WHAT IS CONFIRMATION?

ACCORDING TO THE ELCA...

*"Confirmation ministry is a **pastoral** and **educational** ministry of the church that helps the baptized through Word and Sacrament to **identify more deeply with the Christian community** and **participate more fully in its mission**."*

Outside of church walls, "confirmation" is a run-of-the-mill word typically associated with the idea of verification. Inside church walls, however, the word is used quite differently.

At Epiphany, we use "Confirmation" to describe the years of learning, relationship-building, faith formation, and participation that prepare students for the **Rite of Affirmation of Baptism** and the life of discipleship that follows.

The Latin word *confirmare*, the earliest ancestor of "confirmation," literally means "**to strengthen**." Paired with the word "faith," this gives us an appropriate understanding of Confirmation: *it is a time to strengthen faith*.

Confirmation is also used to describe a special worship service that concludes this time of faith-strengthening. Liturgically speaking, this service is called the **Rite of Affirmation of Baptism**. It is a rite of passage that reminds both individuals and the congregation of the covenant made at baptism—God's promise to us and our call to live out those promises.

Martin Luther reminds us, however, that the Christian life is one of daily dying and rising with Christ in the waters of baptism. In this sense, confirmation is something that never stops happening.

It is celebrated in the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism, when we publicly say "Yes!" to the promises made at our baptism. And it continues every day as we live out our baptismal calling. **Confirmation is not an end. It is a beginning.**

During the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism, candidates are asked to profess faith in Christ Jesus, reject sin, and confess the faith of the church. They are also asked:

"Do you intend to continue in the covenant God made with you in holy baptism: To live among God's faithful people, to hear the word of God and share in the Lord's supper, to proclaim the good news of God in Christ through word and deed, to serve all people, following the example of Jesus, and to strive for justice and peace in all the earth?"

This question from the heart of the Affirmation of Baptism liturgy paints a vivid picture of a life of faith. **It also serves as the foundation of the Confirmation program at Epiphany.**

OUR CONFIRMATION JOURNEY

A JOURNEY OF FAITH

Confirmation at Epiphany is a three-and-a-half-year journey beginning in **6th grade** and culminating with the **Rite of Affirmation of Baptism** in **9th Grade**.

During these years, students will have opportunities to:

- Grow in their knowledge and understanding of the Christian faith
- Explore Scripture and Lutheran theology
- Ask honest questions about faith and life
- Build meaningful relationships with peers and caring adults
- Participate in worship
- Discover and use their gifts
- Become connected to the broader congregation
- Serve and lead
- Experience Christian community through fellowship and retreats
- Prepare for a life of discipleship beyond Confirmation

Our goal is not simply to teach students about Christianity. Our goal is to help students **live as Christians: to grow in faith, build thriving community, and transform lives through Christ's love.**

PROGRAM ELIGIBILITY

Students entering the Confirmation program should:

- Be baptized in a Christian church
- Have taken, or be scheduled to take, First Communion Instruction
- Be entering at least 6th Grade

Eligibility will be determined in consultation with the pastors and Director of Children, Youth & Family Ministries when needed.

Confirmation begins in 6th Grade and culminates with the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism during the student's 9th grade year.

PROGRAM OBJECTIVES

Epiphany Lutheran Church seeks to provide a Confirmation ministry that is relevant to the community in which we serve while building upon our rich Lutheran heritage.

We aim to affirm the faith of our students and lead them toward a personal relationship with Jesus Christ.

We view Confirmation ministry as a joint venture between the youth ministry, parents and families, caring adult leaders, and the entire congregation. Because Confirmation flows from Baptism and is the responsibility of the whole church, we seek to provide students with relationships and experiences that connect them with the broader Epiphany community.

We believe that discipleship goes hand in hand with authentic Christian fellowship and Biblical truth. One is just as important as the other. In fact, one cannot exist without the other.

Our desire is to partner with families and the congregation in nurturing lifelong faith by:

GROWING IN FAITH

Presenting the core of the Christian faith through Scripture, Lutheran theology, and exploration of current issues in the lives of young people.

BUILDING THRIVING COMMUNITY

Creating opportunities for students to develop meaningful relationships with peers and caring adults and to recognize that they are part of a larger faith community.

TRANSFORMING LIVES

Encouraging students to put faith into practice through worship, service, leadership, learning, and participation in the life of the congregation and community.

PREPARING FOR DISCIPLESHIP

Preparing students for the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism and, more importantly, for a lifelong journey of following Jesus.

