- 1. How did Celtic missionaries like St. Patrick and St. Columba embody the call of Matthew 28:16–20 and Acts 1:8 in their lives? How can we follow their example in our own context today?
- 2. The Rule of Columba emphasized prayer, study, and work integrated into daily life. How might we incorporate these disciplines into our modern routines?
- 3. Celtic monks practiced "white martyrdom," leaving home and comfort for Christ. What does this tell us about the relationship between self-sacrifice and spiritual growth? How is this relevant in our lives?
- 4. In Romans 1:8–17, Paul emphasizes the spread of the gospel across cultural boundaries. How did the Irish monks embody this principle, and what can we learn about crosscultural mission today?

| 5. | Celtic Christianity used art, poetry, and music as expressions of theology. How can creative expression deepen our understanding of God and communicate faith to others? |
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| 6. | Celtic Christianity was God-centered rather than nature-centered. How does this differ from modern assumptions about "Celtic spirituality"? How should we balance appreciation of creation with focus on God? |
| 7. | Monasteries like Iona emphasized hospitality and pastoral presence. How can our communities or congregations practice a similar ministry of presence and care today? |
| 8. | Celtic missionaries combined preaching, teaching, service, and hospitality. How can we integrate these elements into modern forms of evangelism and mission? |
| 9. | The Celtic monks' lives were rigorous, demanding endurance and discipline. What lessons can we draw about perseverance in our spiritual life, especially when faith feels difficult or challenging? |
| 10. | What aspects of Celtic Christianity—mission, prayer, scholarship, artistic expression—resonate most with you personally? How can these inspire the way you live out your faith today? |
