SHEPHERD GUIDE

When we plan for something big, we don't show up unprepared. Think about how much planning goes into a wedding, a big presentation, or even a party. Similarly, preparing our hearts for Jesus isn't just about showing up—it's about making space for Him. We ready our hearts for Jesus by seeing ourselves for what we are: sinners in need of a Savior.

This week we will study the story of John the Baptist preparing the way for Jesus. Consider the following teaching points as you prepare your heart to lead kids.

We can prepare our hearts for Jesus. Preparing our hearts begins with honesty—recognizing the places where we've let sin, pride, fear, or comfort take the lead. Repentance means naming those things, surrendering them to God, and asking Him to help us change. It's not about trying harder on our own, but about opening ourselves to the Spirit's work in us.

We can point others to Jesus. John didn't just attract people's curiosity; he pointed them to Jesus, the one who could change their lives. That's our job too. We aren't here to build our own little kingdoms, but to build God's—helping others find Jesus through our words, actions, and relationships. We have the greatest news ever, and it's not meant to be kept to ourselves. Every time we live out our faith or speak about Jesus, we're clearing the way for someone else to meet Him.

God is more powerful than anyone. John recognized Jesus as the King of kings, the one who holds all power. John said, "I'm not even worthy to untie His sandals!" That's the kind of reverence we're called to have when we understand just how powerful Jesus is. There's nothing in this world or in our lives more powerful than God. No situation, no struggle, no challenge can outmatch His might. And that's where our confidence should lie: in the fact that our God is bigger than anything we face.

This week, remind kids that when they repent, they're making space for Jesus to move more freely in their lives. They're saying, "I want You more than I want anything else." And that kind of heart posture doesn't just happen once—it's something they'll return to daily as they grow deeper in faith and love for Christ.

Starter Activity

Welcome and Question of the Day

When we travel long distances we usually go on the highway, right? We might take it for granted that the road will be paved nice and smooth for us as we drive. But let's imagine for a moment that we live in a time long ago before there were nicely paved highways. If we were to begin a journey we might see mountains and valleys ahead of us but no safe, smooth road to travel on. We might encounter large rocks and big holes. Traveling like that would be dangerous and would take a long time. Back then kings and royalty were the lucky ones. When they would travel they would send men ahead of them to prepare a road. They would clear a path and smooth out the road to make traveling more comfortable for the king.

Today we are going to learn about a man named John the Baptist. He was a bit like those men who went before a king to clear the path. In fact, he helped clear the path for the most important king ever. John prepared the way for Jesus. John didn't clear a physical road for Jesus. Instead he taught that we must prepare our hearts for Jesus.

Open your Bible to Matthew 3; Mark 1; Luke 3; John 1. You can use the Kids Sermon Outline as you go through the story.

KIDS SERMON OUTLINE:

We can prepare our hearts for Jesus (Matt. 3:1-6): John the Baptist prepared the way for Jesus.

We can point others to Jesus (Matt. 3:11- 12): John the Baptist baptized people with water and made it known that Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit.

God is more powerful than anyone (Matt. 3:7-10): The Pharisees and Sadducees thought they were saved because of their family line, but God is more powerful than anyone.

The word of God came to a man named John who lived in the wilderness. John wore a camel-hair garment and ate locusts and wild honey. He preached a message of repentance for the forgiveness of sins in the area around the Jordan River.

John proclaimed, “Repent, because the kingdom of heaven has come near!” People came from all over Judea to hear what John had to say and to be baptized by him in the Jordan River as they confessed their sins.

The prophet Isaiah had spoken about John many years before. Isaiah said:

“A voice cries out in the wilderness:

Prepare the way for the Lord;

make his paths straight!”

Some of the leaders of the Jewish people called Pharisees and Sadducees came to see what John was saying and doing. When John saw them, he said, “Who warned you to escape God’s anger? Your lives don’t show you’ve turned away from your sin. You can’t just say ‘Abraham is our father.’ I tell you that God can even make stones into children of Abraham.”

Some people thought John might be the promised Messiah who had come to save God’s people. But John knew that he was God’s messenger who was sent to prepare the way for the Messiah.