PROGRAM STRUCTURE

Confirmation at Epiphany Lutheran Church begins at the start of 6th grade and culminates with the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism on Reformation Sunday of the student's 9th grade year.

FIRST, SECOND & THIRD YEAR (6TH, 7TH & 8TH GRADE)

The first three years of Confirmation follow a three-year curriculum cycle. Students will explore Scripture, Christian theology, Lutheran identity, spiritual practices, discipleship, and the ways faith connects with their everyday lives.

Because Confirmation is more than classroom learning, students will also participate throughout these years in worship, small groups, fellowship, retreats, congregational experiences, and opportunities to serve and lead.

CONFIRMATION PREPARATION (9TH GRADE)

During the summer and early fall of 9th grade, students will complete final preparations for the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism.

This time includes:

- A Discipleship Project
- Final Learning Events
- Confirmation preparation
- The Faith Celebration
- The Rite of Affirmation of Baptism
- Opportunities to connect with High School Ministry

Students will also be encouraged to begin thinking about how their faith journey will continue beyond Confirmation.

SMALL GROUPS

Small groups are one of the most important parts of the Confirmation experience. Small groups provide a place where students can connect with one another, build meaningful relationships with caring adults, ask honest questions, and explore what faith means in their everyday lives.

Students will participate in grade-level small groups led by adult Small Group Guides. Each Learning Event will include both large-group teaching and grade-level small group time.

GRADES 6-8 TOGETHER

Students in grades 6-8 will participate in the primary teaching portion of the lesson together. This creates opportunities for students to learn from and with one another across grade levels.

GRADE-LEVEL SMALL GROUPS

Following the teaching time, students will meet with their grade-level small groups. Small groups will provide time to:

- Unpack the lesson
- Ask questions
- Discuss Scripture
- Connect faith to everyday life
- Share experiences and perspectives
- Pray together
- Build relationships

Small groups are not designed to be traditional classroom instruction, nor are they simply a time to socialize. They are a place for students to form relationships with one another and with God so that they can grow in faith.

LEARNING EVENTS

SUNDAYS • 12:00–1:30 PM • AUSTIN CAMPUS

BreakThru Learning Events take place on Sundays from **12:00–1:30 p.m.** at the Austin Campus. **Lunch will be provided each week.**

Weekly gatherings will include teaching, discussion, activities, small groups, fellowship, and opportunities to grow in faith together.

Programming will be available on a weekly basis throughout the program year. Some weeks will be designated as **Required Learning Events** and will be identified on the program calendar well in advance so that families can plan accordingly.

We encourage students to participate as often as possible, even when a particular Sunday is not designated as required. Consistent participation helps students build relationships with their peers and adult leaders and creates a stronger rhythm of learning and faith formation.

A TYPICAL BREAKTHRU SUNDAY

While the format may vary from week to week, our typical Learning Event rhythm will include:

12:00 PM – LUNCH & GATHERING

Students gather for lunch and time together

12:20 PM – TEACHING TIME

Students in grades 6–8 participate in teaching together with a pastor or other leader

1:05 PM – SMALL GROUPS

Students separate into grade-level small groups to discuss the lesson, ask questions, connect the topic to their lives, and pray together.

1:30 PM – CLOSING PRAYER & DISMISSAL

**Because some weeks will have special programming, retreats, service opportunities, or other formats, the exact schedule may vary.*

ATTENDANCE

Students are expected to prioritize and attend all **Required Learning Events**.

We understand that families have many commitments and that conflicts will occasionally arise. If a student must miss a Learning Event, families should communicate with the Confirmation team as soon as possible.

When appropriate, the confirmation team may provide an alternative way for a student to engage with missed material.

The goal of attendance is not simply to fulfill a requirement. **Regular participation is important because Confirmation is as much about relationships as it is about content.**

WORSHIP +2

WORSHIP: GATHER. SERVE. PARTICIPATE.



Worship is at the heart of our life together as God's people.

We want confirmation students not only to attend worship, but to see themselves as active participants in the worshipping community.

As part of Epiphany's **Worship +2** initiative, each Confirmation student will be asked to commit to serving on **one worship team on a regular basis with a target of serving at least once every two months.**

There are many ways students can participate, including:

- **Slides:** Advance PowerPoint slides during worship for songs, scripture, etc.
- **Usher:** Hand out bulletins before service, pass the offering plate, release people for communion, count the offering after service
- **Communion Assistant:** Take communion with assisting minister and help others in the chancel area. Stand next to pastor or assisting minister and hold wine/grape juice and say "Blood of Christ, shed for you."
- **Acolyte (Austin Campus):** At the beginning of the service, light candles on the Altar. During the first verse of the last song, extinguish candles on the altar.
- **Soundboard:** Run the soundboard during the service and help control audio levels.
- **Livestream Team:** Help run cameras or livestream software during the worship service (10:30 services only)
- **Praise Band:** Play a musical instrument or sing with the praise band.

