"Be Sober-Minded"

At our fall Pastors' Conference, a friend of mine was giving a talk during breakfast about being sober-minded. In addition to feeding my stomach with some particularly tasty bacon and eggs (to the tune of three heaping plates) I thought I should also feed my mind. So, I attended his discussion.

I was glad that I did. He gave me some really good things to think about: some things that I'd like to share with you here.

As he did, we'll focus on 1 Peter 4:7: *"The end of all things is at hand; therefore be self-controlled and sober-minded for the sake of your prayers."*

Peter, writing almost 2,000 years ago, stated that "the end of all things is at

hand" — in other words, Judgment Day is drawing nigh. And certainly, we are closer to the end now than Peter was! All the more reason, as he says, to be "self-controlled and sober-minded."

Just like us, Peter didn't know exactly when Jesus would return. For him and us, the end is always "at hand." It might be another 2,000 years before he comes back, but it might be today.

I think the reason that God doesn't tell us when He'll return is because He knows us. He knows that if we knew when He was coming back, we would act like a college student who knows that finals are still a long way off. We'd worry about "studying" later - right now it's time to party.

But God didn't hand us a syllabus; we don't know when the test will come; we are uncertain as to the date of His judgment. Because of that, we need to be ready all the time. By not telling us "the day or the hour", He helps to keep us from sin, which I think we'd readily indulge in, even more than we do, if we knew precisely when He was coming back.

To put it another way, we're not the Friday nine-to-fiver who knows he doesn't have to be at work again until Monday morning. We're the firefighter at the station, the EMT in the ambulance, or the soldier on base who could get called up into action at any time.

Firefighters, EMTs, and soldiers who are on-duty must be “self-controlled and sober-minded.” You don’t want to run into a fire when you’re three sheets to the wind. You can’t help out a patient when you’re high as a kite. And you can’t effectively fight the enemy if your mind is otherwise occupied.

Fires, medical emergencies, and battles are all do-or-die, crucial, life-or-death situations. And I think we would readily treat them with the utmost importance – we would be prepared for the call because we don’t know exactly when it might come.

The return of Jesus Christ, however, is even more critical – **it’s an eternal-life-or-eternal-death situation.** And as such, it demands our readiness, our preparedness. It behooves us to be “self-controlled and sober-minded.” Considering the magnitude of what we’re waiting for, this command from Peter makes a lot of sense, doesn’t it?

But what does it mean to be “self-controlled and sober-minded?” My friend at the Pastors’ Conference talked about it mostly in terms of sobriety from alcohol. And that certainly is included, but I think it goes far beyond that.

You may have read phrases before like: “drunk on power”, “inebriated with greed”, or “intoxicated by love.” You can be just as addicted to that cup of change on top of your dresser as you

can be to a cup of wine. And a bottle of perfume may consume you just as much as a bottle of whiskey.

But it’s not just the usual culprits like lust and greed. I think we also fail to be sober if our lives are consumed by fear, longing, or hate. Or, on the opposite end of the spectrum, if we are single-mindedly focused on the pursuit of happiness, for instance.

When you’re inebriated, you are no longer controlled by yourself, you’re controlled by the alcohol. When you’re intoxicated, the world becomes blurry – your priorities are reorganized, your morals are compromised, your decision making is dulled. This is true of alcohol, but isn’t it also true of fear, greed, lust, and the relentless pursuit of a better life?

Ultimately, Peter’s instruction to be “self-controlled and sober-minded” is telling us to not let anything arrest our focus except our Savior, Jesus. To make anything our goal besides Him is to blur our vision, to confuse the true order of things, and to make us rather unprepared for His return. Peter is warning us against distraction, against anything that might take our eyes off the prize, which is eternal life through the death and resurrection of Jesus.

As I was writing this, I heard an excellent devotion in which the author explained one way you can find that thing in your life that intoxicates you,

that takes your focus off of Jesus and leaves you ill-prepared for His second coming. When you have a good day, he said, ask yourself, “What made it good?” Or vise-versa, when you have a bad day, “What made it bad?” This should lead you to that thing that your life, your joy, your contentment is wrapped up in.

Finally, his encouragement, and my own, is to ask God to help you to put first things first. Pray that you would find wonder in worship, pursue prayer, and be content by the content of the Holy Scriptures. Ask God to make Himself the apple of your eye, the matter of your mind, and the habit of your heart. To pursue God is to “be self-controlled and sober-minded” and that is to be prepared for the “end of all things” when He will return to take all His faithful to be with Him forever.