John said, “I baptize you with water as a sign that you want to turn away from your sin. But the one who is coming after me is more powerful than I am. I’m not even worthy to untie his sandal straps. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and fire.”

CHRIST CONNECTION

John prepared the way for Jesus by calling people to repent of their sins. If we turn away from our sins and trust in Jesus, we will be saved.

What did you hear in the story? Did anything surprise you about John? [Allow responses.] We heard that John lived out in the desert wearing clothing made of camel hair and eating locusts and honey. He may sound strange, but John prepared the way for Jesus by calling people to repent of their sins. Listen to this: (Read Matthew 3:2.) John told the people to turn from their old way of living and turn toward Jesus to find out how to live like people who belong to the one true God.

If we turn away from our sins and trust in Jesus, we will be saved. We don't have to feel guilty or ashamed of all the bad things we've done, said, or thought. Jesus knows all our sin, and His death on the cross paid the price for it. When Jesus died He said, 'It is finished.' Jesus came to earth with a job to do: to bring about God's kingdom and offer us an invitation to belong to Him.



Discussion

Discussion questions listed here

Ask the following questions. Lead the group to discuss.

What did John mean when he said Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit and fire?

When people believe in Jesus, the Holy Spirit comes to live inside of them. This is what John meant when he said Jesus would baptize with the Holy Spirit. Christians have different views on what John meant by saying Jesus would baptize by fire. Some Christians think this fire represents God's judgment on people who keep rejecting Jesus; others believe this fire represents the Holy Spirit who appeared as flames of fire later in the New Testament. Either way, John was saying that Jesus is the most important person and that people should worship Him as their King. (Option: Choose a volunteer to read John 3:36.)

Does baptism save us from our sins? John said he baptized the people as a sign that they wanted to turn away from their sins. Baptism does not save us. Baptism is the outward expression of how Jesus changes our heart when we repent of our sin and follow Him. (Option: Choose a volunteer to read Titus 3:5.)

What should our lives look like when we turn away from sin? When we follow Jesus, there should not only be a change in our hearts, but our actions should also be different as a result. Share that our actions cannot save us, yet when God changes our hearts, He changes our desires. (Option: Choose a volunteer to read 1 John 2:6.)



Share and Care Prayer

Spend some time as a class sharing about:

- Our Global Partner Family of the Month (**The Hallead Family**)
- Specific prayer requests from any of the kids about something going on in their own lives.

Have the class sit in a circle as you share and care for one another's needs. Ask for and share requests with one another. Review and follow up with any prayer requests from the chain made the week before. Use the Global Partner of the Month spotlight sheet (In the Pen Pal Kit) to talk about prayer requests from the Hallead Family.



Preparing Our Hearts

- Heart cut-outs
- Markers
- Colored Pencils

Have you ever had someone come to visit and stay overnight at your house? Did your mom or dad ask you to help get your home ready? What kinds of things would you want to do to prepare for a guest? [Allow responses.] You might want to wash the sheets and put them on a guest bed. You may lay out fresh towels in the bathroom. You may even stock up on some of your guest's favorite snacks. It's important to be ready for someone when they come to stay the night.

It's also important for our hearts to be ready for Jesus. John prepared the way for Jesus. But he didn't tell people to put clean sheets on a bed or tidy up their houses. Instead, John said that we need to prepare our hearts. How do we do that? [Allow responses.] John said, 'the kingdom of heaven has come near.' What an interesting thing to say. In the Bible, the kingdom of heaven is also called God's kingdom, but it's not a physical place. God's kingdom is the story of how God is taking back the world that humans have broken because of our sin. God's kingdom includes all the people who turn to Jesus in faith and ask Him to wipe away their sin.

God loves us so much, and He wants us to be close to Him. That's why Jesus came! He has made the way for us to be reconnected to our Creator by turning away from doing things our own way and asking God to show us the way to live. But it's not just about our behavior. Jesus wants us to truly love Him with all our heart, soul, and mind. We make our hearts ready to follow Jesus by recognizing that we can't do anything to save ourselves. We need Jesus! Jesus truly is the way to freedom!