Students do not need to choose the same team for all three years. We encourage students to explore different gifts, interests, and ways of serving.

When you decide where you would like to serve, fill out the **BreakThru Worship Teams Signup Form** and we will connect you to the appropriate ministry coordinator.

WORSHIP +2

TWO CONGREGATIONAL EXPERIENCES: STEP OUTSIDE YOUTH MINISTRY



Confirmation is about more than what happens in youth ministry.

Students are part of the entire Epiphany community, and we want them to experience the many ways people of all ages live out their faith together.

Each year, students are asked to participate in **TWO Epiphany programs, ministries or events outside of Youth Ministry.**

These experiences might include:

- Participating in a congregational service project
- Attending a church council meeting
- Joining a Young at Heart senior ministry gathering
- Serving with Epiphany's Pantry
- Helping with a Rise & Shine children's Sunday School class
- Serving at Vacation Bible School
- Participating in a congregational fellowship event
- Joining another ministry, class, or program
- Participating in another approved congregational opportunity

The possibilities are intentionally broad.

After each experience, students will complete a short online reflection. Students will share what they did, what they experienced, and what they learned.

These reflections will provide an opportunity for students to report back to their small groups and help us celebrate the many ways people throughout the congregation live out their faith.

The goal is not to accumulate hours. The goal is to help students see themselves as members of the whole congregation and discover places where their gifts, interests, and presence can make a difference.

EXPLORE EPIPHANY



DISCOVER YOUR CHURCH

At least **once during their three years of Confirmation**, students will participate in an **Explore Epiphany** new member class alongside their parents.

Explore Epiphany provides an opportunity to learn more about:

- Who we are as a congregation
- Our Lutheran identity
- Our mission and vision
- Epiphany's ministries
- The people who make up our church community
- Ways to become involved
- Opportunities to serve and lead

Students may attend Explore Epiphany at any point during their 6th–8th grade Confirmation journey.

Families are encouraged to participate together.

This experience is designed to help students move beyond seeing church as simply a place where they attend programs.

We want students to recognize Epiphany as their faith community—a place where they belong, contribute, serve, and grow.

Explore Epiphany classes are held twice per year (Spring and Fall) and will be announced in Epiphany's weekly e-newsletter.

RETREATS & FELLOWSHIP

BUILDING THRIVING COMMUNITY

Faith is not meant to be lived alone.

Throughout the Confirmation journey, students will have opportunities to build Christian community through retreats, fellowship events, special programs, and time spent together outside the normal Learning Event schedule.

RETREAT

During the confirmation journey, we seek to provide students with the opportunity to step back and take a long, loving look at life and faith. These are can't miss touch points in your confirmation journey, with costs and dates published well in advance so that families can plan their schedules accordingly. Scholarships are available if needed.

Each year, the best of the best among our high school student leaders plan, host and lead a fall retreat for our confirmation students during a weekend away, most recently at Camp Lakeview in Seymour, Indiana. Dates and information about the retreat are published well in advance each year so that you can plan accordingly.

ALL STUDENTS ARE EXPECTED TO ATTEND AT LEAST ONE RETREAT DURING THEIR CONFIRMATION JOURNEY. GOING ON THE RETREAT MORE THAN ONCE IS HIGHLY RECOMMENDED!



FELLOWSHIP

Students are encouraged to participate in youth fellowship events throughout the year. These opportunities are built into the Sunday programming rotation and may include:

- Fellowship Outings like lunch out, corn maze, bowling, progressive dinner, etc.
- Service Opportunities like Rake & Run, Adopt a Family Shopping, etc.
- Retreats
- Seasonal celebrations or other opportunities for students to build relationships.

WHILE NOT EVERY FELLOWSHIP OPPORTUNITY IS REQUIRED, WE STRONGLY ENCOURAGE STUDENTS TO PARTICIPATE WHENEVER POSSIBLE. FUN IS WHERE COMMUNITY IS BUILT!

PROGRAM RESPONSIBILITIES

A LIFE OF PARTICIPATION

The Confirmation program at Epiphany is designed around a simple idea:

Faith is something we live, not simply something we learn.

Students are therefore encouraged to participate in four important areas of the life of faith:

LEARN

Grow in understanding of Scripture, Christian theology, Lutheran identity, and what it means to follow Jesus.

