#### Pastor's Note by Stina Koppes



"Everything is permitted, but everything isn't beneficial. Everything is permitted, but everything doesn't build others up. No one should look out for their own advantage, but they should look out for each other. Eat everything that is sold in the marketplace, without asking questions about it because of your conscience. The earth and all that is in it belong to the Lord."

~ 1 Corinthians 10:23-26

This spring I became a Certified Food Safety Manager in order to help Cross Winds navigate the licensing process of opening a commercial kitchen. I must confess to you that this ranks up in my "wouldn't have guessed that" list of job experiences, but then again so did weekly televangelist. Going through the training and credentialing process with the MN Department of Health and our County Health Inspectors has opened a space for me to reflect on our shared responsibilities towards the common good especially as it extends to our larger community beyond our church family.

In the Bible, the Apostle Paul also dealt with food safety rules, albeit a slightly different context. In his first letter to the Corinthians (chapter 10), he speaks in some detail towards the early church's relationship between food purity laws and social hospitality. There were a lot of details to work out as to how a church would gather for their own church family gatherings as well as what would happen when church members would extend hospitality towards others or attend other public gatherings. There were so many dietary rules! Plus, at that time, animals were sacrificed to various gods, so eating certain things mustered up a conversation about idol worship and other concerns.

Nowadays we may not have the same concern about animal sacrifice, but we definitely still have lots of questions about food purity, safety, and the economic implications of our hospitality choices. As a church, we're going to be figuring these things out together as our kitchen opens. I anticipate it will take us time to get our footing. In the discernment, I encourage us to remember the framework the Apostle Paul used with that early church in Corinth. As we make our decisions, let us focus on the things that help to build up. After all, everything may be beneficial, but not everything will build up. We must not look out to our own advantage but stay focused on looking out for one another. When we do so, we will welcome Christ in our midst and God will be glorified.

# MESSAGES FROM WILDERNESS



Throughout the Bible there are stories of people who faced adversity in the wilderness. Each of us has seasons in our own lives when we walk through the wilderness - facing anxieties, fears, and loss. In this series, we will study the lives of five biblical characters who found themselves in the wilderness and reflect on their experiences provide wisdom for us to survive our own wilderness experiences.

#### July 2 - Big Dreams

Genesis 37:1-11

Thank you to all who gave blood and helped make this event a success! 25 total units were collected and 33% of donations were from first-time givers.








#### **Nursery - July 2**



#### Information about Second Harvest Service Project

Volunteers assist with sorting, labeling, weighing and packing various food items to meet immediate needs and help feed our hungry neighbors. The projects vary from day to day and volunteer positions require volunteers to be able to twist and bend down, stand for the duration of their shift, and lift up to 5 pounds.

Dress Code: Shirts must cover the shoulders, armpits, and bellies (no tank tops or crop tops) for food safety purposes. Shorts are okay to wear. Closed-toe shoes are required. If you forget we will ask you to wear a set of disposable socks and slip-on clogs. Wear comfortable clothing that you don't mind getting dirty. No jewelry. You will be asked to remove all watches, fit bits, earrings, rings, bracelets, necklaces and other jewelry items. It is almost impossible to get back a jewelry item that is lost in the repack process.

#### **Connections Team Update**

This fall, Cross Winds launched a one-year pilot program leadership team called the Connections Team. The team consisted of program staff and lay volunteers partnering together to discern and prioritize ministry activities that align with the values of Cross Winds. The aim was to be a hub for ministry programming; aware of activities across the church but not responsible for execution of all programs. The Connections Team took on the work previously cared for by the Ministry Leadership Team (MLT) and assorted program ministry teams such as mission team, adult education team, etc.

We are grateful for the following leaders who committed to this pilot program work: Jamie Boettcher (Chair), Kris Kosloski (hospitality representative), John Mbali, Cindy Hall, Kathryn Wahl, Pastor Stina, Lori Lahtinen (Director of Worship), Amber Lahtinen (Director of Children's Ministry), Josh Greer (Director of Youth Ministries), and Christy Sturlaugson, our Pastoral Intern.

After reflection and discovery of this initial team, it has been recommended to the Cross Winds Board that a new elected leadership team be formed, known as the Connections Committee, bringing it into the folds of other elected-leader committees (such as Trustees, SPRC, Nominations, etc.). This would also entail formalizing the member structure into three-year terms ("classes") and the fulfillment into the work of the Nominations committee. The attributes identified at the start of the pilot year still hold true: This team needs passionate, curious, engaged people who are committed to partnering with staff for brainstorming, planning, discerning, commissioning, and collaborating on Cross Winds programs. One of the lay members on the Connections committee should have a strong connection to the hospitality team.

Upon review of this recommendation, the Board approved the formation of the Connections Committee. This summer, work will begin on forming this new elected leadership committee. We ask you to pray for the work of all of our elected church leaders, but especially for the development of this new committee.

#### **MN Annual Conference Meeting Report**

On May 31 and June 1, delegates from across MN gathered for the 169th session of the Annual Conference meeting of MN United Methodist congregations. Cross Winds delegates included Stina Koppes (Clergy), Michelle Schober (lay delegate), Shirley Duncanson (retired clergy), and Paul Baker (retired clergy).

**Theme:** Drawing on Luke 24:13-35, the theme of this year's gathering was "Encounter. Transform. Respond. The Emmaus Experience." This post-resurrection story where everything has changed, and the implications still seem a bit cloudy mirror the time and space we are living in as a church. We, like the two disciples, are on the road, asking deep questions, and trying to make sense of what it means to be a disciple of Jesus today. And we, too, are finding that we encounter Christ in transforming ways when we do.

**Bishop's Episcopal Address:** In the Emmaus Road story, the impossible becomes possible as the world is made right again through encounters with the resurrected Christ who brings healing, reconciliation, and hope. Bishop Lanette Plambeck, in her inaugural Episcopal Address, reminds us that this story for the two disciples on the road is our story too. During this challenging time in The United Methodist Church, she invited those of us in the Minnesota Conference to lean into one another and declare that there is enough love for all of us, and she reminded each person: You are loved. You are a child of God and a person of worth. There are no exceptions. (Watch or download Episcopal Address.)

**Milestones in ministry:** Those gathered honored and thanked 14 clergy entering retirement, and they celebrated four pastors ordained as elders, two commissioned as provisional members, three local licensed pastors who completed their five-year course of study, and 13 people authorized to serve as local pastors in the congregations and ministry areas in which they are appointed. Familiar to Cross Winds included Rev. Dan Johnson (retiring), Laura Cottington (Licensed Local Pastor) and Christy Sturlaugson (Licensed Local Pastor).

**Love Offering:** Conference members, on behalf of their churches gave just over \$40,000 to the 2023 Love Offering. Sixty percent of it will fund a new grant to support churches that have partnerships with mental health services offered in local schools or communities, 30 percent will go to three Minnesota nonprofits engaged in mental health education and advocacy, and 10 percent of the Love Offering each year goes to Volunteers in Mission scholarships, which support first-time mission trip participants.

**Legislation:** Hundreds of voting members in attendance at Annual Conference approved all pieces of legislation before them, including resolutions opposing assault-style weapons, addressing the Israeli detention of children, and supporting both a U.S. Regional Conference and the removal of all discriminatory policies and harmful language related to sexual orientation from the Book of Discipline.
