

RESPONDING TO HIS SERVICE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

I have been blessed by God to work here at St Paul as I'm about to enter my 8th year here as Director of Worship! I am glad to continually work with you all in Connecting People to Christ, and I am always thankful for those of you who support me in helping our services and ministry thrive: to anyone who

has given their time, talents, and treasures in Choir, Bells, Praise Teams, Audio-Visual, Ushers, Altar Guild, and many other areas – I thank God for you and being able to serve alongside you!

Have you ever wondered why we call our gatherings "Worship Services"? What is a service? The word "service" is usually used for something we receive from someone or

some place. "Oh, the service at that restaurant was awful!" or "I took my car into the shop and the service was excellent!" "Service" is the action of helping or doing work for someone.

When we come to church for Worship Services, we are served by God – we receive the good gifts of His Word, His forgiveness of sins, His Baptism, and His true body

and blood in Holy Communion. We receive incredible “service” when we come to church! He gives us the gift of faith to receive these things, which leads to His ultimate service to us - His saving which He gives to us through His son, Jesus.

But the worship service isn’t only God’s service to us: we also have opportunities to respond and give service back to God in church. Regarding the second example above, for the car shop with great service, you might respond and serve them in return with a “thank you” to the technicians or recommending the shop to family and friends. As we receive God’s great service, it is only natural to respond with service in return. Our responsive moments in church include our verbal (and personal) Confession of Sins, a Profession of Faith, The Lord’s Prayer and – where I eventually wanted to land – praising God in hymns and songs!

And this is important to keep in mind, especially because the “praise” portion of our services comes with some division or contention because each person may prefer different styles. We offer both organ-led singing and praise team-led singing at our church. Both are different styles, yet both can – and should – be a service of thanks and praise back to God.

I was reading our Music Ministry Mission Statement (we have one!) and was processing the words to update it into this current time. There are certain phrases that remind me why we have different styles of worship. One of the primary Values is *“We believe... that worship is commanded in Scripture, but not “how” worship is to be done. Therefore, no language, instrument, style, or man-made ritual is necessarily superior or inferior to another (Ex. 20:8, Heb. 10:25, Col. 2:16).”*

This is important to recall. Not every person has the same upbringing. Some people have been “traditional” most of their lives and may not connect to band-led songs. Some people may have a more “contemporary” music preference, which led them to band-led songs that sing to Jesus. Both help us praise our God; both help Connect (us) to Christ. But – and this is the key – both help us to give service to God through praise and thanksgiving in response to the service He has given us.

If you struggle with this notion, consider some praise styles from other parts of the world:

- Believers in remote countries are worshipping God with no building, no air conditioning, no sound system, and most likely only their full voices and an instrument or two.
- There may be bands who write heavier band music with a Gospel theme to reach those who are lost listening to worldly heavy music.
- There is a Christian DJ who has a podcast show that plays Christian-based electronic music and shares Scripture and prayer.
- Artists use different media to create Christ-based works of art, actors use drama to bring Bible stories to life, and dancers use their gifts to share the Good News.

Aren't these all responses to God's service to us as His children? At the same time, there may be some worship outlets in the world that are not Bible-based and do not have Godly intentions for their ministries. There may be Pastors and musicians and others purporting something other than the Gospel truth. We are to discern such groups, and I strive to do that for our worship services. When it comes to our church family and our worshiping body of believers at St Paul, I encourage us all to understand that no matter what style of music we are playing, we are all giving service to God with our voices for the service He has given us.

To close – how are you responding to God's service to you in church? Do you sing? Do you actively read the words in the hymns and songs for the day? I encourage you to. Everyone can sing: everyone can praise the Lord with their voices for His countless blessings to us. God is worthy of hearing our heartfelt response to His service to us.



MAY 2024 COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

EARLY CHILDHOOD CENTER UPDATE: Christina submitted her report. School ends this week, including the 4K Graduation. Tammy is Amy's replacement, she started last week. Current enrollment for next year is 3AM – 16 (2 on the waiting list), 3PM – 5 and 4K – 12. There is still room in childcare for the summer and minimal space for fall.

Childcare will be switching to their outdoor program in June. Weather permitting, they only come into the building to use the bathroom, eat lunch and take a rest. The new shed is working out great. Christina also submitted the results from the year end family surveys, all with very positive results and comments.

2024-25 BUDGET: Stefanie presented the budget with an estimated 11.6% increase. 42% of the increase is related to wage increases as set by the Executive Committee along with some benefit increases. We have 2 staff now taking health insurance, which accounts for 25% of the overall increase. We are anticipating a shortfall this year of about \$25k, which is 18% of the overall increase.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT PROJECTS: Stefanie presented the anticipated capital projects for the next 5 years. The Capital Improvement Account currently has over \$300,000. There are several small projects that the Council would like Stefanie to proceed on as she sees fit, which include installing two water bottle filling stations, purchasing professional photography equipment, replacing the carpet shampooer, the copy machine and the folding machine.