WORSHIP

Worship regularly together with your family.

BELONG

Build relationships with peers and caring adults through small groups, retreats, fellowship, and the wider congregation.

ENGAGE

Participate in the life of the congregation through two congregational experiences each year, Explore Epiphany, service, leadership, and other opportunities.

Together, these experiences help students prepare to answer the promises made at their baptism and affirmed in the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism.

STUDENT EXPECTATIONS

A SUCCESSFUL AND RELEVANT CONFIRMATION MINISTRY MUST BE A PARTNERSHIP BETWEEN STUDENTS, FAMILIES, AND THE CONGREGATION. EXPECTATIONS INCLUDE THE FOLLOWING:

AS A STUDENT...

We ask that you:

- Remember that you are a baptized member of the body of Christ.
- Take or make plans to take First Communion instruction.
- Participate actively in BreakThru Learning Events, prioritizing required Learning Events.
- Come prepared to participate, learn, and engage.
- Read Scripture and explore your questions about faith.
- Participate regularly in worship.
- Participate in Worship +2 by serving on a worship team at least once every two months.
- Complete two congregational experiences each year and complete the online reflection following each congregational experience.
- Participate in at least one Fall Retreat during your confirmation journey.
- Participate in your grade-level small group.
- Communicate with your Small Group Guide when you need help or support.
- Treat other students, adult leaders, and members of the congregation with respect.
- Take responsibility for your own faith journey.
- Be willing to ask questions, listen to others, and grow.

You do not have to know everything. You do not have to have all the answers.

You do need to be willing to **show up, participate, ask questions, and take ownership of your faith journey.**

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

CONFIRMATION LEADERS—PASTORS, CHURCH STAFF, SMALL GROUP GUIDES, AND OTHER VOLUNTEERS—WILL ENCOURAGE STUDENTS TO FULFILL THEIR COMMITMENTS, BUT THE RESPONSIBILITY TO GROW, WORK, THINK, AND STRIVE LIES PRIMARILY WITH THE STUDENT AND HIS OR HER FAMILY.

We seek to empower parents as the primary teachers, mentors, and role models of faith for their children, with the church as reinforcement—not replacement—of the family's role.

Deuteronomy reminds us:

"Hear, O [Parents]: The Lord our God, the Lord is one. Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your strength. These commandments that I give you today are to be upon your hearts. Impress them on your children. Talk about them when you sit at home and when you walk along the road, when you lie down and when you get up." Deuteronomy 6:4-7

Parents are, by far, the primary means by which children learn about life and God.

The Confirmation program at Epiphany is intended to help families live out the promises made at Baptism.

AS A PARENT OR GUARDIAN...

We ask that you:

- Pray regularly for your child, their Small Group Guide, Confirmation leaders, and the other young people involved in the ministry.
- Encourage your child in their faith journey.
- Help your child prioritize Required Learning Events.
- Encourage regular participation in worship.
- Support your child's participation in Worship +2 and help them identify opportunities for their two annual congregational experiences.
- Share with your kids how you yourselves participate in Worship +2 as a form of modeling.
- Ask your child what they are learning and discuss their thoughts and questions.
- Encourage your child to participate in retreats, fellowship, and other opportunities.
- Attend Confirmation Orientation and other parent gatherings when requested.
- Stay informed about the ministries and activities of Epiphany.
- Read church and youth ministry communications, including email, the website, and other communication platforms.
- Communicate with the Director of Children, Youth & Family Ministries, Small Group Guide, pastor, or other church staff when questions or concerns arise.

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

FAITH AT HOME

The goal is not to turn home into another classroom. Instead, we encourage families to create simple rhythms that make space for faith in everyday life.

Families might:

- Share highs and lows from the day.
- Read Scripture together.
- Pray before meals or bedtime.
- Talk about questions raised at confirmation.
- Worship together.
- Serve together.
- Talk about where they see God at work.
- Ask one another what they are learning about faith.

Faith is caught as much as it is taught.

Our hope is that Confirmation will strengthen the faith practices already taking place in your home and provide new opportunities for your family to grow together.

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

To promote ongoing faith development in the home, we are encouraging families to use a regular devotion at home that works for you.

D365.org is a great resource for this, providing daily devotions that follow a five-step format – Pause, Listen, Think, Pray, Go.

D365 also has an app available to download to have devotions available on your phone.

