HE IS RISEN!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ at St. Paul,

"He is not here, but has risen." — Luke 24:6

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

That simple, powerful proclamation is not just something we say on Easter morning. It is the reality that shapes every single day of our lives as God's people. The tomb is empty. Jesus is alive. And because He lives, everything is different.

It can be easy, though, for Easter to feel like a moment rather than a way of life. The celebration comes and goes, filled with joyful hymns and songs, full sanctuaries, and the beauty of the resurrection account. Then Monday comes. The routine returns. The struggles persist. The questions linger. And we might wonder what difference Easter really makes now.

The answer is this: The resurrection of Jesus is not just an event we remember. It is a truth we live in.

When Jesus rose from the dead, He did not simply prove something about Himself. He accomplished something for you. Your sin is forgiven. Your guilt is removed. Your death is defeated. As the apostle Paul reminds us in Romans 4, Jesus *"was delivered up for our trespasses and raised for our justification."* That means the resurrection is God's declaration that everything needed for your salvation has been fully completed in Christ!

So what does that look like in daily life?

It means that when you are weighed down by sin or regret, you do not have to live stuck alone with that burden. Christ is risen, and your sin no longer defines you.

It means that when doubts creep in, when faith feels weak or uncertain, you are not alone in that struggle. Christ is risen, and He meets you even there.

It means that when life feels empty or directionless, when the things of this world fail to satisfy, you have something lasting and sure. Christ is risen, and your hope is alive.

This is exactly what we will be exploring together in our new Easter sermon series: Real Truth = Real Life.

Throughout the Easter season, we will walk through real encounters people had with the risen Jesus and see how those encounters did not just change what they believed, but how they lived.

On Easter Sunday, we begin with the foundation: Jesus is alive. In a world that constantly pulls us toward things that cannot last, such as success, identity, comfort, or control, the resurrection calls us back to what is truly real. Jesus is not just a good teacher or moral example. He is the risen Son of God who has defeated sin, death, and the grave. Because He lives, your life has a foundation that will never be shaken.

Then, in the weeks that follow, we will see how that truth plays out in real lives. We will wrestle with doubt alongside Thomas and see how Jesus leads him to faith. We will walk the road to Emmaus and discover how Jesus brings hope to weary and confused hearts. We will stand with Peter and witness what true restoration looks like—not just a second chance, but a life reshaped by grace.

And through it all, we will be reminded that this is not just their story. It is yours.

The risen Jesus still comes to His people today. He meets you in His Word. He speaks peace into your fears. He strengthens your faith. He forgives your sins. He calls you by name and sends you out with purpose.

That means Easter is not over. It is ongoing!

Because Christ is risen, you are not stuck in your past. Because Christ is risen, you are not defined by your failures. Because Christ is risen, you are not without hope.

Instead, you are forgiven. You are restored. You are sent.

As we move through this Easter season together at St. Paul, I encourage you to stay connected, to gather in worship, to hear these resurrection accounts, and to see again and again how the living Christ is at work in real lives, including yours.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

MARCH COUNCIL MEETING MINUTES

March 23, 2026 Council Meeting Minutes

Children & Family Ministry Update: Pr Adam submitted his report. He is currently leading the Tuesday morning Bible study. Shares responsibilities to handle funerals, weddings, baptisms, visitations and inactive member follow up. AIM class just finished for spring. He worked with small groups and had 3 new groups form during the Red Letter Challenge. He is the contact for Bereavement Ministry, Celebrate Recovery, Night to Shine and The Gathering Place. He's also been visiting the ECC on a regular basis, as well as AWANA, Confirmation, Ladies Auxiliary.

