

HOLY HERESY 5: FOR GOD'S GLORY ALONE (SOLI DEO GLORIA) MARCH 26 / 27, 2025

I. Introduction: The Five Solas and the Ultimate Purpose

- a. The Reformation was shaped by five foundational ideas:
 - i. Sola Gratia (Grace Alone)
 - ii. Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone)
 - iii. Solus Christus (Christ Alone)
 - iv. Sola Fide (Faith Alone)
 - v. Soli Deo Gloria (For the Glory of God Alone)
- b. Soli Deo Gloria is the final and ultimate sola, the goal to which all others lead.

II. The Five Solas Reflected in Ephesians 1:11-14

- a. ¹¹ In him we have obtained an inheritance, having been predestined according to the purpose of him who works all things according to the counsel of his will, ¹² so that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of his glory. ¹³ In him you also, when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation, and believed in him, were sealed with the promised Holy Spirit, ¹⁴ who is the guarantee of our inheritance until we acquire possession of it, to the praise of his glory.
- b. Solus Christus (Christ Alone) "In Him we have obtained an inheritance."
- c. Sola Gratia (Grace Alone) Our salvation is grounded in God's eternal plan and sovereign will.

- d. Sola Fide (Faith Alone) We are sealed by the Holy Spirit, not by works but by faith.
- e. Sola Scriptura (Scripture Alone) We have faith because of God's revealed Word.
- f. Soli Deo Gloria (For God's Glory Alone) Twice Paul declares that all God has done is for the praise of His glory.

III. What is the Glory of God?

- a. The Bible describes God's glory in many ways:
 - i. The radiance that made Moses' face glow (Exodus 34:29).
 - ii. The purity that convicted Isaiah's heart (Isaiah 6:5).
 - iii. The intensity that made John fall to his knees (Revelation 1:17).
 - iv. The majesty that makes the angels sing (Revelation 4:11).
- b. Definition: God's glory is the manifestation of His holiness, greatness, and beauty breaking through into the world.
- c. *Psalm 19:1* "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork."

IV. The Purpose of Creation: To Glorify God

- a. Everything exists to reflect God's glory, not to elevate humanity.
- b. John Piper: "This universe and everything in it is mainly about the glory of God."
- c. The Westminster Shorter Catechism asks: "What is the chief end of man?" Answer: "Man's chief end is to glorify God and to enjoy Him forever."

V. The Conflict: The Modern Obsession with Self-Glory

- a. Modern culture prioritizes self-exaltation, fame, and recognition.
- b. UCLA study: Fame is the #1 goal for today's youth.
- c. Pew Research: We've moved from the "Me Generation" to the "Look at Me Generation."
- d. Rick Warren: "It's not about you. The purpose of your life is far greater than your own personal fulfillment."

VI. Calvin on Glory: The Centrality of God's Glory

- a. *Soli Deo Gloria* is foundational to John Calvin's thought and serves as the ultimate purpose of creation, redemption, and human life.
- b. Calvin's theology is radically God-centered, emphasizing that all things exist to glorify God.

c. "The chief end of human life is that we know the majesty of our Maker, and thereby glorify him" (Institutes, 1.2.2)

VII. Calvin on Glory: The Sovereignty of God's Glory in Creation and Providence

- a. God's glory is the purpose of creation. The world was made to reflect God's greatness.
 - i. Humanity, created in God's image, exists to glorify Him.
 - ii. "The heavens declare the glory of God, and the sky above proclaims his handiwork." (Psalm 19:1)
 - 1. "We are not our own; therefore, let us live for Him and die for Him. We are God's; therefore, let His wisdom and will preside over all our actions." (Institutes, 3.7.1)
 - iii. God's providence ensures His glory in all things
- b. Everything happens according to God's sovereign plan for His glory.
 - i. "For from him and through him and to him are all things. To him be glory forever. Amen." (Romans 11:36)
 - ii. "The Lord has created all things for His glory, and He directs all things to the same goal." (Institutes, 1.16.1)

VIII. Calvin on Glory: The Glory of God in Salvation

- a. Salvation is by grace alone for the glory of God alone
 - i. Human merit plays no role; salvation is entirely God's work.
 - ii. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and this is not your own doing; it is the gift of God, not a result of works, so that no one may boast." (Ephesians 2:8-9)
 - iii. "The salvation of the elect is so placed in God's hand that his glory may be fully displayed in it." (Institutes, 3.21.7)
- b. Justification by Faith Alone Excludes Human Boasting
 - i. No human effort contributes to salvation; therefore, all glory belongs to God.
 - ii. "Let the one who boasts, boast in the Lord." (1 Corinthians 1:31)
 - iii. "We never truly glory in Him until we have utterly discarded our own glory." (Institutes, 3.13.2)
- c. The Work of Christ Brings Ultimate Glory to God
 - i. Christ's atonement reveals God's mercy and justice, glorifying Him.
 - ii. "To the praise of his glorious grace, with which he has blessed us in the Beloved." (Ephesians 1:6)
 - iii. "The Lord himself, and no other, is the only author of salvation; therefore, it is he alone who must be glorified." (Institutes, 2.17.1)

IX. Calvin on Glory: The Christian Life: Living for God's Glory

- a. Worship is directed to God alone
 - i. True worship exalts God rather than human traditions or rituals.
 - ii. "You shall worship the Lord your God, and him only shall you serve." (Matthew 4:10)
 - iii. "The worship of God should be pure and simple, without the corruption of human inventions." (Institutes, 4.10.23)
- b. Good works flow from gratitude and glorify God
 - i. The purpose of obedience and sanctification is to reflect God's holiness.
 - ii. "Let your light shine before others, so that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven." (Matthew 5:16)
 - iii. "Since God has so bound us to Himself, it follows that we must wholly dedicate ourselves to Him." (Institutes, 3.7.1)
- c. The Church exists for the glory of God
 - i. The true Church is not for human prestige but for the display of God's glory.
 - ii. "To him be glory in the church and in Christ Jesus throughout all generations." (Ephesians 3:21)
 - iii. "The Church must be ruled by the Word of God alone, so that His glory is not diminished by human authority." (Institutes, 4.8.1)

X. We Glorify God Through Worship and Devotion

- a. Worship is a public declaration that God matters.
- b. Matthew 22:37: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul, and mind."
- c. Luther: "No friend has ever done for me what Jesus has done."
- d. Our daily choices—church attendance, prayer, Scripture reading—demonstrate God's priority in our lives.

XI. Living as Illustrations of God's Glory

- a. The Reformers—Luther, Calvin, Tyndale, Knox, Cranmer—saw *Soli Deo Gloria* as the reason for all doctrine and life.
- b. Ephesians 1:12: "So that we who were the first to hope in Christ might be to the praise of His glory."
- c. John Calvin: "We must eventually become illustrations of the glory of God."
- d. I Corinthians 10:31: "So, whether you eat or drink, or whatever you do, do all to the glory of God."