Christian Choices

In late February, over 100 Christian educators from around Sheboygan County gathered in Lutheran High's Performing Arts Center to hear Dr. David Smith, Professor of Education and Director of the Kuyers Institute for Christian Teaching and Learning at Calvin University in Grand Rapids, MI and Editor of the International Journal of Christianity and Education. In this presentation sponsored by Faith Based Education, Inc., Dr. Smith shared insights on what faith has to do with the art of teaching and learning. Educators from the Lutheran schools (Bethlehem, St. Paul, St. John Plymouth, St. John Sherman Center, Trinity, and Sheboygan Lutheran High), along with Sheboygan Christian, Oostburg Christian, St. John the Baptist, and St. Ann Elizabeth Seton Catholic were inspired and united in one common mission: to provide quality Christian education to the youth of Sheboygan County.

You won't find controversial and explicit LGBTQ books in our school resource rooms, or bathroom bullying occurring during passing periods. But the difference is that Christian schools, like LHS, have the privilege of turning to God for guidance. We have the opportunity to pray with and for our students. We partner with parents and guardians to help each individual student succeed academically, emotionally, and socially.

February 2024 Church Council Meeting Minutes

Youth Ministry Update: The family events have been very successful so far this year. Plans are beginning for next year already! Confirmation has 55 students enrolled. Retreat season is approaching quickly, along with the Seder Meal, service projects and assessments. Youth Ministry meets weekly on Sunday nights with a variety of different events. They average 15-15 youth per week. The June Pittsburgh Mission Trip will have 27 youth and adults. An informational meeting for the LCMS Youth Gathering in New Orleans in 2025 will be held in April. Nicole serves as the South WI District Parish Pros Coordinator, which gathers DCEs around the district. She also played professor for a day at Concordia.

Mission Partner Scrip: Mission Partner Scrip has been very successful this year. All support designations for this fiscal year have already been completed. Discussion was held. The Council designated the following missions to support through the end of this fiscal year: \$1k Hispanic Ministry, \$1k Guatemala Mission Trip and \$1k to Missionaries Rev Ross & Kris Shaver in the Dominican Republic.

Constitution & Bylaw Update: Proposed changes to the Constitution & Bylaws were reviewed. One change would be that there will no longer be an election for Church Council members, rather the candidate slate will be prepared by the Nominating Committee and presented to the Congregation for approval. The other proposed change is that the Head Elder will also no longer be an elected position with a two-year term, but rather an appointment, just like the Treasurer position. The Council will recommend these changes to the Congregation at the April meeting.

Elder Team Update: Membership and attendance continues to be discussed. We will return to the same summer worship schedule as last year, Memorial Day through Labor Day Sunday. Worship will be 8 am Traditional and 9:30 am Contemporary.

Senior Pastor Report: The 2023 Membership Report was shared. If a regular attender (attends at least twice a quarter) does not attend at all in a quarter, Pr Kyle contacts them. There will be a Small Group push in spring, partnering with Rick Zeuner. Savannah will be on maternity leave, anticipated to begin in August. Pr Kyle is currently leading the Tuesday Bible Study. Pr Kyle will be attending the last session of PLI May 6-12. We are trying a 3 part dialogue for evening Lent services, feedback was given. April 4 will be the Kickoff Weekend for St. Paul Serves.

Book Study: Pr Kyle finished the book study with Council.

Walk In Item – Website Events: The Council would like this calendar to become more robust and go into the future at least 2 months.

Walk In Item – Columbarium Update: Three of the four original team members have agreed to stay on the committee. The team will begin meeting next week. A locate of the property is being conducted shortly.

Walk In Item – Trinity Milwaukee: It's been about 5 years since the church fire. They are working on rebuilding but have run into funding issues. Please keep them in your prayers. The Council will consider this for home mission support for fiscal year 2024-25.

Love INC has an exciting new ministry. **It is the Refugee Resettlement Ministry – to help welcome newcomers.** The Refugee Resettlement is an official program directed and partially funded by the U.S. Department of State. This ministry provides initial support for refugees so that they can gain self-sufficiency and become part of our community where we all thrive. 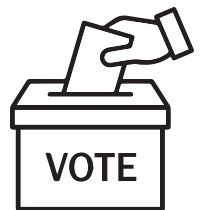
