It's Driver Training 101:

Spend the majority of your time looking at what's in front of you and only occasionally glance in the rearview mirror. Those backward glances are important because they give us context. And sometimes it's appropriate even to stop the car, pause the journey, and get our bearings for the ongoing journey.

September 2021, Grace Point celebrates 120 years of God's faithfulness. I doubt that anyone in September 1901 could have imagined that First Baptist Church of Newtown would have a new name and a new location, nor could they have imagined the world as we know it today. But neither can we look ahead and imagine the world of 2141 in another 120 years – if Christ should tarry that long!

But what we can do is pause for a moment and glance back so that we can learn from the past in a similar way that we learn from the spiritual legacy recorded in Scripture:

For everything that was written in the past was written to teach us, so that through the endurance taught in the Scriptures and the encouragement they provide we might have hope. (Romans 15:4)

GLANCING BACK LOOKING AHEAD

Here are two lessons we learn as we glance back:

Change and challenge are not new to our generation. As we find ourselves in a season of transitions, we're tempted to think there's so much change happening that we may be dealing with something out of the ordinary. But we learn from history that seasons of change and challenge are nothing new. Our forebearers saw tremendous changes in transportation, communication, and technology in the twentieth century. They faced the challenges of world wars and ongoing conflict, both globally and at home. While our changes bring unfamiliar new realities to us, change has been happening since Grace Point was founded in 1901 and before.

The other lesson helps us accept the first:

God is faithful through every change and challenge: we can always trust Him. As we glance back, we gain encouragement from seeing God's faithfulness to keep every promise He has made. We celebrate God's power in continuing to help more people become fully-committed followers of Christ through the ministry of Grace Point. Christ is our anchor through all the change – as He has been, so shall He ever be:

Jesus Christ is the same yesterday, today, and forever. (Hebrews 13:8)

As we pause this year to glance back, may we continue to celebrate God's faithfulness to advance His Kingdom purpose of spreading the saving gospel of Jesus Christ, so that those who come after us may have much to celebrate as well.

May 12, 1901 REV. E. C. ROMINE began to hold services in Langhorne and Newtown Hall, and it was decided among those gathered that they should organize a Baptist church and call a council of recognition. Sept 22, 1901 After Rev. E. C. Romine had preached in Newtown Hall, a business meeting for the purpose of organizing a church was held with Rev. Romine as moderator. The 13 charter members proceeded to organize and officially move forward with the naming of the church as "THE FIRST BAPTIST CHURCH OF NEWTOWN". Nov 1901 REV. C. W. TEASDALE was chosen as the new pastor, as Rev. E.C. Romine had been the organizer and charter member but did not consider himself as the pastor of the church. 1903 The church procured the "GAS HOUSE LOT" for \$500 and plans were solicited to build on the property. Sept 25, 1905 THE OFFICIAL GROUNDBREAKING OF THE FIRST PERMANENT LOCATION

for First Baptist Church of Newtown located at 29 N. State



Street. The stone and stained glass were all donated by the generosity of the church members.

May 1906 DEDICATION **SERVICE** for the new N. State Street location. Apr 1912 Despite a membership of only

51, the church was "STEPPING OUT ON THE PROMISES" and the neighboring property was purchased for church expansion for \$2,050. June 14, 1914 "TO GET AN EXPRESSION OF THE OPINION OF THE MEMBERS AS TO WHETHER THEY WISH THE LORD'S WORK TO BE CONTINUED IN NEWTOWN IN THE BAPTIST CHURCH OR WHETHER THEY ARE UNINTERESTED IN IT, AND

CARE NOT WHETHER THE BAPTIST CHURCH BE OPEN OR CLOSED." To this pathetic appeal only 16 members responded by their presence at this special meeting, but they somehow received a burst of vision or a new



baptism of faith..." Nov 29, 1920 Ordination of Rev. William A "A PROMISING CHOIR OF 22 MEMBERS Gallagher 1932 1935 A Hammond electric organ WAS ORGANIZED." was installed in the church costing \$1,400. **BUILDING COMMITTEE WAS APPOINTED and a recommendation** was made to expand the building. But because these were war years, the building program could not get under construction. However, in 1946 a new concrete walk was laid in front of both the church and the parsonage property. has a congregation been more excited than was ours when ground was broken for the new addition. Sept 1950 During the morning worship service, a formal dedication service was held. At the evening service the new baptistry was used for the first time with seven candidates following Christ in the waters of baptism. The church trustees negotiated the purchase of a new parsonage (421 Merion Drive, Newtown) for \$26,000.

