle of love, garmented in love. All of the neighborhood and people in condominiums and apartments, coming out for a breath of fresh air and green space, to find love and human community, and dog-walking. Strangers, walking in love all around us in our neighborhoods, surrounding us in love, because that's what they do:

They walk, in love.

They walk their dogs, in love,

They stroll their babies, in love,

They hike around with companions and partners, in love.

Knowing Wisdom

My friend gave me the cutest little succulent plant as a housewarming gift. It's about the size of a baseball, and it fits perfectly in my palms. The ceramic pot is white with black speckles and a gold rim. It's perfectly round at the bottom but the rim is asymmetrical. The speckles on the pot are also irregular. Some are big, some are small, some are streaks, and some are very dark while others are faint. It gives me so much joy to hold this little plant and contemplate all its uniqueness.

Often I feel like I am looking at an inverted picture of the night sky. The speckles are stars lighting up the galaxy, and some of them are streaking by so fast you would miss them if you blinked. But some are so big and bright that they constantly draw your attention, while still others are so far away that you barely see their little flicker. But as your eyes adjust to the darkness, you see more and more light shining all around you and the more you look around, the more you notice. All of it was indeed there all along but we just couldn't see it until we took a moment to let our physical nature catch up.

This is the nature of our earthly walk. We sense something in our spirit long before we can sense it in our bodies. You know deep in your soul when something feels right and when something feels off, and part of our journey is learning how to strengthen and trust those instincts. When God spoke to Elijah at Mount Horeb, God did not speak out of the great wind, or the earthquake, or the fire, but with a still, small voice. Elijah heard that still, small voice and responded. And with practice, we too, can hear it and respond. So, take that pause and let your eyes adjust to the darkness. Contemplate the beauty in your life. Reflect and give space for your soul to lead with the wisdom it already knows. And know that your faith community is here to help your nurture that light.