CHURCH MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE: The Council approved moving to a new software platform. Currently we have five different pieces of software that don't talk with each other. This would allow for less error and more efficient work.

ACTIVITY SPONSORSHIP REQUEST: The Council approved Youth Ministry attending the LCMS Youth Gathering in New Orleans July 16-24, 2025.

CEMETERY PLOTS: Two Wildwood Cemetery Plots were donated to us over 10 years ago to give to someone in need. We have yet to have an opportunity to use these. Stefanie has spoken with the local funeral homes to make them aware that we have these. She has also spoken to Wildwood Cemetery. T

hey suggested we complete a quit-claim deed with the church information and leave the recipient of the graves blank. This would allow them to move forward immediately when the need arises. This will be set up with the stipulation that Wildwood Cemetery cannot change the recipient for the plots, the intent is for them to be given to someone in need.

GAGA BALL PIT: An Eagle Scout would like to do a project for our church. We are having him redo the tech booth in the fellowship hall and would like to also have him make a GaGa Ball Pit for the church yard. This is a popular game for kids that would be used by both Children and Youth Ministry.

The Council is comfortable moving forward with the GaGa Ball Pit being installed outside of entrance 5 as long as our insurance company is consulted first to ensure there are no stipulations.

CONGREGATION MEETING PROCEDURES: It has been suggested that we have people submit their questions for the Congregation Meeting 3-4 weeks prior to a meeting. That would allow leadership to be prepared to respond and to add it to the agenda if it is appropriate for public attention.

If questions are not pre-submitted but brought up during Congregation Concerns, they will be heard but not responded to during the meeting. Again, to allow leadership time to prepare a response.

CONSTITUTION & BYLAW UPDATE: Very little feedback was received from the Congregation. After further discussion the Council has decided to not make any further changes. They will enhance the nominating committee procedure moving forward, which does not require any written changes. Term limits were discussed and at this point will remain as is, with no limits.

ELDER TEAM UPDATE: The Elders are studying the Commandments.

SENIOR PASTOR REPORT: Pr Kyle reported on St. Paul Serves, which had 154 people participating at 12 different locations in the County. We had a great turnout for the first year with all positive feedback. We are looking at potentially making it a month long next year to allow for more project opportunities & volunteers, with a reception to follow after. It was suggested to find a way to have resources like this available year round, as some projects cannot wait until May.

Pr Kyle gave an update on his last Pastoral Leadership Institute session. Staff performance reviews are being done right now and calendar planning is coming up shortly.

JUNE 2024 CONGREGATION MEETING MINUTES

MAY 2024 TREASURER'S REPORT: Donna Felch presented the financial reports. Eleven months into the year we have a deficit of \$30,134. Giving is almost exactly the same as last year at this time. There is nothing unusual to report. Discussion was held regarding the deficit and the importance of Congregation members being aware of this.

2024-25 BUDGET: Stefanie Trakel presented the proposed budget with a 10.1% increase in giving over this year's actual giving. In comparison to our current budget, the 2024-25 budget is 0.2% less. The majority of expenses fall in support/admin expenses and pastoral ministry.

The \$123,065 increase is primarily from wage & benefit increases and then making up our current shortfall. A 5-year anticipated capital improvement plan was also shared, it was suggested that the Council begin planning for large projects that are twenty years out, such as roof and parking lot replacements. The Congregation approved the budget as presented.

CONSTITUTION & BYLAW UPDATE: In follow up to the April Congregation Meeting, Tom Splittgerber reported that the Church Council has decided to not move forward with any other changes to the Constitution or Bylaws, based on feedback. The election process will remain the same and the nominating team process will be enhanced.

HISTORIC TRINITY MILWAUKEE: Tom Witt shared information about Historic Trinity Milwaukee's fire in 2018 and how they are working to rebuild. The Council is looking at helping to provide support with mission money.

THANK YOU: Bob Mehre was thanked for his service to the church by serving on the Church Council.

JUNE 2024 COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

CHILDREN & FAMILY MINISTRY UPDATE: Savannah Henn reported on the wrap up of AWANA and Sunday School this year. VBS is planned for July with an increase of 16 children, registration is at capacity, we also have some new volunteers. Savannah is expecting her baby in August, so she has worked ahead to prepare for fall programming. There are several volunteers that are stepping in to help cover during her leave.

Family events are already planned, which includes a weekend of service this fall at Camp Luther. The nursery will be hiring two new staff, as one has gotten married and another is going to college. Savannah is finishing up her classes for her DCM license and will be ready to accept her call in August.