It was voted on and adopted by the congregation. 1978 The church obtained an agreement to purchase land in Newtown Township in anticipation of breaking ground for a new facility in the spring or early summer of 1979. 1980 Because of cost and scheduling problems, an idea of relocating to



was dropped. Instead, plans were made to expand the existing church facility. 1982 Construction on the new sanctuary and fellowship hall were completed and portions of the old building we renovated. After many years of ministry, Pastor Wambaugh resigned, which culminated

in a search to eventually call Rev. Dave Ridder to be Senior 1987 THE CHURCH'S FIRST ELDER BOARD WAS FORMED, with Ted Benna, David Lewis, Bob Marquardt, Creed Palmer and Bill Suk serving as elders. During the summer, THE CHURCH SENT OUT ITS FIRST SUMMER YOUTH MISSIONS TEAM on a work project in the Dominican Republic. May 1992 The purchase of the 25-acre tract on Route 532 at Stoopville Road was completed. May 1998 The Building Committee was reconstituted to refine a proposed building concept which had been shelved for several years. The "GOD IS MOVING US" stewardship

campaign was launched in the fall to raise funds that would allow us to move to a new facility, now known as Grace Point.

2001 The highlight of the year was holding a Centennial Celebration service on the new Route 532 property, followed by a picnic. A Children's Ministry



mid-week club program was reinstituted using the AWANA program and curriculum. A new worship service format was established, now offering "blended" and "contemporary" worship styles. 2003 CONSTRUCTION WAS FINALLY

Aug 2004 After much angst, the treasured building permit was acquired and in 48 hours the church moved everything from the State

Street location to the new building, eventually named Grace Point. Oct 2015 Grace Point launched its first church plant in Levittown named Restoration Church.

SENIOR / LEAD PASTORS

E.C. Romine helped plant the church, yet was never considered the full-time pastor. He was a church planter active in the Philadelphia and New Jersey area in the late 1800's and early 1900's. He first came to Newtown in 1888 and preached what appears to be the first sermon that gave rise to FBCN at Newtown Hall on September 22, 1901. It was after this service that a meeting was convened to establish a Baptist church in Newtown.







FOR SEVERAL YEARS our Children's Ministry has partnered with Samaritan's Purse in Operation Christmas Child as an outreach opportunity. In November 2020 we received communications from Samaritan's Purse, President and CEO, Franklin Graham, stating that because of the COVID-19 Pandemic, "Now, more than ever, children need hope!" That was all the encouragement we needed, and the planning began!

We set a goal to fill 650 shoe boxes, and we planned our first ever church-wide packing party where we determined we would fill 400 boxes. The items for the packing party were donated by our GP family and resulted in Amazon making many deliveries to Grace Point!

Perhaps our most inspiring story comes from the heart of Alexis Wright (Bill and Jodi Wright's 6-year-old daughter). She was so moved by compassion for children all over the world that she asked if she could host a lemonade stand with the goal of donating the proceeds to purchase items for the packing party. Her parents turned the lemonade stand idea into a surprise birthday drive-by parade (due to COVID) asking for donations in lieu of gifts! Classmates, teachers, neighbors and GP families participated in the fun. To say that the lemonade stand was a success would be an understatement! Alexis raised \$552 on a cold fall day in October, during a global pandemic, hosting a drive-thru lemonade stand. *Only God!*

Our packing party was a huge success, and our goal was met! 400 boxes were packed by 37 enthusiastic packers serving in two shifts. The GP Student Ministry provided great support before, during and after the event.

When it was all said it done, Grace Point provided 760 shoe boxes to Samaritan's Purse partnering with them "In sending the Gospel to the ends of the earth, sharing God's Word with dozens of unreached people groups and going to hard-to-reach places to make His Name known. This has resulted in more than 2 million children making decisions for Christ and over 1,000 churches being started in one year!" (Franklin Graham)

IN JANUARY 2021, the GP Women's Ministry sponsored an all-church outreach "Showers of Blessings" benefitting one of our local ministry partners — ChoiceOne. The heart of this GP Women's Ministry sponsored outreach was to minister the Gospel and kindness of Christ to the young moms and babies of ChoiceOne through meeting practical needs and providing English and Spanish Bibles and devotionals. (This outreach served in tandem with our annual Baby Bottle fundraising campaign for ChoiceOne sponsored by our Local Missions Team.) The response of the church to this outreach was AMAZING!!! Generosity and care were expressed through many Bibles, devotionals, thousands of diapers and wipes, and

the 15 diaper backpacks and 7 baby tubs that were filled to overflowing with baby bath items, diaper changing necessities, bottles, teething rings, thermometers, linens, pampering gifts for mom and much more! Each backpack and tub included the Gospel message and a hand-written note for the mom who would receive the gifts.

This outreach was also a wonderful opportunity to serve together for the women who volunteered and gathered to prepare the care packages. Three vehicles were loaded up with the care packages, boxes of diapers, a new bassinet and other items and transported to ChoiceOne.

Please be praying for the hearts and minds of the moms and babies who received the Bibles, devotionals and packages through ChoiceOne and that they would know Christ and walk wholeheartedly with Him; that God's truth, love, redemption, salvation and kindness touches these lives for eternity; for the leadership and staff of ChoiceOne to be strengthened and encouraged and to always yield to the leading of the Holy Spirit; for the volunteers of ChoiceOne as they minister the Gospel; that God is glorified, and His Name exalted through this outreach and in these precious lives.