FAITH 5

The FAITH5 (Faith Acts In The Home) is a simple, easy-to-implement faith practice, perfect for incorporating into your bedtime routine for five to fifteen minutes a night. When done over time, the FAITH5 carries the power to enrich communication, deepen understanding, aid sleep, and promote mental, physical, and spiritual health.

SHARE highs and lows
READ scripture together
TALK about it
PRAY together
BLESS one another

PARENT CONNECTIONS

Periodically throughout the year, parents will be asked to join us for a Learning Event. During these events, there will be opportunities to connect with other parents who are in the trenches with you, to learn information and participate in discussions about issues teens and parents are facing. We hope that these connection times will be a resource and haven for you as parents.

CONFIRMATION PREPARATION

The summer and early fall of the student's 9th-grade year are a time of final preparation for the Rite of Affirmation of Baptism. Students will participate in several final experiences designed to help them look back on their Confirmation journey, reflect on their faith, and prepare for the next chapter.

These include: The Discipleship Project, Final Confirmation Learning Events, Confirmation preparation activities, The Faith Celebration and The Rite of Affirmation of Baptism

Students will also be encouraged to connect with High School Ministry during this time.



Each student will complete a Discipleship Project to share his or her faith with the members of Epiphany through the use of spiritual gifts, talents, and interests. Students will create a project that shares something about their faith and life as a disciple of Jesus Christ.

The project may take many forms.

Students might create, perform, teach, build, write, organize, serve, design, or otherwise use their gifts to share their faith with others.

A completed project will include:

1. The project itself
2. A written description of the project
3. A reflection explaining how the project shares the student's faith

Additional information and examples will be provided to students during their 8th-grade year.

RITE OF AFFIRMATION OF BAPTISM

The Rite of Affirmation of Baptism has long been a very special tradition of the Lutheran Church. In this service, we honor and celebrate the growth in faith of our young people with their parents, families, Small Group Guides, Confirmation leaders, and congregation.

The service is not a graduation from church. It is not the end of a student's faith journey. It is a public affirmation of the promises made at Baptism and a reminder that the Christian life continues beyond Confirmation.

Students will affirm their intention to continue living among God's faithful people, hearing God's Word, sharing in Holy Communion, proclaiming Christ through word and deed, serving others, and striving for justice and peace.

CONFIRMATION CELEBRATION

Confirmation will be celebrated on **Reformation Sunday** (typically the last Sunday in October) during the student's 9th-grade year.

2026 (starting in 2023):	Sunday, October 25
2027 (starting in 2024):	Sunday, October 31
2028 (starting in 2025):	Sunday, October 29
2029 (starting in 2026):	Sunday, October 28
2030 (starting in 2027):	Sunday, October 27

Specific details about the Confirmation Celebration, rehearsal, Faith Celebration, and worship service will be shared with families during the summer and early fall of the student's 9th-grade year.

PROGRAM COSTS & DONATIONS

CONFIRMATION IS A GIFT FROM THE CONGREGATION

Beginning with the 2026–2027 program year, there is no participation fee for the Confirmation program. The only cost not covered will be a subsidized cost for the annual Fall Retreat. Epiphany Lutheran Church is committed to making Confirmation accessible to every student and family.

The congregation provides funding for the program, including curriculum, supplies, meals, adult leader support, and other program expenses.

Because we are also adding a lunch component to our weekly Sunday Confirmation programming, families who are able and willing are invited to consider making a voluntary donation to help support the cost of meals and other Confirmation expenses.

A donation is completely optional and has no bearing on a student's participation in the program.

We are grateful for the generosity of the congregation and families who make this ministry possible.

COMMUNICATION

Good communication is an important part of a successful Confirmation ministry.

Families should regularly check the Weekly CYF Email Update on Tuesdays for:

- Confirmation schedules
- Required Learning Event reminders
- Retreat information
- Worship +2 opportunities
- Congregational experience opportunities
- Registration information
- Parent gatherings
- Changes to schedules
- Other important program updates

If a student cannot attend a Required Learning Event or has another circumstance that may affect participation, families should communicate with the Confirmation team as soon as possible.

A FINAL WORD TO STUDENTS

Confirmation is not about proving that you are a perfect Christian.

It is not about having all the answers.

It is not about completing enough requirements to "graduate."

It is about growing.

Growing in your understanding of God.

Growing in your relationship with Jesus.

Growing in your ability to ask questions and wrestle with your faith.

Growing in your relationships with other people.

Growing in your understanding of Scripture.

Growing in your confidence to use your gifts.

Growing in your willingness to serve.

And growing into the person God created you to be.

As you move through Confirmation, remember that you are not taking this journey alone.

You have your family.

You have your friends.