Youth & Family Ministry Update: Nicole Dollevoet submitted her report. Recent Children, Youth & Family events included Trunk or Treat, Camp Luther Weekend, bowling, mini golf, swimming and Bingo, which were all very successful. Planning some new and bringing back favorites for next year. Confirmation has 53 students. 7th grade lock in went well and we are now entering retreat season. The First Communion Seder Meal was earlier this month. Students have participated in service nights as well. The high school group meets weekly with 12-20 in attendance. Various activities are planned each week, including college care packages to stay connected with over 50 young adults. The Charleston Mission Trip has 33 youth and adults and pre-trip meetings and fundraising are going well. Nicole continues to serve as the Parish Pros Coordinator for SWD. She'll also be helping plan ReStart, the district's annual youth event in August.

Senior Pastor Update: Both Pastors assisted with Night to Shine last month, which was incredibly successful. Red Letter Challenge is wrapping up this week, which went very well. Holy Week is next week, so it is a busy time. St. Paul Serves kicked off this past weekend and will run through most of May.

Synod elections are coming up. We will be voting for Joel Biermann for President, Allan Buss for Vice President and Mark Brandt for Great Lakes Regional VP. They all have a more missional focus.

Treasurer Report: Giving is holding steady through February. If things remain as is, if we do not consider the special gifts, we'll end the year \$45,000 short of budget, but expenses have been remaining under budget. An additional large gift has been given in March for the operating budget. At year end the Council will need to determine how to designate these additional funds. The Council is being challenged to begin thinking bigger picture. How do we expand ministry with the special gifts that have been given?

Endowment Team Update: Donna attended a recent Endowment Meeting. Funds have been invested in the Lakeshore Community Foundation since 2016 with a ROI of 9.45% over those years. We currently have over 1 million invested. The Unrestricted Fund will be giving \$43,000 in grants this year. Given the size of the fund, the Endowment Team would like more input from Council to ensure everyone is working in the same direction. An Endowment Rep will be asked to attend Council Meetings bi-annually.

Elder Team: The Elders finished the Creed Articles and reviewed the Pastor's report. Next meeting is in May.

Walk In Item – Ushers: Mark Buffington has some ideas for the usher teams in terms of counting and managing communion. He will follow up with Thomas Walkenhorst.

Walk In Item - Nominating Team: The ballot has been finalized. Election is at our April Congregation Meeting.

Walk In Item – Parking Lot: The water pipe running to the garage seems to have lifted through the winter, this needs to be addressed before it damages the parking lot. Stefanie will work with David regarding the pipe. We are also planning crack filing this year for maintenance.

At the beginning of March, I had the opportunity to attend the Association of Lutheran Secondary Schools (ALSS) Administrators Conference. Each year, this gathering offers a welcome reminder of the strength, unity, and shared purpose that connect Lutheran high schools across the country. One of the greatest blessings of the conference was the chance to connect with fellow Lutheran administrators. We celebrated what is going well in our schools, discussed challenges we face, and helped one another think through the next faithful steps for our respective high school ministries.

Along with these meaningful connections, the conference provided a variety of breakout sessions focused on topics important to the future of Lutheran secondary education. Keynote speakers provided messages that invited us to reflect on our leadership, our mission, and the rapidly changing world in which our students are living. Each session—whether practical, reflective, or forward-looking—offered a helpful reminder that everyone (both young and old) must continue to learn.

The idea of lifelong learning is a simple but important truth: learning is something we will never outgrow or finish. Life is a journey filled with opportunities to grow, and learning is one of the gifts God provides for us that makes the journey meaningful and successful. At Sheboygan Lutheran High School, this belief is at the heart of what we do daily. We strive to nurture lifelong learners— young men and women who not only work hard and succeed during their high school years, but who also develop the curiosity, resilience, and critical thinking skills that will serve them well in the years ahead. Our walk thru healing and restoration starts with one principle at a time, taught to us by Jesus:

Principle 3: Consciously choose to commit all my life and will to Christ's care and control.

"Blessed are the meek, for they will inherit the earth." Matthew 5:5 NIV

At this principle we make a decision to stop trying to control and regulate everything in and around us and finally turn everything over to Jesus. One day at a time we trust Jesus to do for us what we have not been able to do for ourselves.

We all have struggles. What do you struggle with?
