Part 5: Christ: Lord of Our Relationships

Today we continue our series in the Book of Colossians. Paul writes Colossians, probably around 60-62 AD. While he was under house arrest in Rome. Colossians is labeled as one of Paul's 'Prison Epistles, along with Philemon, Ephesians and Philippians. Colossians is described as a spiritual "chart and compass," reminding believers that Christ alone is our true North—our Supreme Lord and sufficient Savior. Below is an overview chart by Dr. Charles Swindoll.

As we continue our journey through Colossians, we come to a section where Paul moves from doctrine to daily living. Wiersbe reminds us, *"If Christ is truly preeminent in our lives, then we will glorify Him by keeping pure, by enjoying fellowship with other saints, by loving each other at home and being faithful at work, and by seeking to witness for Christ and serve Him effectively."* In these verses, Paul shows us that Christ's lordship must shape our closest relationships—at home and at work. Let's see what it means to crown Him Lord of our relationships.

Colossians 3:18–4:1...¹⁸ Wives, submit to your husbands, as is fitting for those who belong to the Lord. ¹⁹ Husbands, love your wives and never treat them harshly. ²⁰ Children, always obey your parents, for this pleases the Lord. ²¹ Fathers, do not aggravate your children, or they will become discouraged. ²² Slaves, obey your earthly masters in everything you do. Try to please them all the time, not just when they are watching you. Serve them sincerely because of your reverent fear of the Lord. ²³ Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people. ²⁴ Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ. ²⁵ But if you do what is wrong, you will be paid back for the wrong you have done. For God has no favorites.

Chapter 4:1...Masters, be just and fair to your slaves. Remember that you also have a Master—in heaven.

1. Husbands & Wives:

Love & Submission

Colossians 3:18,19...¹⁸ Wives, submit to your husbands, as is fitting for those who belong to the Lord. ¹⁹ Husbands, love your wives and never treat them harshly.

Wiersbe explains, “We must not think of submission as ‘slavery’ or ‘subjugation.’ The word comes from the military vocabulary and simply means ‘to arrange under rank.’ The fact that one soldier is a private and another is a colonel does not mean that one man is necessarily better than the other. It only means that they have different ranks. God does all things ‘decently and in order’ (1 Cor. 14:40).”

He continues, “*Headship is not dictatorship or lordship. It is loving leadership. In fact, both the husband and the wife must be submitted to the Lord and to each other (Eph. 5:21). It is a mutual respect under the lordship of Jesus Christ. True spiritual submission is the secret of growth and fulfillment.*”

When Christ is Lord of the home, love and submission are not competing forces but complementary expressions of devotion to Christ and to one another.

Wiersbe adds, “*Where do we get the power to love and to submit? From the Lord. If we are wearing the ‘grace-clothes’ described earlier (Col. 3:5–14), and*

if we have our hearts filled with the peace of Christ and the Word of Christ, then we will contribute to the joy and harmony of the home. If we live to please Christ first, others second, and ourselves last, we will build strong marriages and spiritual homes.”

In these verses, Paul calls husbands and wives to a love and submission that isn’t about power or control, but about mutual respect and sacrificial care—“headship is not dictatorship or lordship. It is loving leadership.” When Christ is Lord of the home, submission and love are not competing forces but complementary expressions of devotion to Him and to one another.

The health of our marriages is a direct reflection of Christ’s preeminence in our hearts.

2. Parents & Children:

Encouragement and Obedience

Colossians 3:20–21...²⁰ Children, always obey your parents, for this pleases the Lord. ²¹ Fathers, do not aggravate your children, or they will become discouraged.

Wiersbe writes, “*Obedience to parents is part of one’s Christian life. To obey parents in the Lord means to obey them in everything that is in line with God’s will.*”

Children are called to obey, not because parents are perfect, but because it pleases the Lord and reflects Christ's own obedience.

Wiersbe emphasizes, *"The Christian father must not be a tyrant. He must govern his family in the love of God and not in the tyranny of men. Discipline is necessary, but it must be administered in love and not in anger."*

If family members are controlled by the Spirit of God and the Word of God, they will be joyful, thankful, and submissive—and they will have little trouble getting along with each other." The home, then, becomes a place of spiritual growth and joy, where encouragement and obedience flow from hearts shaped by Christ.