Give each child a heart cut-out. Have them draw a picture or write a way that they can prepare their heart and choose closeness with God:

- Choosing kindness
- Telling the truth
- Praying instead of worrying
- Quiet moments with God instead of noise



Musical Readiness

- Velcro Spots
- Music on your phone or the USB

Place the velcro spots randomly on the floor around the room, leaving one less than the number of kids playing.

You can use a worship song or instrumental music that ties into the lesson. As the music plays, the kids walk or dance around the room. When the music stops, they must quickly find a spot to stand on. Whoever is left without a spot must do a simple physical challenge and then can return to play. Examples include: jumping jacks, spinning around five times, hopping on one foot, and so forth. Remove one spot each round so that more and more children continue to get out each round. Continue as long as time allows.

SAY: Great job, everyone! Just like in the game, we need to be ready to respond when Jesus calls us. When the music stopped, you had to quickly find a chair, right? In life, we need to be just as quick and ready to listen for Jesus and follow Him when He calls. That means we have to prepare our hearts, turn away from the things that distract us—like sin—and choose to turn toward Jesus. Repentance is all about doing that: stopping what we're doing, recognizing what's wrong, and choosing to follow Jesus. So, just like you had to be fast and ready in the game, we need to be fast and ready to follow Jesus in our lives!

Jesus came to bring us close to God and to have a true friendship with us. The first step in that friendship is realizing that we need Him. That's why repentance is so important—it's about turning away from the world's way of living and choosing to follow Jesus' way!



Turn Back to God

- White t-shirt
- 7 Hangers with costume accessories and labels
- “John the Baptist” coloring sheet
- Markers
- Colored Pencils
- Crayons



SAY: John didn’t just tell people to try harder. He called them to turn back to God and begin again. Repentance is an invitation to start new.

John prepared people because Jesus was coming then, and we know that Jesus is coming again. So we don’t hide our sins or pretend we’re fine. We turn to Him – again and again – trusting His grace to wash us clean.

**Use the following object lesson to teach about repentance:

Put on the t-shirt that says “I told a LIE” in large block letters.

Hang the 7 other hangers with each costume accessory on coat rack hooks. (This will be done and ready for you!)

Labels on the hangers:

- Pretend it never happened.
- Make up an excuse.
- Do something good to make up for it.
- Tell more lies to cover it up.
- Blame it on someone else.
- Get rid of the evidence.
- Empty hanger that says “REPENT - Admit your sin, give it to Jesus, and turn from it. Jesus took our sins on himself.”

Explain that you did something wrong. Have a volunteer read the words on your shirt. Show the children with your body language that you feel bad about what you have done and explain that you would really like to get rid of the bad feeling.

Then say that you have some ideas for how you could get rid of the bad feeling. Take one of the hangers off a hook and read the idea for getting rid of the sin. Take the associated costume item and put it on. Ask the children if it made your sin go away. Your shirt is still visible, so the children will say no. Take each item in turn, trying in vain to cover up the words on your shirt. Some of the items cover your sin a little bit, and you can try to stretch them over your shirt as best you can. But, even to the extent that it is covered, we know the sin is still there!

Finally, give up and take off all the costume accessories that didn’t work. As one final attempt, take the hanger labeled “REPENT - Admit your sin, give it to Jesus, and turn from it. Jesus took our sins on himself.” Express hope about this option, but also some confusion - there’s nothing on the hanger? How does this work? Take off the t-shirt and place it on the hanger, and hang it back on the coat hook and turn away.

Explain that repentance through Jesus Christ is the only way we can actually get rid of our sins. Instead of just trying to cover them up, when we repent, we turn from our sin and give them to Jesus. And because of his great love for us, Jesus takes those sins and puts them on himself through His suffering and death on the cross. We can say thank you Jesus and love Him by listening and obeying His Word.

Pass out the “John the Baptist” sheet. Read it together: “Repent means to STOP sinning, TURN AROUND, and GO follow Jesus.”

Have them color the picture and the stop and go signs.