3. Masters & Servants:

Honesty & Devotion

Colossians 3:22–4:1...²² *Slaves, obey your earthly masters in everything you do. Try to please them all the time, not just when they are watching you. Serve them sincerely because of your reverent fear of the Lord.* ²³ *Work willingly at whatever you do, as though you were working for the Lord rather than for people.* ²⁴ *Remember that the Lord will give you an inheritance as your reward, and that the Master you are serving is Christ.* ²⁵ *But if you do what is wrong, you will be paid back for the wrong you have done.*

For God has no favorites. Chapter 4:1...Masters, be just and fair to your slaves. Remember that you also have a Master—in heaven.

Paul writes, "Servants, obey in all things your masters according to the flesh; not with eyeservice, as menpleasers; but in singleness of heart, fearing God."

Wiersbe explains, "Paul did not advocate the overthrow of the existing social order, but he did lay down principles that, ultimately, would lead to the abolition of slavery." The principle is clear: "Whatever you do, do it heartily, as to the Lord, and not unto men" (3:23).

Wiersbe observes, *"It is by His power and authority that we should live in our daily relationships. If He is the preeminent One in our lives, then we will love each other, submit to each other, obey, and treat one another fairly in the Lord."*

It is important to understand that Paul's instructions regarding masters and slaves in Colossians 3:22–4:1 are not an endorsement of slavery, but rather a pastoral response to the realities of the ancient world, where slavery was a deeply entrenched social institution with over sixty million slaves in the Roman Empire. As Wiersbe notes, *"The gospel did not immediately destroy slavery, but it did gradually change the relationship between slave and master."* Paul's aim was to bring the transforming power of

Christ into every relationship, urging Christian masters to treat their slaves with justice and fairness—radical ideas in a society that viewed slaves as property, not people. The New Testament consistently affirms the equal worth of all people in Christ (Gal. 3:28), and Paul’s letter to Philemon is a powerful example of calling for the recognition of a slave as a beloved brother.

Today, Christians must be clear: slavery in any form is a violation of God’s design for human dignity and freedom, and followers of Christ are called to oppose and work against all forms of oppression and exploitation. Paul’s words are not a blueprint for perpetuating injustice, but a call to let the lordship of Christ transform every human relationship with love, respect, and equality.

In today’s world, while we no longer live under the system of slavery Paul addressed, the principles he taught apply directly to the relationships between employers and employees. Wiersbe notes, “*A Christian worker ought to be the best worker on the job. He ought to obey orders and not argue. He ought to serve Christ and not the boss only, and he ought to work whether anybody is watching or not.*” For Christian employees, this means working with integrity, diligence, and sincerity—“not with eyeservice, as menpleasers; but in singleness of heart, fearing God” (Col. 3:22). For Christian employers, Paul’s words challenge us to treat employees with

fairness, respect, and honesty, remembering that “masters, give unto your servants that which is just and equal; knowing that ye also have a Master in heaven” (Col. 4:1). In a world often marked by exploitation or indifference, Christians are called to reflect Christ’s character in the workplace—valuing people over profit, leading with humility, and seeing every task as an opportunity to serve the Lord. When Christ is Lord of our work, our jobs become platforms for witness, and our relationships at work become a testimony to His justice and grace.

He concludes, “*The heart of every problem is the problem of the heart, and only Jesus Christ can change the heart.*” When Christ is Lord of our work and our authority, honesty and devotion become the marks of our relationships, and our daily labor becomes an act of worship to Him.

Conclusion

Paul’s words in Colossians remind us that Christ’s lordship isn’t just a doctrine to be believed—it’s a reality to be lived out in the most ordinary and intimate places of our lives. Wiersbe says, “*If Christ is truly preeminent in our lives, then we will glorify Him by keeping pure, by enjoying fellowship with other saints, by loving each other at home and being faithful at work, and by seeking to witness for Christ and serve Him effectively.*”

If Jesus Christ is not Lord of all, He cannot be Lord at all. Let's crown Him Lord of our marriages, our families, and our workplaces.
